### Battle at Sea Expected.

St. Petersburg, March 8.—The whereabouts of Captain Reitzensten's Vladivostock squadron is carefully guarded by the military authorities, but there is a strong impression here that when the seven Japanese warships appeared off the harbor Sunday and yesterday the Russian squadron was outside perhaps down the coast, co-operating with the Russian land forces near the mouth of the Tumen River. If the Russians were outside and the Japanese definitely ascertained that fact a big sea fight is probably imminent, as it is considered certain that the Japanese in that case will lie on and off Vladivostock, to prevent the return of the Russians, giving battle if they are caught in the open sea.

All the harbors along the coast in which the Russians might seek refuge, are frozen and the squadron must eventually be forced to return to Vladivostock for coal. Although the Japanese squadron is

superior in numbers and guns, consisting of a battleship and four armored cruisers, two of which are believed to be the Idsno and the Yakumo, and two unarmored cruisers under Captain Reitzenstein, the Russia, Grombol, Rurik and Bogatir, are among the finest vessels in the Russian navy, constituting as sister ships a homogenous fighting unit, and experts here are not certain that they could not take the measure of Rear Admiral Uru's ships.

**Negro Labor.**

The Census bureau has published the statistics that of the 21,000,000 acres of cotton planted in 1903 14,000,000 acres were cultivated by white labor. Fifty-eight per cent of the work of cotton planting is done by white people and 42 per cent is done by colored people, and yet men will argue that Southern progress is founded on negro labor. The truth is that the South is learning to get along without the negro and the negro is becoming less valuable as a laborer rapidly and in about equal proportions, and the farther we get from the dependence on the negro for anything the better it will be for both races; when we do our own work it will be done better and the negro will then begin to work himself instead of laboring merely for his daily bread. White people are now doing 58 per cent of the work negroes could do and though the conclusion does not necessarily follow, it is true that the negroes do not more than 42 per cent as much work as they could do.—Charlotte Chronicle.

The Chicago Record Herald says that the Japanese word for "hurrah" is "bansai," and that the Russian equivalent is "kzestrovokosoffvriky." To the average person it will seem that the Jap has the best of it as he can shout his word while the other fellow is getting started.

Those who are opposed to the dispensary will say its promoters ought not to try to make a financial success of it. If it were to fail to be a financial success these same people would urge that it ought to be discontinued for the self same reason. If the dispensary is not a financial success it will be no success at all. The dispensary is nothing more than a choice between evils. People will have whiskey, and there is less evil in handling it through a dispensary well managed than any other method.—Raleigh Times.

It is worthy of note that while there is and has been much pneumonia and grip throughout the country, in Guilford as well as elsewhere, that the convict road forces have been free from it. In one camp there are about 60, in the other 80, yet only once has a doctor been summoned in the past two months and that was for a man who got his leg hurt. The men sleep in tents, are exposed to all kinds of weather, yet their health has been excellent all winter, while in the neighborhood of both camps there have been pneumonia and grip in abundance. People who contend that exposure to the weather brings such diseases will find a stump here.—Greensboro Telegram.

**CARE OF THE EYES.**

Some Simple Rules Which Will Tend to Preserve the Sight.

An eminent physician lays down these simple laws on the general care of the eyes for persons who wish to retain the strength of their eyesight to green old age:

When reading, writing, drawing, sewing or engaged in similar work always take care that the room is comfortably cool, that the feet are warm, that there is nothing tight about the neck and that there is plenty of light. Be sure that the sun does not shine directly on the object you are at work on or on objects in front of you and that the light comes from over the left shoulder. The head should not be bent much in reading. The page should be nearly perpendicular to the line of sight. It should not be less than ten inches from the eyes.

Do not habitually lie down when reading.

Never study or write before breakfast by artificial light.

Avoid reading or sewing by twilight or when debilitated by recent illness, especially fever.

When the eyes have any defect avoid fine needlework, drawing of fine maps and all such employment except for very short tasks, not exceeding half an hour each.

Never play "tricks" with the eyes, such as squinting, rolling them, and so on.

In all forms of labor requiring the exercise of vision on minute subjects the worker should rise from his task now and then, take a few deep inspirations with the mouth closed, stretch the frame, throw the arms backward and forward and, if possible, step to a window or into the open air, if only for a moment.

Reading in a moving car certainly involves an undesirable strain and should be avoided as far as practicable. If you will read, obtain books or papers with large type.

When, ten minutes later, a troop of mounted excise men pulled up at his door, he was truthfully able to say that he had seen nothing of the lawless ones."
