## NEGRO RIOT AT JAMES CITY.

They Beat Deputy Sheriff Stocks Insolent.

New Bern, N. C., April 2.—The negroes of James City, or at least a portion of them, are again attempting their old game of "bluffing off the sheriff."

This morning Sheriff Biddle had a warrant for larceny against one Joshua Moore, one of the citizens of that famous negro town, and it was handed to Deputies Blackledge and Stocks to execute. Upon their arrival across the river at this settlement their man was found and arrested, and Deputy Blackledge having some business in the office of the Blades Lumber Company, went inside the company's office, leaving the prisoner in charge of Deputy Stocks.

When Blackledge's back was turned, the negro thinking he was a better man physically than Deputy Stocks, he jumped on him and for protection to himself the deputy drew his gun; the negro at this instance grabbing the weapon at the sight of it, and in the scuffle the gun was exploded, the ball taking effect in the leg of the negro. Deputy Blackledge, hearing the report of the pistol, ran out of the office to see what the trouble was, and after seeing what had happened the prisoner was taken in the lumber company's office.

While the prisoner and the deputies were in the office, some fifty or seventy-five negroes gathered around the office, and after hearing the threats Deputy Stocks was advised to go out the back window to a house that was near by until the matter was calmed over, but one of the negroes in the crowd saw him leaving and gave the alarm to the riotous crowd, who all at once took out for the departing deputy. After the deputy was inside the house the infuriated mob broke down the doors of the house in which the deputy had sought for safety, and he was dragged out and by his looks it seemed as though every one in the crowd had a lick at him for he was out into an almost unrecognizable appearance and was left for dead.

After the deputy regained consciousness, and a physician arriving in the meantime, the crowd seeing that he was still living again tried to attack him, but by the commanding power of the white men, who had gathered, they were prevented from making the second attack. Moore, the negro who was arrested, was brought over to the city and placed in jail.

Deputy Stocks is a much bruised and cut man tonight, and the outcome of his injuries are watched with eager eyes by every white resident of this city tonight.

James city is a small place just across the Trent river from this city, and its population is composed of about 2,500 negroes, there being a few white people who live there as foremen of the saw mills.

It was thought that when it was necessary for the governor to send troops here to assist the sheriff of Craven county in executing the laws of North Carolina, that they would close their bullish ways, but they are again getting back to their old ways, and it is only a question of time when their will be "something doing," in the city of James, if they keep up their riotous ways.

"Cleveland out—now who?" is the question asked by the Charlotte Observer. Parker, of course.

Blackburn got the nomination after a fashion for congress in the Eighth district, but his election is another question.

Wonder what Judge Peebles will do about that Robeson county court since the Lumberton lawyers have declared they will not appear before him.

The Danbury Reporter says there are fewer tobacco plant beds in Stokes county than for many years. That same condition exists in all the tobacco growing counties.

Mr. I. E. Avery, the city editor of the Charlotte Observer, died suddenly in that city Saturday evening. He was a son of Judge A. C. Avery, of Morganton. Mr. Avery was the best and most fluent newspaper writer in North Carolina, and there is doubt if he had a superior anywhere. His death is a great loss to journalism and to the state.

The annual consumption of calcined plaster and wall paper cannot be estimated, but it is very large. Most Chinese houses are built of cheap brick and are plastered both inside and out. Large quantities of plaster are also used for the making of Chinese graves, almost all of them being covered with it.

On her wedding day the women of Roumania gave the crown princess a sum of money with which she was to buy a present. That was ten years ago, and now the money thus received amounts to \$60,000. With this sum the princess has just bought an estate at Jassy, where will be opened a school of household economy.

It is only natural that the trade between Canada and the United States should be extensive. We cultivate similar soil, we draw riches from the same great lakes and rivers, we delve into the same mountain ranges for our minerals, we are very much alike in customs and habits, we have the same system of weights, measures and money and we have similar methods of keeping accounts and of transacting business. Hence our nearness to each other must ever induce extensive trade.

Is Crime Increasing.

Fewer social questions are asked more frequently than, what is the increase of crime? The national census bureau is seeking an answer to this inquiry. Its undertaking to secure a record of all the persons who are sentenced to the various jails, penitentiaries, and other prisons in the United States during the year 1904.

The wardens of the state prisons and the sheriffs of the counties are being requested to act as special agents to report certain facts concerning every person delivered into their custody. Some counties have not been heard from. In some perhaps there are no jails, in others perhaps the local jails are no longer used, in still others the sheriffs have

possibly neglected the matter. But the records of the census bureau and the resulting statistics will not be complete until all are heard from, and it is hoped that the pressure of other business will not cause the the sheriff of any county to block this most important inquiry.

Doing One's Best.

This habit of always doing one's best enters into the very marrow of one's heart and character. It affects one's bearing one's self possession. The man who does everything to a finish has a feeling of serenity. He is not easily thrown off his balance. He has nothing to fear, and he can look the world in the face because he feels conscious that he has not put shoddy into anything, that he has had nothing to do with shame and that he has always done his level best. The sense of efficiency, of being master of one's craft, of being equal to any emergency, the consciousness of possessing the ability to do with superiority whatever one undertakes, will give soul satisfaction which a half heated, slipshod workers never knows.

When a man feels throbbing within him the power to do what he undertakes as well as it can possibly be done and all his faculties say "Amen" to what he is doing and give their unqualified approval to his efforts—this is happiness, this is success. This buoyant sense of power spurs the faculties to their fullest development. It unfolds the mental, the moral and the physical forces, and this very growth, the consciousness of an expanding mentality and of a broadening horizon, gives an added satisfaction beyond the power of words to describe. It is a realization of nobility, the divinity of the mind.—Success.

Call for State Convention. The following call for the State convention has been issued from the headquarters of the Democratic State committee: "At a meeting of the Democratic State executive and central committee in Raleigh, March 17th, the State convention of the party was called to meet at Greensboro, Thursday June 23, at noon, to nominate candidates for governor and other state officers, two associate justices of the Supreme court, and two presidential electors at large, and to elect four delegates and four alternates at large to the national convention of the party in St. Louis, July 6th. At said meeting of the committee it was resolved that the order of business of the convention should be as follows; 1, Organization; 2, Adoption of resolutions and platform; 3, Election of delegates to the national convention; 4, Nomination of candidates. The convention of delegates to the State convention from each congressional district is hereby called to meet in Greensboro at eleven o'clock, June 22, to elect a vice president of the convention, one member of the committees on credentials, rules and order of business, permanent organization, and platform and resolutions; four members of the Democratic State committee, and two delegates and two alternates to the national convention. All Democrats are cordially invited to attend the precinct conventions to be called by the various county committees and participate in electing delegates to the county conventions. 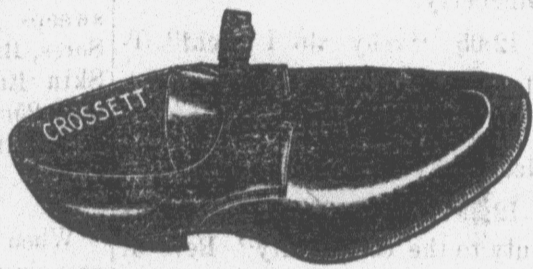
