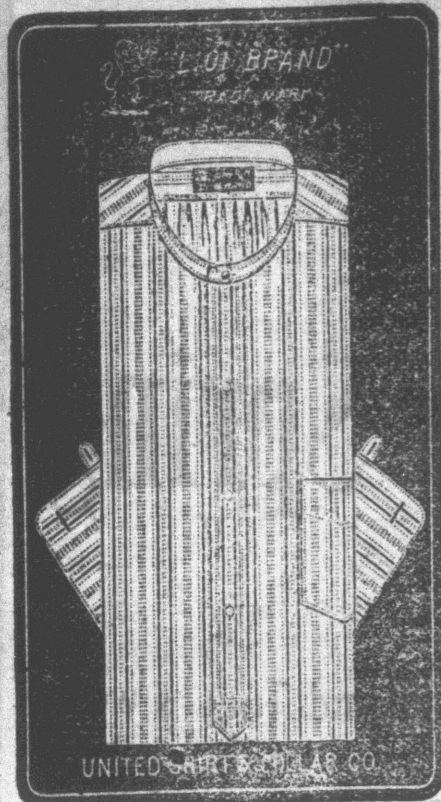

Reports from Washington say the Parker boom is worrying the republicans in congress. Let them worry, who cares?

The republicans of the North Carolina district nominated H. G. Ewatts as their candidate for congress on first ballot.

The Tarboro Southerner wants the next legislature to repeal the crop lien law. The homestead should go along with it if it goes.

Rumor has it that the Atlantic Coast Line, instead of the Goulds, is the real purchaser of the Norfolk & Southern railroad which was sold a few days ago.

We all think the cool weather and frosts in this section the last few days is severe weather for the time of year, but when it is compared with the snow storms and blizzards that prevail in the North and West we yet have much to be thankful for.

That sounds more like it. Rev. J. A. MacKelway, editor of the Charlotte News and Mr. W. I. Underwood, city editor of the Charlotte Chronicle, have published a joint card in which they mutually agree to withdraw all personal strictures made upon each other in the columns of their respective papers. This is respectfully referred to the editors of the two Raleigh morning dailies as a good example to emulate.

Judge Parker's Tastes.

A correspondent of the New York World says that while the convention was in session at Albany, "a friend called on him at his home in Esopus and Judge Parker read to him from the life and times of Thomas Jefferson a description of the battle between North Carolina patriots and Governor Tryon's troops for years before the Yankee minnate-men faced Pitcairn's muskets at Lexington." He will go into the White House, therefore, with Tom Watson's splendid pen-portrait of the courage and early devotion to freedom shown by the North Carolina patriots. It's a fine story and a true one, if some North Carolinians have failed to give full credit to the noble pioneers in the struggle for liberty, and Tom Watson has told the story with the touch of genius. We do not doubt that it thrilled Judge Parker, as it must thrill any genuine man who reads it. Judge Parker's tastes are Jeffersonian—the best sign in the future president.—Raleigh News & Observer.

North Carolina Fire Losses.

A fire insurance man who keeps up with the records tells The Chronicle that North Carolina suffered a greater proportionate loss by fire during the first three months of 1904 than for several years. Of late years the fire losses in this state have been below the general average and the insurance companies have made money on North Carolina risks, but the record 1904 has started in to make promises to change all this.—Charlotte Chronicle.

Effect of Temperance Laws.

"Col. W. H. Osborn, of Greensboro, gives valuable testimony to the effect of temperance laws."

This remark was made yesterday by Rev. Livingston Johnson, Mr. Osborn, who is president of the Keeley Institute at Greensboro, was in the city yesterday and Mr. Johnson had talked with him.

"What did he say?" I asked Mr. Johnson.

"Why this, 'I have had fewer patients at Keeley Institute since Christmas than has been the previous record, and I attribute this to the number of temperance towns in North Carolina.' That is what he said."

"Anything else?" I asked. "Yes. He told me that he would be glad to see the day come when he could go out of business. His business is to reclaim men from drunkenness and he would rejoice at this being done at wholesale."

There is a volume of good news in the words of Col. Osborn. His work is such that he knows what he is talking about, and his testimony is that temperance laws are doing work in men's lives in North Carolina.—Raleigh News and Observer.

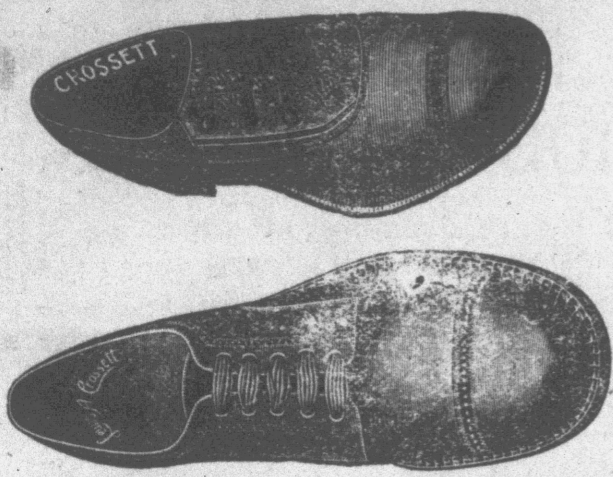
