Congressman Small has introduced a bill to establish a Federal court in the town of Washington. It would be a convenience to the people of the East for another Federal court to be established, there already being courts at Raleigh, New Bern and Elizabeth City, but Greenville being the home of the district attorney and his official headquarters being transferred here, we had hoped the additional court would come to Greenville also.

WASHINGTON CORRESPONDENCE.

WASHINGTON, D. C. Mar. 31, 1904.

Interested parties in Washington are still making a desperate effort to have congress fasten a civil pension list upon the country. It fought to fail. If clerks who have been at government desks for many years at a much higher salary than is ever paid other clerks of the same class and a good deal more than the ministers or schoolteachers of the country get, or the average farmer, are so improvident that they cannot save enough to live on by the time they are sixty or seventy, they are stopped from asking the government to take care of them. If all the superannuated, in congress and in departments, could be peremptorily retired, and new blood given a chance to show what it could do, public affairs would progress with increased satisfaction and congress would not have to indulge in so much talk.

Congress having provided a new building to be used as offices for members of the house of representatives, and senators being unprovided for, many of them having offices in a building which has been condemned as unsafe, the plan of enlarging the capitol as originally designed by the late architect, Thos. U. Walter, meets with approbation. This will give Senators the needed room and be a splendid addition to the great building. The house has appropriated half a million of dollars to begin the work, which will cost in the aggregate two and one half millions. The central portion of the east front is to be extended, giving a magnificent entrance hall to the rotunda, 108 feet long. The new addition will correspond in style to the fronts of the senate and house of representatives, and add much to the dignity of the whole building.

What will it profit a man to oppose being taxed one dollar to pay interest on \$200,000 to build roads in the county and damage his vehicles and team five times that much in one season pulling through the mud?—Burlington Herald.

It Was a Costly Smoke.

Last Thursday night night a number of jurors in the Euhanks case were standing around the cigar counter in the Central hotel office. Mr. Tom Doster stepped up and bought some cigars and presented them to the jurors. Mr. Doster was arraigned in court last Friday for that offense and Mr. N. W. Griffin, the officer in charge of the jury, was also arraigned for permitting such a thing. Both Mr. Doster and Mr. Griffin stated that they thought nothing of the matter; that no idea was entertained of offering a bribe or of tampering with the jury. The court took the view of the matter that no offense was intended and let Messrs. Doster and Griffin off upon payment of the costs.—Monroe Enquirer.

Fasting and Prayer.

In the olden time there was a habit of having occasionally a day of fasting and prayer. We never hear, in these modern times, of anything like this. We do not, at least in a public way, as distinctly refer our misfortunes or our good luck to a divine Providence with thanks or submission as the case may be, as our ancestors used to do. In this respect also we find that times have changed and naturally speculate whether they have changed for better or for worse. The reference made here is to the setting apart by the governor or some other authority in the State of a special day for fasting and prayer and not to what people may do privately or on their individual account. It is possible of course that fasting and prayer are more common now than formerly, but also more private. If this is the case, perhaps it is better so.—Charlotte Chronicle.

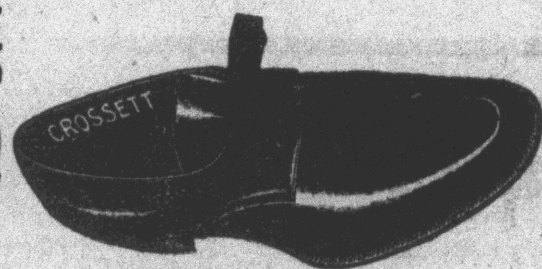
