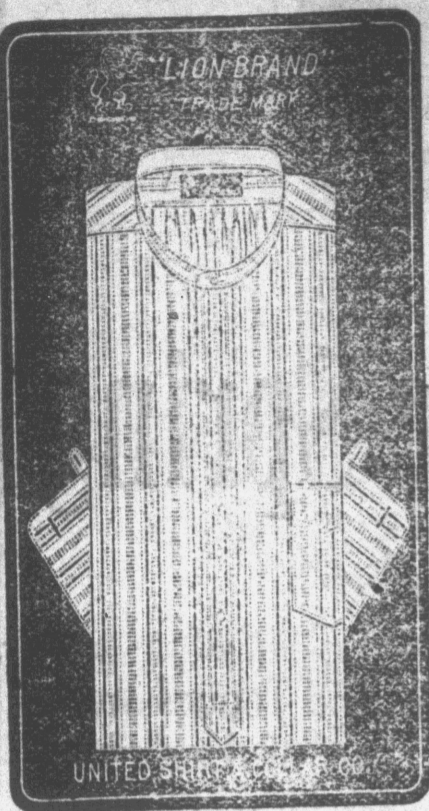

#### KILLING NEAR WASHINGTON.

Greenville Young Man Fires the Fatal Shot.

[Special to Reflector.]

Washington, N. C. April 21.—John Rue, a young man 25 or 30 years of age, was killed yesterday afternoon about 3 miles from town, on the Cow Head road, as the result of a difficulty between him and James Moore, of Greenville and John Reid, of Washington. Moore fired the fatal shot. Rue only lived a few minutes. After being shot he placed his hand over the wound in his breast and said to John Kinion, a bystander "Take me to town, I am dying." These were his last words.

Rue was a married man whose home was in Elizabeth City. He came to Washington a few days ago to visit his parents.

Moore and Reid both came back to town and surrendered to the sheriff. They were placed in jail to await the preliminary trial.

The following particulars of the tragedy were obtained from one of those present: Maud Martin and Mamie Hill, two women of bad reputation, had gone together in a buggy out in the direction of Cow Head spring. They were soon followed by John Kinion, formerly of Greenville, who is doing a livery business here, and Rue in another buggy. Later as these were leaving the spring, they met Moore and Reid on bicycles and all stopped in the road. Rue was quarrelling with one of the women and was so abusive that she began crying. Reid spoke to Rue about cursing the woman when Rue picked up a club and made an assault on Reid, striking him two blows across the head. Moore went up to separate them and stop the trouble when Rue turned on him with the club striking him several blows. Moore retreated and Rue followed him still striking with the club, when Moore drew a gun and shot him.

LATER—At the preliminary trial before Justice Mayo, this afternoon, the warrant was dismissed as to Reid, and Moore was bound over to the next Superior court in the sum of \$600.

Young Moore is well connected and is a son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Moore who lives just west of Greenville. He was always quiet and peaceable. The people generally here sympathize with him and his parents in the trouble into which he has fallen. His father went to Washington today.

#### NEW BANK IN NORFOLK.

A Pitt County Young Man President.

The stockholders of the newly organized Mercantile Bank met this afternoon and elected officers and directors and issued a call for the first half of the \$50,000 capital stock of the bank.

Mr. C. C. Cobb was elected president; Mr. J. G. McNeal, of Garysburg, N. C., vice president, and Mr. R. E. Thompson, cashier. The board of directors consists of Messrs. C. C. Cobb, J. Leon Wood, J. G. McNeal, Frank E. Wilcox and L. L. Williams.

The Mercantile Bank already has its quarters in readiness for immediate occupancy, and will open its doors for business on Monday, April 25. The bank will occupy the Atlantic street front of the Virginia-Carolina building, which was formerly occupied by the brokerage offices of Cobb Bros. and Company. It will conduct a general business of a bank of savings, discount and deposits.

The capital stock of the new

bank is held by 73 stockholders, among whom may be pointed out some of the most influential business men in this community and North Carolina.

The officers of the Mercantile Bank are men well known in Norfolk and in Tidewater Virginia and North Carolina. Mr. C. C. Cobb, the president of the bank is a young man, a native of North Carolina. He came to Norfolk about 14 years ago and engaged in the commission and brokerage business under the firm name of Cobb Bros. and Killiam. In 1892 Mr. Gilliam withdrew from the firm, and a few years later the firm, then as now Cobb Bros. and Company, dropped the commission feature of its business and engaged in a general stock brokerage business.

