## STATE NEWS.

Mrs. Battle, wife of Rev. Henry W. Battle, pastor of the First Baptist church in Greensboro, suffered a stroke of paralysis on the 5th. Her condition is extremely serious.

The store of Hartley Bros. in Winston was broken into on the night of the 5th and robbed, as was also the store of W. O. Donnell, at Oak Ridge.

George Cant and Lanson Rogers, employes of Artz's quarry, in Rowan county, were seriously injured by the falling of a large derrick on the 5th. The former was struck on the head and is not expected to live.

When No. 37, the Southern vestibule, reached Charlotte on the morning of the 5th, it was learned that one of the passengers had been robbed of over two thousand dollars in diamonds. The name of the lady who was robbed is Mrs. M. J. Green, who was returning from New York to her home in Macon, Ga.

The state has offered a reward of \$200 for the incendiaries who caused the recent fire in Rocky Mount.

Four convicts at work on the Raleigh & Pamlico Sound railway have escaped. The carelessness of a guard is said to have given the convicts their liberty.

The hearing of the receivership matter of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad has been postponed to the 17th.

The Hebrew citizens of Durham are preparing to build a synagogue in that city.

Mrs. Bessie Ray was found dead in a park in Charlotte on Sunday morning. It is thought she committed suicide by drinking some poisonous drug.

## GENERAL NEWS.

Seven persons dead and seventy five seriously injured is the result of a dynamite explosion in the magazine of H. S. Karbaugh, at Latrobe, Pa., on March 5th.

Six men were instantly killed and four others seriously wounded by the breaking of the bridge across Yellow Creek at Hammondsville, Ohio on the Cleveland and Pittsburg railroad on the 5th inst. Two engines and two cabooses carrying a part of a crew went down.

A Groff, inventor of the now famous Groff letter box fastener and a member of the metropolitan police force of the District of Columbia, jointly convicted with his brother, Diller B. Groff, A. W. Machen and George E. Lorentz of conspiracy to defraud the United States, has been sentenced to two years in the penitentiary and fined \$10,000.

Elmer Durant was killed by Henry Jones in the state prison in Trenton, N. J., on the 5th inst., with the blade of a pair of scissors Jones was stabbed several times with a pen knife from which he may die.

## Ex-Sheriff Hooker Dead.

Wallace E. Hooker, a prominent citizen of Pamlico county died at his home in Bayboro, Friday after a protracted illness.

Mr. Hooker was sheriff of his county for several years besides having filled other positions of importance and honor, and was at the time of his death, 50 years of age.—New Bern Journal.

## War News.

Sunday afternoon a Japanese fleet of five battleships and two cruisers bombarded Vladivostok but did no damage to the Russians. The shells from the Japanese guns failed to explode.

Thirty Russian sailors have been court martialed and shot for trying to make their escape from Port Arthur.

Cabling from Ping Yang, under date of March 6 a correspondent that two thousand Russian cavalrymen with seven guns; retreated last Wednesday through Kusong and Sonchon towards Wiju. They destroyed the telegraph lines.

## Pitt County at the Exposition.

In the tobacco exhibit at the St. Louis exposition the Greenville market will have a creditable place. Some weeks ago Mr. T. K. Bruner, secretary of the Board of Agriculture of North Carolina and special commissioner of the tobacco exhibit for the United States at the St. Louis exposition, came to Greenville in the interest of the North Carolina tobacco exhibit. As a result of his visit a meeting of the tobacco board of trade was called and committees were appointed by the president to raise a fund of two hundred dollars and to get up samples of tobacco, etc. for the purpose of making an exhibit.

These committees completed their work last week and on Saturday morning the President of the Board of Trade, Mr. M. A. Allen, sent his check for \$200 to the state treasurer, together with the samples, etc that will constitute Greenville's part of the North Carolina tobacco exhibit at the worlds fair. If every tobacco market in the state will do as well as Greenville has done, tobaccoist, from the old North State visiting the exposition will have no cause to be ashamed of their state.

## DISPENSARY WINS.

As said in these columns on the day following the contest, the result of the dispensary election last Wednesday was a great victory for the advocates of the dispensary. The saloon advocates exhausted every resource in their power in the effort to win. The election returns were presented to the aldermen at their regular meeting the night following the election, and representatives of both sides were present to argue the matter. The board, however, decided to postpone the hearing to a special meeting to be held Monday night when as much time as might be necessary could be given to it. At this special meeting the aldermen accepted the returns as made by the judges of the election. From the Fifth ward there were two returns one signed by two of the judges, the other by only one. The board accepted the majority returns and declared that the dispensary had been carried.

And the Mormon Elders out in Utah are rejoicing over the Smoot investigation at Washington. They say it is giving an opportunity to proclaim their doctrine in the ears of the whole world. But they lose sight of the fact that the more the world hears of polygamy the more detestable it becomes. Smoot should be ousted in short order.

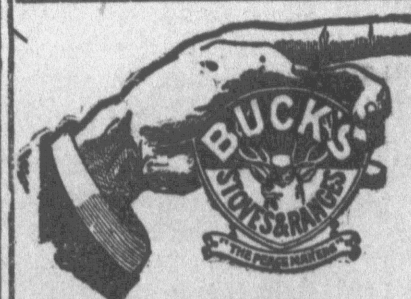
