#### Killed at His Door.

Kinston, N. C., March 21.—A phone message from Mewborne's store, six miles from here, states that last night at nine o'clock Jonah Mewborne, colored, was called to his door by an unknown assassin and shot. The murderer disguised his voice to imitate that of a child in distress, and when Mewborne opened his door to go to the assistance of the supposed child, the shot was fired, killing him almost instantly.

No clue is known at the present time as to the identity of the murderer further than that an enemy of the murdered man is suspected. Coroner Wooten went to the scene today and will institute a thorough investigation.

#### Mr. W. G. Lang Dead.

Mr. William G. Lang, one of the oldest and best citizens of this county, died Wednesday night at his home in Farmville.

Some weeks ago during the freeze Mr. Lang slipped down and broke his hip, and was not able to again leave his bed. Up to last week he was getting on fairly well and there were hopes of his recovery, when other complications developed and he declined rapidly until the end came.

Mr. Lang lived at Farmville many years and for a long time was a prosperous merchant. A few years ago he retired from business and was succeeded by his son, Mr. W. M. Lang. He was twice married and a widow and five children survive him. All his children, who were by his first marriage are grown. They are Mr. J. A. Lang, of Greenville; Mr. W. M. Lang, of Farmville; Mrs. Francis Joyner, of Middleburg; Mrs. J. F. Joyner; and Mrs. W. E. Mewborne, of Kinston.

No man in the county was held in higher esteem than Mr. Lang. He was a Christian, and upright man and faithful in every duty. His death is a loss to his town and county.

The highest authority that ever directed the course of man in this world says that "a good name is rather to be chosen than great riches." And the earning of a good name surely does not mean much unless that name is maintained—cherished as the highest possession of life.

**Workingmen's Homes.**

It is extremely gratifying to find that the growth of Charlotte is largely made up of homes built by working people for themselves. This is largely due to the influence of the building and loan associations and the savings banks. Any population, whether made of working people or otherwise is far better for owning the homes in which they live. It gives a feeling of identity with the community, it gives better opportunity to educate children, it gives a stronger motive to be neighborly with neighbors and conduces a higher, better and happier life. The man of the family feels that he has discharged one of the mainmost duties of a man which is to provide a home for the wife and children—not a rented home but one those may keep even after his death.

This thing of buying and paying for a home is easier than most people think it is. The rent money is a big part of it. The remainder is mostly steadiness of purpose and in a few years the debt is paid and the home is owned.—Charlotte Chronicle.

The above backs up oft repeated assertion that Greenville should have a building and loan association. Making a home owner of a citizen is helpful to him and to the town.

The Greenville REFLECTOR thus discourses:

Every citizen of a town counts but we see no need of Greensboro wasting any breath over Mr. Blackburn if he had rather claim some other place as his home.

**Examiners Named**

Governor Aycock yesterday appointed the committee of three to accompany the State Board of Internal Improvements in a thorough inspection of the condition and management of the Atlantic and North Carolina railroad.

The gentlemen named by the governor are Messrs. R. T. Gray, of Raleigh, Henry A. Page, of Aberdeen, and W. T. Lee, of Waynesville. The State Board of Internal Improvements consists, besides the governor of Messrs. B. C. Beckwith, of Raleigh, and B. W. Ballard, of Franklinton.

Mr. R. T. Gray, of Wake county, was for a long time a director of the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railroad, and also a member of the Construction Company which built that road. There is no man in the State not actively connected with the railroad business who is better posted about railroad operations of all kinds. He is also, as everybody knows, a lawyer of recognized ability.

Mr. W. T. Lee, of Haywood, is one of the most prosperous and successful merchants in western North Carolina, having acquired a competency by his large business operations in Waynesville. He was an influential member of the General Assembly of 1895. He was elected by the Legislature of 1899 a member of the State Board of Internal Improvements, then composed of one member from every congressional district. That board had control of the Atlantic and North Carolina railroad.

Mr. Henry A. Page, of Moore county, in president of the Asheboro and Aberdeen railroad and all-around business man. He is a man, who whether you agree with him or not, has the courage of his convictions, and nobody can influence him one iota when he has once made up his mind. His knowledge of practical railroading will be of the greatest value to the commission.—News and Observer.

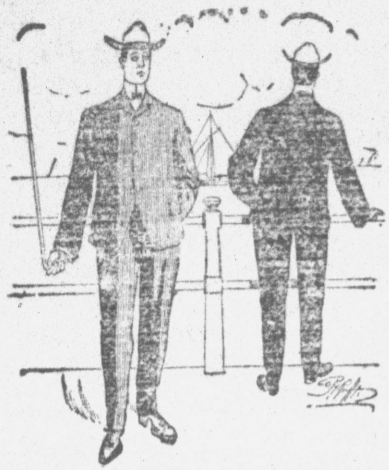

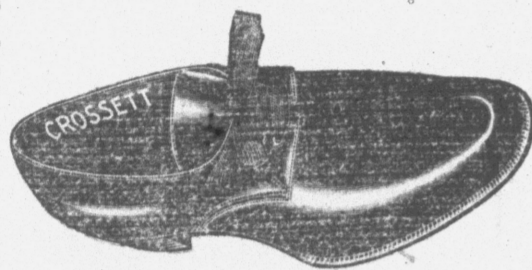

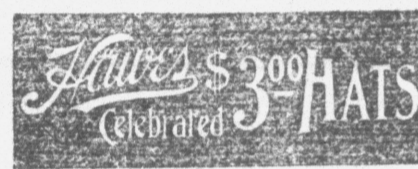