By conservative and straight forward business methods the firm has grown in strength and influence and is today looked upon as one of the strongest brokerage concerns in the state.

The Mercantile Bank is entirely distinct from the firm of Cobb Bros. and Company, and while conducted in the same building, the two will have no connection with each other.—Norfolk Dispatch, 19th.

Senator Simmons has expressed the opinion that the delegates from North Carolina to the national convention should be instructed. He thinks the delegates will be in favor of Parker anyway, but deems it best to instruct them.

If success on the diamond is any indication of an advance in educational methods at colleges, North Carolina must be shaking off illiteracy at a rapid rate.—Charlotte Observer.

ONE REASON FOR LYNCHINGS.

The Greensboro Record says: Law abiding citizens who sometimes have to work like Trojans to prevent a lynching get very little thanks for it. When the negro Alfred Daniels was arrested for the brutal murder of the father of Senator Simmons it was a plain case and the people were in the humor to lynch him, but Senator Simmons plead with the crowd and finally saved the wretch to be tried by due process of law. This was done and he was quickly convicted. Then his attorney went to the Supreme Court with it, where the verdict was approved. Now his attorney is making efforts to get into the Supreme court of the United States on the ground that there was not a negro's name in the box from which the jury was drawn. The incident moves The Washington Post to say:

"And now, by the way of discouraging adherence to orderly judicial processes, and, to the same extent, stimulating mob violence, this attorney comes to Washington seeking the delay if not the total denial of justice. It is not claimed that the accused is innocent or that his crime is open to the condonation of circumstances. The plea is that the jury was composed exclusively of white men! The false and impudent inference sought to be suggested is, of course, evident enough. It is that the jury would have been more honest and intelligent and virtuous had it been constituted in

part or in whole of negroes. And the underlying proposition equally impudent and preposterous—is that the negro, as such, has an inherent right to representation in the jury box. The negroes complain with bitter vociferation when a law or a custom differentiates them from the whites in the matter of social privileges. Now they complain with equal bitterness because the law does not treat them as a race apart when it comes to the impugning of juries.

"We pass this silly and offensive issue, understanding, as we do, that the negro has been encouraged to it by his own devouring vanity and the incendiary advice of so-called leaders. What we wish to point is the perious folly of discouraging the law abiding spirit and suggesting to the mob that the only way to make sure of punishment in case of crime is to inflict it then and there. There will be—there can be—but one result of convincing any community that it cannot depend for its protection upon the courts."

The year 1904 is remarkable for the prominence of its Fridays. To begin with, the year started off on Friday. All Fools day came in on Friday. There are five months in the year in which Friday gets in the extra day, viz: January, April, July, September and December. There are 53 Fridays in the year. The anniversary of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence falls on Friday, May 20th. St. John's day will be on Friday, June 24th. The month with the glorious fourth in it comes in on Friday. Autumn begins on Friday, September 23rd. In 1781 Lord Cornwallis surrendered on the 21st day of October. That is a Friday this year. St. Simon and St. Jude's day is on Friday, October 28th. The greatest meteoric shower ever known was on November 18, 1833. That day is a Friday in 1904. And during the year there are numerous Friday Ember days. Let us hope that a year in which Friday plays such an important part may be a year of happiness, peace and prosperity.—Weldon News.

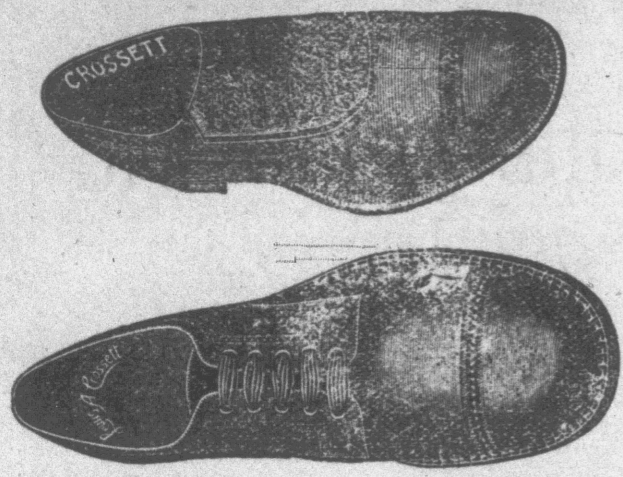
