### THE WAR NEWS.

#### Bombardment Leaves Port Arthur in Bad Plight.

Tokio, March 13.—Official and private reports both indicate that Admiral Togo's fourth attack on Port Arthur on the 10th instant was the most effective since the first assault of a month ago. One Russian torpedo boat destroyer was sunk and several Russian torpedo boats seriously damaged. The fortifications and city were submitted to a heavy bombardment lasting nearly four hours. The naval bombardments of the land works have generally been ineffective, yet the peculiar topographical conditions of Port Arthur make immunity from serious loss from bombardment almost impossible. Admiral Togo's torpedo flotilla opened the action by boldly steaming in under the batteries and successfully placing a number of mechanical mines in the harbor.

London, March 14.—The rumor of the evacuation of Port Arthur is repeated this morning from different points, but it is absolutely without confirmation.

According to the St. Petersburg correspondent of The Daily Telegraph vague rumors are current there that later telegrams describe the bombardment of Port Arthur as much more serious than has been admitted officially.

Special dispatches from Tokio and Yin Kow give reports of heavy Russian casualties at Port Arthur amounting to forty men killed and 100 wounded, but they are so conflicting in details that it is not wise to give them much credence.

In a dispatch from Tokio dated March 13 a correspondent of The Daily Telegraph says that in the latest attack on Port Arthur two Russian torpedo boat destroyers were sunk and great damage was done to the docks, forts and arsenals, including the explosion of a powder magazine.

Dalny is reported to have been almost entirely destroyed; several guns there were dismounted, and the crews of four torpedo boats in the inside harbor are said to have been deserted.

### McBee Arrested.

The matter of the receivership of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad took a new turn Monday. Attorney General Gilmer swore out an affidavit before Chief Justice Walter Clark alleging that Finch and McBee had fraudulently conspired together to unlawfully injure and damage the property of the railroad.

Judge Clark issued a bench warrant for the arrest of McBee which was sent to New Berne and he was arrested by the sheriff of Craven county and carried to Raleigh to answer the charge.

### Lightning Burns a Town.

Charlotte, N. C., March 14.—The town of Pineville, ten miles south of here, was destroyed by fire early this morning and only one business house remains. The fire is believed to have originated from a stroke of lightning during a severe thunder storm. The total loss is estimated at \$20,000 with \$10,000 insurance. The fire started in the drug store of Dr. W. K. Reid and was discovered by a negro barber.

The Kinston Free Press has a most sensible article on the dispensary as a solution of the saloon evil, from which we take the following extract:

As to the establishment of the dispensary in Kinston we think our people have settled the question, at least temporarily, in the very best way open to them. This liquor question is a practical question to be met and settled in a practical way. It was recognized that there is a strong liquor sentiment in our community. So strong indeed as to make the establishment of prohibition very doubtful and such a sentiment as would render absolute prohibition, at this stage of the game, almost a farce. This is largely the case in some other places that might be mentioned; and we believe that prohibition has been tried in Kinston with unsatisfactory results. So our people took hold of the question "open saloons or dispensary," and did the very best thing possible for them to do under the circumstances. They put the liquor traffic under the direct control of the community as a whole rather than under its indirect control. The community manages the business under the very best safeguards for morality and decency that can be devised. It ceases to live supinely as a silent partner in the business, but takes full control just as the State law regulates the sale of all poisons.

It is idle to talk about the community being any more responsible for the sale of liquor through a municipal dispensary than through open saloons where the privilege has been let out for so much money. In the sight of the Ruler of the universe the responsibility is as great in the one case as in the other. Just so is the community responsible for any and every other ill that is tolerated or not suppressed by law, and frankly, the way to eradicate an evil is not to ply to legislation to exterminate it, but to form special conditions as that the evils will be eradicated through the growth and elevation of the individual.

No man is going to be forced to do what is right, provided he does not want to do the right in the first instance. Regeneration must come from within. It may be assisted by outward conditions and circumstances, but it cannot be forced by them.

WASHINGTON CORRESPONDENCE.

WASHINGTON, D. C. Mar. 14, 1904.

Events are apparently so shaping themselves that all the democratic party will have to do is sit still and make the best use of whatever comes its way. The postoffice scandal has now assumed such gigantic proportions that it oversteps everything else, and there is a prospect of a bitter war between the legislative and executive branches of the government. Either the scandal must be probed to the bottom or the party in power will rest under the charge of being afraid to let the whole truth be known.

This new out-cropping of the postoffice scandal has caused great anxiety at the white house, and there has been a hurried consultation of leaders to devise a way out. Mr. Bristow was summoned from a sick bed, and taken to task. So serious is the situation it may disturb all the plans of the republican campaign managers, and precipitate a war between the executive and congress. It is possible a drastic investigation of the postoffice department, by a committee of the house, will result, when the whole truth will be searched out.

While congress was denouncing the Bristow report, the President was arranging with Senator Foraker of Ohio, who should fill two or three postoffices in that state. While Senator Hanna was a live these were a bone of contention, and the president refused to act, not wishing to offend either senator. No sooner is Hanna in his grave than the patronage goes to Foraker. The new Senator Dick had the good sense to keep his hands clean of such matters.

The land office frauds continue to be exposed. The effect of the Bonaparte-Woodruff investigation of civilized Indians in Indian Territory, is to discredit the commission. It has taken advantage of the ignorance of the Indians to induce them to part with their lands for less than they were worth, when they were afterwards sold to speculators at an advanced price. In view of these serious facts it is stated the commissioners will not be removed, but may continue to draw their salaries.
