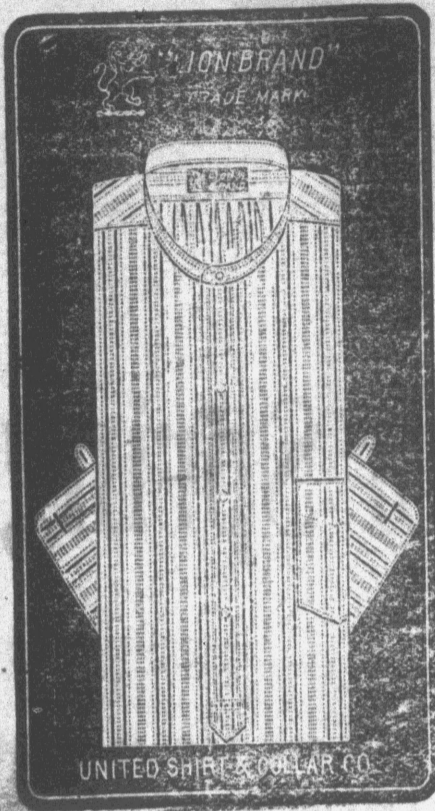

MONDAY AFTERNOON, APRIL 18, 1904.

Wrong doings of government officials is coming near home.

Hicks and Devoe both struck pretty close to this bad spell of weather.

Durham officers are now arresting the non-vaccinated of the city's population. Wonder if the jail will have to be enlarged?

Not in history has an administration been marked by more corruption among officials than since Roosevelt has been president.

Crum's nomination as collector at Charleston has again been postponed, but he continues to hold down the office and draw the salary.

There is more or less speculation as to what the investigation of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad by the committee will develop. It is well enough to wait and see.

Newspaper correspondents are telling too much for the Russians, and the edict has gone forth that correspondents using wireless telegraphy in giving the war news will be treated as spies and shot.

If the democratic congressmen fail to get a showing up of the corruption in the departments at Washington, it will be because of the administration whitewashing.

If any North Carolina folks lose their votes through neglect in paying their poll tax by the first of May, it will not be because the newspapers have failed to give ample warning.

Maj. H. A. London has written a strong letter to the press advocating the nomination of Maj. Chas. M. Stedman for governor. Maj. Stedman was a brave soldier and has been of great service to his state.

Capt. W. H. Green, assistant general manager of the Southern Railway, died in Washington City Saturday. This is the second prominent official of the Southern road to die in a short while and both of them were well known in North Carolina.

We had the pleasure of hearing Rev. B. W. Spillman lecture at Winterville, Sunday afternoon, and it was a gem. His subject was "The Value of Meditation," and he gave most timely advice to both old and young. He said that in the busy rush and whirl of the world people do not stop to think. The person who desires to amount to anything should have a place of retirement for a short while each day, a "camp solitude" to which he can withdraw and shut out the world for the time and be alone with his thoughts and God. Just think. Think of your life, what is it and what will be the end thereof. While thus musing the fire's are kindled for life's work. The highest ideals are formed in these moments of quiet reflection and you go forth prepared to do something for the world. Think of what is to be your occupation in life, and after deciding stick to your ideal and do your best.

Russian officers are advising their government to abandon Port Arthur. If this step had been taken some time ago Russia might have been several ships better off. In fact if Russia would pull off entirely and go home she might save the Japs the trouble of licking her and sending her back badly crippled.

That was a big fraud unearthed by the Federal court at Greensboro, showing that revenue officers in this state through collusion with a whiskey rectifying concern at Milton had swindled the government out of about \$30,000. No doubt if an investigation was made of the distilleries in the state similar frauds, on a smaller scale, could be detected at most, if not all, of them.

Every man who is engaged in farming ought to buy his land this year, if he does not already own it. Cotton will, in all probability, be comparatively high for the next several years. This paper stated only a day or so ago that some of the best farmers in Wake county are now picking out the last of their cotton crop. This is suggestive that the last of big cotton crops is at hand. There is not sufficient labor to cultivate a large cotton crop, and if cultivated, it could not be picked out. This condition of affairs will tend to keep up the price of cotton, and when cotton is high is the best time to buy and pay for a farm.—Raleigh Times.

A Feature of All Big Picture Sales in New York City.

One feature of all the big picture sales held in this city is the obliging man who starts the bidding. He usually sits in the first or second row in front of the auctioneer and, to judge by the variety of the opening bids, is a remarkably good judge of the market value of paintings, be they water colors or works in oil. If the canvas put on the easel is not a valuable one he will call out, for example, "Twenty-five dollars!" "Twenty-five dollars, he says," repeats the auctioneer. "Twenty-five dollars for this fine work by Peter Paul Jones."

Then some one will break in with a raise of \$5, and the auctioneer's tone changes from one of polite commiseration over the starter's low opening to one of interest.

When the really desirable paintings are announced, however, the starter takes a rest. From the sides, middle and rear of the auction room comes a volley of bids that causes the auctioneer to lean on his desk and say: "Go on. I'll let you do my work among yourselves." But he doesn't, for when the first burst of bidding stops he takes up the refrain of the last bid until he has reached the end of the buyer's estimation of the worth of the painting.

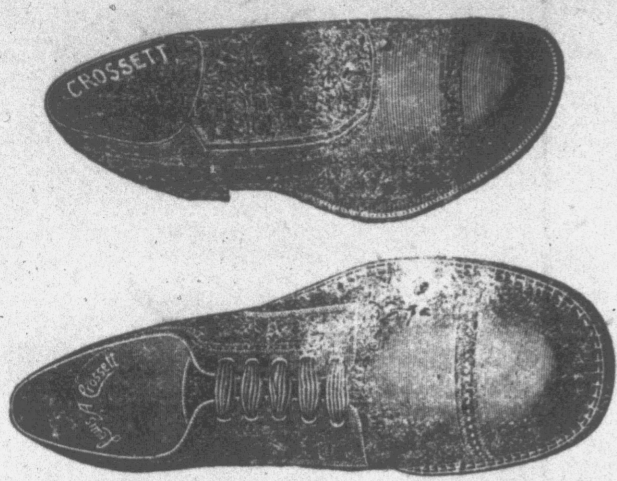

Body of the Dead Diver Recovered.

New York, April 16.—This afternoon, 95 1/2 hours after being caught in the pipe at the bottom of the reservoir at Bonton, N. J., the body of Diver William Hoar was brought to the surface, having been freed a short time before from the heavy ball which held the man's legs fast. During the entire days crews of men, in relays kept a current of air going down to the imprisoned diver in the small hope that some life might still remain in the body, even had such a terrible strain. The body was released today after Diver Rice had gone down a shaft under water 60 feet and repaired the original break in the pipe. The time occupied by Rice in stopping the flow of the water and the suction that was holding the big ball in place was about eight hours. It is believed that if the plan finally adopted had been followed when it was first found that Hoar was caught between the pipe and the ball, the man's life would have been saved.

An examination showed that Hoar's legs had not been broken. The body was in good condition and contrary to expectation the face wore a calm expression.
