COUNTY MATTERS.

Proceedings of the Commissioners.

The board of county commissioners met in regular session on Monday, 7th, all the members present.

Orders drawn on the treasury amounted as follows: For paupers \$178.25; county home \$166.46; bridges and ferries \$116.21; jail \$32.15; Coroner \$19; record books \$10; court costs \$26.70; Register Deeds \$85.40; witness tickets \$71.90; Clerk Superior court \$12,10; Commissioners \$24.60; Confederate Veterans' Association \$50; miscellaneous \$4.70, stock law territory \$454.30.

The monthly reports of treasurer and superintendent of health were filed.

W. E. Stocks, Thos. McLawhon, L. B. Tilghman, C. B. Butler and Abram Baker were released from fall tax for 1903.

Pauper allowance of Mrs. Jane Whitehurst was increased to \$2 per month. Clemmie Stocks was added to pauper list to receive \$3 per month.

Nancy Beverly was admitted to county home.

A donation of \$50 was made to the Confederate Veteran Association.

A donation of \$50 for the next twelve months was made to W. C. Hines towards keeping blood hounds.

Bettie Grimes, Chocod township, was released from taxes on \$300 real estate erroneously charged.

The following were released from special school taxes in Farmville township: Chas. Joyner, Moses Carr, John Tyson, Lum Jackson, Mrs. T. M. Flynn, Chas. Flanagan, J. T. Bundy and Mc. D. Horton.

Prohibiting Whiskey.

Not only are they about to fix it so the stuff can't be had, but they are looking to make it a criminal offence to take any when it is obtainable.

The lower house of the Mississippi legislature has passed a law prohibiting one under the influence of drink from voting in the primary elections, and the Virginia legislature is considering a measure which provides that no teacher professor or other person in contact with students shall use any intoxicants at any time, except upon the written prescription of a physician.

In case any member of any board of visitors of any institution where such a violation has been permitted refuses to vote for the removal of the offender, such a member of the board shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and heavily fined. About the only thing left the imbibers is to take the pledge and reform.—Statesville Landmark.

Unconfirmed Reports.

Tokio, March 9.—There is no confirmation of the reported engagement between a Japanese squadron and the Vladivostok squadron, or of the re-attack on Port Arthur, or the Japanese movements in southern Manchuria. It is reported that the Hwang Chinsai fort at Port Arthur was half ruined in an earlier bombardment and that now only three of the shore batteries there can be used. It is rumored that the emperor of Corea may shortly visit the Milkado.

GENERAL NEWS.

Five railway employees were killed in a collision of trains near Kewanee, Miss.

Japan is considering the advisability of selling bonds in America and Europe to secure a loan with which to carry on the war with Russia.

Because she would not allow him to continue his attentions to her, Paul Weaver, a young farmer living near Erwina, Pa., shot his former sweetheart, Miss Mary Wyker, and then hastened to his home, three miles distant, where he placed a noose about his neck and sent a bullet through his brain.

Gorman Not in the Race.

New York, March 10.—The World this morning prints the following dispatch from Washington:

"Senator Gorman of Maryland has practically abandoned his race for the democratic presidential nomination this year. His position is merely receptive, and he has a faint hope born of knowledge that sometimes the man with the last chance wins. He refuses to discuss his presidential hopes and fears. It is said, however, that some of the strong men who were behind the Gorman boom have become convinced that their candidate does not command the popular support."

STATE NEWS.

Owing to the appearance of a case of smallpox in one of the schools in Wilmington, the health authorities ordered that pupils of all the city schools be vaccinated.

Six North Carolinians sailed from New York, Tuesday, bound for Jerusalem.

Charlotte is moving to have a city park.

Smallpox is reported in thirty-nine counties of the state.

Twenty-five of the applicants before the State Pharmaceutical Association, Tuesday, were granted licenses. Four negroes were before the board and two of them passed the examination.

Naval Battle Reported.

London, March 9.—A dispatch from Tokio says it is believed there that a decisive naval engagement has taken place in the vicinity of Vladivostok. The Japanese fleet went to Vladivostok in order to locate and attack the Russian fleet there. It is believed that the Japanese would not have withdrawn their entire squadron from before that port unless the enemy's location had been discovered. There is a strong possibility that the Japanese found the Russians in the vicinity of Possiet bay and gave them battle.

BLOW TO SALOONS.

The saloon business in North Carolina has received another severe jolt by a recent decision of the Supreme court. The decision of the court is that a town ordinance, when within its charter right, is absolute and cannot be tested by an injunction.

