IS HIS THE HAND?

Judge Charged With Arson at Rocky Mount and Elsewhere.

Rocky Mount, N. C., April 5.—The citizens of Rocky Mount and vicinity have been in quite a fever of excitement since yesterday morning caused by the arrest of George Judge, alias Ernest W. Brooks, for arson. He was arrested by two detectives who have been here for several weeks, working on the case.

It will be remembered that on the night of March 1st, the bank of Rocky Mount, opera house, the postoffice and several handsome brick stores were burned, and that about the time this fire was gotten under control, the fire alarm was turned in from the third ward, and fire was discovered in the Second Regiment band armory, which was extinguished with light loss.

The work of an incendiary was so plain in these two fires that detectives were employed to work on the case with the result above.

The man arrested came here about two months ago from Wilmington, N. C., and gave his name as Ernest W. Brooks. He loafed around town for several weeks, then went to work in the Rocky Mount cotton mills, where he was still employed at the time of his arrest. It was learned after his arrest that he was run out of Wilmington for being suspected of setting fire to several buildings and that he now has a brother in the penitentiary for stealing a horse and turning in false fire alarms in that city.

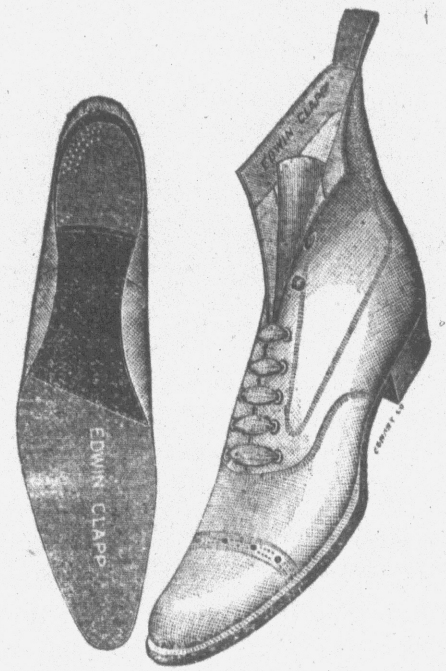
He was given a preliminary hearing this morning before Mayor Thorp, and the evidence was such that he was sent on to court without bail.

Judge, or Brooks, as he was known here, is not a bad looking fellow at all. He also dresses very neatly.

There were four fires during the month of March that can be traced to him with strong evidence. There seems to be no motive for the fires that have occurred here, except pure unadulterated deviltry.

Tarboro, N. C., April 5.—George Judge alias Ernest Brooks, was brought here this afternoon by the police of Rocky Mount and lodged in the county jail. Judge is charged with burning the Masonic Temple of Rocky Mount and other buildings. The prisoner is a light built man and presents a good appearance. He has been in Rocky Mount only a short time having come there (it is stated,) from Wilmington.

A Fortune is Won and Lost.

"Sell! No, you wouldn't sell any more than I did," said the stranger at the Buford. "I was thousands ahead and I got delirious, or may be I was just a plain fool. I didn't know very much about speculating. I had played poker, and had the same experience that every man has who is not a professional. I had won as much as several hundred dollars in a night, and the next day I had gone out and spent my winnings recklessly and foolishly. A few nights later I lost as much or a good deal more than I had won. In other words, I threw away what I won and put my nose to the grindstone to pay what I lost, and this did not take into account the tax on nerves and health.

"But I had never speculated until last fall. Everybody was talking cot'on and as I happened to have a good deal of extra money at the time I bought about \$700 worth of contracts. And cotton went up. I was interested over the first winning. I soon became absorbed. I paid no attention to my family. I thought only about cotton. I got \$5,000 ahead. I held on. My profits rose to \$8,000 and I began to make plans for the future. I used to figure with a pencil what I would buy. So I was in an intensely emotional, excitable state and could hardly sleep. The market! That was all I thought about.

"My profits went up to \$15,000. I kept all my winnings in—took nothing out—kept pyramiding. Some of my cooler friends came to me and begged me to close out my contracts, but I was wild.

"I got \$18,000 ahead. That was more money than I ever expected to have. It never occurred to me that I could lose. As I look back upon it now I know I was insane. I was so certain that I was coming out winner that I made positive plans as to what I should buy and how I should invest the money. My profits kept climbing. Past \$20,000 they went, and I began to lose flesh and go unshaven.

"The more I won the greedier I became. When I began I would have sworn that when I got \$5,000 ahead I would stop, but at the \$25,000 profit mark I was a furious bull, screaming that cotton must go to 20 cents. And one day I was \$29,000 ahead of the game. Mind you, that was my money. All I had to do was to call on my broker for a settlement. And that was all the money I really needed. I got a good salary and have an economical sensible family. That \$29,000 meant a collegiate education for my boys and girls, comfort for my wife and comparative luxury for all of us. I knew that. I now look back with utter amazement upon my feelings at that time. My family knew what I was doing, and they begged me to close out and be content with my small fortune. To all such advice I turned a deaf ear. I was a sort of man-

iac. It seemed such an easy way to make money. The bulls must continue to win, I thought. I was to be rich—rich! My pulse was too quick and there was fever in my head, but I was ecstatic

"Then the slump came. You remember it—remember how it came, to ruin the joys of Christmas. The market broke and soon I was staggering around like an imbecile. I was in a new game and I didn't know what to do. I didn't know how to protect myself; I had no adequate myself as to margins. I just stood and gaped in terror at the market and became completely demoralized. I lost my nerve, and when the market had reached a point where I was only \$300 to the good I crawled in like a whipped cur to my broker and closed forever with the cotton market.

"And I don't get over that experience, I try to think that I came out \$300 to the good and I was fortunate at that, but it's no use. Day and night I am thinking of that lost wealth. I don't get as much pleasure out of simple things as I used to do. That gambling experience will hurt me till I die. It is a terrible thing to play with unseen money, my friends.—Charlotte Observer.

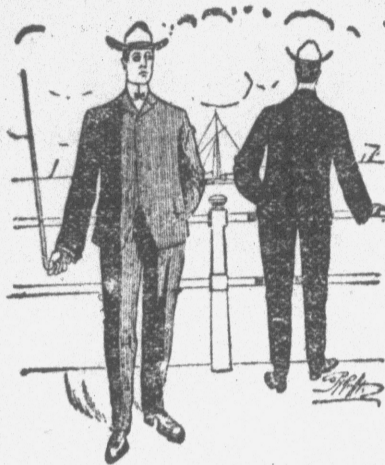

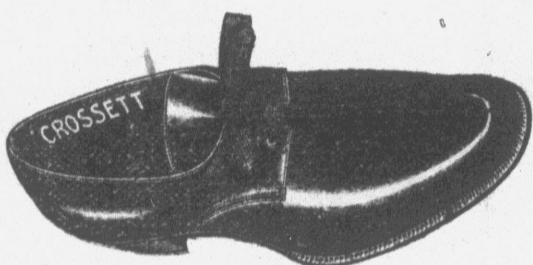
