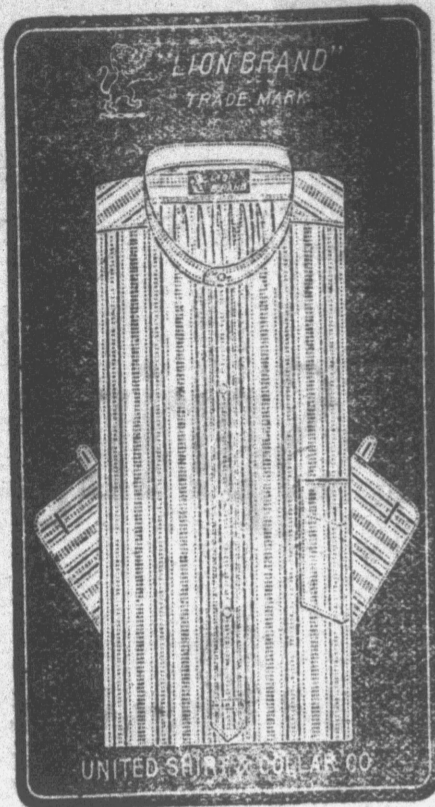

Winter don't seem in any hurry to haul down the flag and quit.

The Mississippi river is now engaged in its annual spring stunts.

If the republicans continue talking the balance of the state will find out more about Blackburn than was known before.

One would think from reading the Durham Herald that a large majority of the people of that county are candidates for register of deeds.

About now is cotton planting time, and we feel like saying that the farmer whose entire dependence for a money crop is placed on it will likely be disappointed.

While holding court in Ashe county Judge Neal personally visited the county home. He stated that he found the premises in a condition that was a disgrace to the county and state. The county commissioners were indicted for allowing the home to be in such bad light.

We have heard of billion dollar congresses, but what the one now nearing a close lack of reaching that figure is not much. In round members the figures reach \$700,000,000, which shows that the republican administration knows how to waste the public money.

We hope the Atlantic Coast Line has no grudge against Greenville, yet the service given down this way seems to indicate that it has. There is not a branch road on the system that has more miserable service than this one. The people who suffer by this discrimination go right on submitting to it.

We thought Mecklenburg county was among the wealthiest and best-to-do in the state, but the people up that way must be very poor or else they are very slack in their willingness to bear their part of the burden of taxation. The Charlotte News has been making an investigation of the tax books of the county, and makes the astonishing statement that out of about 5,500 listed polls in the county fully 2,000 of them have failed to pay. Of these delinquents Charlotte township furnishes 1,200, the city alone having 1,000 of them. This is a poor showing for a great county, and we doubt if another county in the state is as bad.

Anti-Saloon League Wants Men Elected For State Offices who will Support The Watta Act.

Editor J. W. Bailey, chairman of the State Anti-Saloon League, has sent out letters to people throughout the state in which is a declaration of hope such as has never before been sounded in North Carolina.

The following is the letter in full: "To the Friends of Temperance: "The temperance cause has made great progress in North Carolina and the prospects are brighter today than they have ever been. We have reason to hope that in a few

more years we shall have the last saloon and distillery out of the state and the doors barred and locked against them forever.

"At this time I wish to make record here of the prayers of the people. God is in the work that we are doing. He has been and is now our help. Let us not cease to pray to Him. Nothing has so encouraged me as the receipt of thousands of letters assuring me that God's children are praying. In this spirit we may confidently confront all opposition with the challenge of David. "Who is this uncircumcised Philistine that he should defy the armies of the living God?"

"Let me put our ardent friends on their guard. A mistake in this political year will do us great harm. Let us not make threats or encourage bolting. It is wisdom to go into the primaries of our parties and do our best, and if we shall be disappointed let us abide in the ship in hope that at length the helm may fall into truer hands. We must be patient. Our cause is worth fighting for not one but many years.

"Let us strive earnestly for the nomination of good and true men, who will support the Watta act; the anti-jug law and pass a bill to protect towns of 500 population and less from distilleries and saloons.

"Meanwhile let us not forget our obligation to encourage and aid in the enforcement of the laws that we have and by no means let us omit our duty to practice and to preach personal temperance.

"Wherever possible get up local rallies. Let us have county conventions, town meetings and temperance picnics throughout our commonwealth this year. By no means may we so effectually do our work.

"I write this letter to you because I know you are a friend of temperance. I rely upon your valued support.

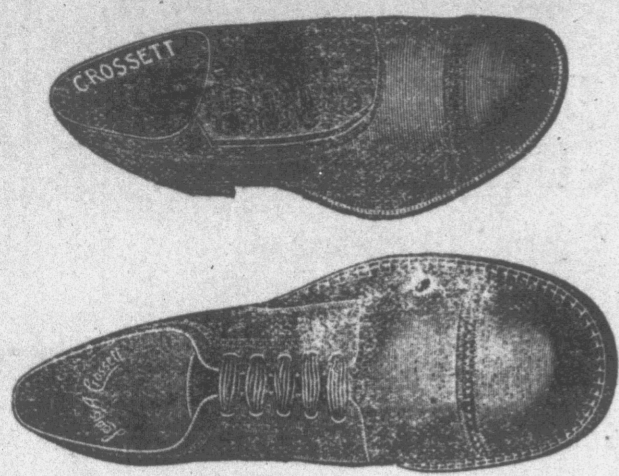