The opinion was on a case sent up from Washington. The aldermen of that town had adopted certain ordinances to govern the sale of whiskey in that town and placing certain restrictions around the places where it is sold. A saloon keeper instituted injunction proceedings against the town to prevent the enforcement of the ordinances. The finding of the lower court was in favor of the town. The saloon man appealed to the Supreme court, and the latter held that the ordinances in question were not unreasonable or oppressive.

The ordinances of Washington do not allow places where liquors are sold to have any screen doors, blinds, painted windows, partitions, screens, or anything that will obstruct a full view of the interior from the street, nor are back doors, side doors, trap doors, elevators or stairways permitted. No restaurant or eating tables can be run in connection with saloons, no billiard, pool or gaming tables of any kind are allowed, and no saloon can be entered or opened between 8 o'clock Saturday evening and 6 o'clock Monday morning.

The Supreme court upholds the ordinances of the town, and the court further says:

"Liquor being regarded as an evil in itself and an enemy of civilization the courts, in passing upon the validity of laws regulating or restricting its sale, will not be guided by the rule applicable to restrictions upon a business which is useful or beneficial to mankind."

The Dunn Guide prints a very uncomplimentary picture of the editor of the Washington Gazette-Messenger in refuting a charge made by the latter that closing saloons there had killed Dunn and caused the failure of two banks in that town. The Guide leaves no room to credit the correctness of the Gazette-Messenger's statement but shows conclusively that it is without foundation.

The story was sent out from Washington that Thomas Settle obtained an additional \$2,000 from Mrs. Moody, widow of the late Congressman Moody, to carry on the contest between Moody and Gudger. When interviewed about the story Mr. Settle said it is "none of the public's business." May be it is not but the public will talk about it, just the same.

How does this strike you for treatment of the negro? A mob of 2,000 infuriated citizens of Springfield, Ohio, set fire to and destroyed a district of the city occupied by negroes. This did not occur in the South, mark you.

It looks funny that most of the North Carolina political news comes by way of Washington correspondents.

No need of much worry over how the Russian fleet will get out. Give the Japs a chance and they will put it out.

Divorces again figure as a foremost subject of discussion in North Carolina newspapers, the increasing frequency of the disruption of marital relations being noted with alarm. It is observed in connection that divorces are exceedingly rare in Canada where they are obtained only by a parliamentary decree. The laxity of laws is credited with most of the blame while the method of carrying out the law is not often even so much as mentioned. The State of New York has comparatively rigid laws but allows secret decrees which permits all kinds of evasions. Canada's laws are no more strict than those of New York and it is the publicity that discourages the demand for divorces. Canada allows separations but in order that either party may marry again, the intention to apply for divorce must be published before the application is made to Parliament. Not all the evils is to be attributed to our laws, and a large share of it is directly due to the possibility of obtaining the decree "between cases in court" as one contemporary speaks of it. Laws allowing and providing for separation in place of our present laws for divorce, and then a law similar to the Canadian statute would go far in solving the vexing problem without any necessity for rigid statutes.—Charlotte Chronicle.

A Reminiscence of Cockfighting Days in the South.

What bullfighting was to the sports of Spain cockfighting was to the amusements of the old south. Great care was taken by the old and young planters in the rearing of birds for the cockpit. They were most careful in selecting well proved strains and in training them for the pit. Many of the plantations had their game poultry yards, and the gentlemen were as proud of their game birds as they were of their horses. They were always ready to pit their birds against all comers and frequently "backed" their prowess with large wagers. Nearly all the villages in the south had their cockpits, but New Orleans and Mobile were the special sporting centers for the whole south.

The real gamecock is all that the name implies. He will fight to the death; he never surrenders and never gives quarter. A whipped gamecock is pretty certain to be a dead one. From the time a brood of chickens have attained sufficient age for the little cocks to begin to try to crow the game spirit begins to make itself seen. The little birds begin to fight for the leadership of the brood, and these struggles continue from time to time until the chicks are full grown. When they have attained their full growth there is always a decisive contest, which is always a bitter one, often lasting for hours, and only saved from fatal results by the absence of spurs, which have not yet had time to grow. This is always a battle royal, and the victorious cock, with scarcely enough strength left him to stand, manages to utter a weak crow of victory and is given his place at the head of the brood and is honored by being declared "cock of the walk." Should one of the negroes be so fortunate as to witness this "big fight" he is envied by all the negroes upon the plantation and delights in showing off the "fine pints" of the cock of the walk. After this fight the cocks are put in training, which hardens them for endurance and lets them get age, both of which are very essential in the pit.—R. F. Smith, Sr., in National Magazine.
