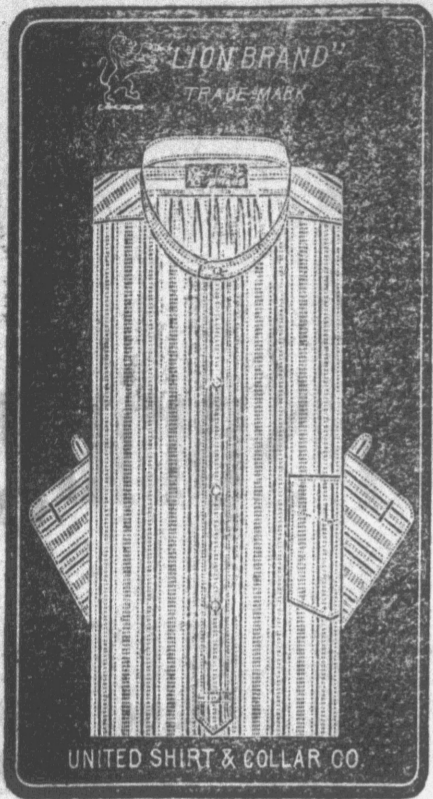

On Tuesday the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Greenville Banking & Trust Co. was held in the office of the bank. A satisfactory showing of the year's business was made, and the present officers were unanimously re-elected. They are L. I. Moore, president; W. M. Smith, vice president; R. J. Cobb, cashier; C. S. Carr, teller and book keeper.

The statement of this bank at the close of business March 28th, so published in another column, shows its splendid condition. These comparative figures for the last three years are also interesting and indicate how rapidly the bank has grown in popular favor. March 28th, 1902, the deposits were \$36,216.93; March 28th, 1903, \$75,086; March 28th, 1904, \$108,644.79. It is a strong institution and well officered.

RUSSIAN BATTLESHIP DESTROYED.

Vice Admiral Makaroff and Crew of 500 Perish.

St. Petersburg, April 13.—The following official dispatch has been received here from Rear Admiral Grigorovitch, the commandant at Port Arthur, addressed to the Emperor:

"Port Arthur, April 13.—The Petropavlovsk struck a mine, which blew her up and she turned turtle. Our squadron was under Golden Hill. The Japanese squadron was approaching. Vice Admiral Makaroff evidently was lost. Grand Duke Cyril was saved. He is slightly injured. Captain Jakovleff was saved, though severely injured as were five officers and thirty-two men, all more or less injured.

"The enemy's fleet has disappeared. Real Admiral Prince Ouktomsky has assumed command of the fleet."

St. Petersburg, April 13.—The awful disaster of the battleship Petropavlovsk at Port Arthur, with the loss of almost her entire crew of over 600 men, and the death of Vice Admiral Makaroff, has been a terrific blow. It would have fallen less heavily if the ship and the commander-in-chief had been lost in battle, but as the result of another accident following upon the heels of a succession of tragedies of which the Port Arthur fleet has been the victim, it has created something like consternation.

"Reverses we can stand," said a prominent Russian, "but to have the Petropavlovsk meet the fate of the Boyarin and others is heart-breaking."

If the Russian report of the affair is true, the Japs have nothing to do but keep cruising around with their fleet and in due course of time the Russians will finish blowing themselves up and end the war.

The Russians may make the claim that their best battleship was blown up by one of their own mines, but we are inclined to the belief that the frisky Japs run up a torpedo boat and knocked a hole in her.

Diver Held Fast Under Sixty Feet of Water.

Boonton, N. J.—William Hoar a diver, is imprisoned and probably dead sixty feet below the surface of the Boonton water reservoir, having been sucked into an opening by the rushing water at that depth after having gone down in his diving armor in an endeavor to shut off the water. Divers say they cannot live more than twenty-four hours under water at that depth, but Hoar has been at the bottom of the reservoir since 3 o'clock Monday afternoon. All day divers and others have been trying to rescue Hoar, but in vain. His signals were heard up to noon today, but after that time no response came from him in answer to signals from above, although the air is still being pumped down to him in the faint hope that he may yet be alive.

In the middle of a four-foot pipe at the bottom of the reservoir is a gate valve which got out of order and could not be closed. A great ball was sent down in the expectation that it would be sucked into the pipe, and thus stop the rush of water so the gates could be repaired. The ball was sucked into the pipe, but a four-inch chain got entangled with it and there was still a big leak. Hoar was sent down to fill in the openings with sand bags. It was while putting these sand bags in place that Hoar's left leg was sucked into the opening and held fast by the sand bags. He signalled to the helpers above to pull him up, and they pulled, but they could not budge him, and finally another diver had to be sent for. He was brought from New York by special train and went down and endeavored to pull Hoar away from his perilous position. The diver, William Olsen, worked for five hours endeavoring to get Hoar loose, but he finally had to give up and go to the surface for more help. Hoar recognized Olsen when he went down and shook his hand as a token that he understood him and that he knew Olsen was doing his best. Olsen himself was caught in the suction and had one hand crushed. More divers are at work tonight. It is believed Hoar is dead.

Senator Simmons has placed himself squarely and actively on record in favor of government aid in the construction of good roads. The North Carolina Senator says he proposes to devote some careful study to the question this summer.

As the time for the various municipal elections over the country draws nigh, it is well enough for the conservative and thoughtful citizens of each town to give the matter some care. The tendency to treat a town election as an occasion for having fun is one that should be checked.

A town's business is as serious a matter as any other business, and should be approached and managed seriously and practically. Of course unseemly and hurtful factional bitterness should be avoided, but to do this does not require that an election be turned into a frolic.—Gastonia Gazette.

There are some papers in North Carolina that keep liquor advertisements constantly before their readers. They tell about how many "full quarts" can be had from somewhere out of the state for so many dollars. And these sucker advertisements usually have a clause "no marks to indicate contents of package." It is a well known fact that there are lots of folks who want to keep their liquor deviltry a secret and these papers and these liquor sellers are working together to help on this calamity. Robbed The Grave

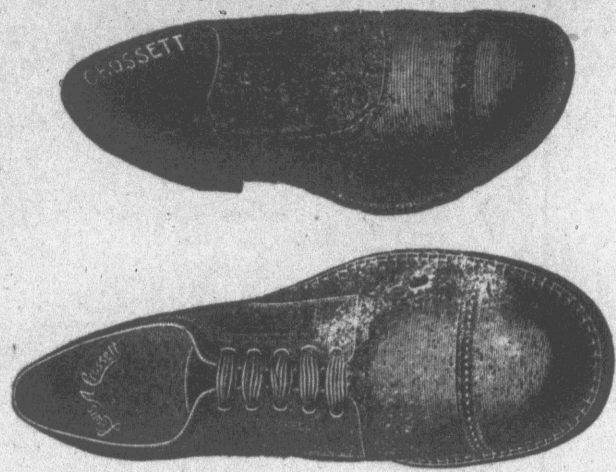
