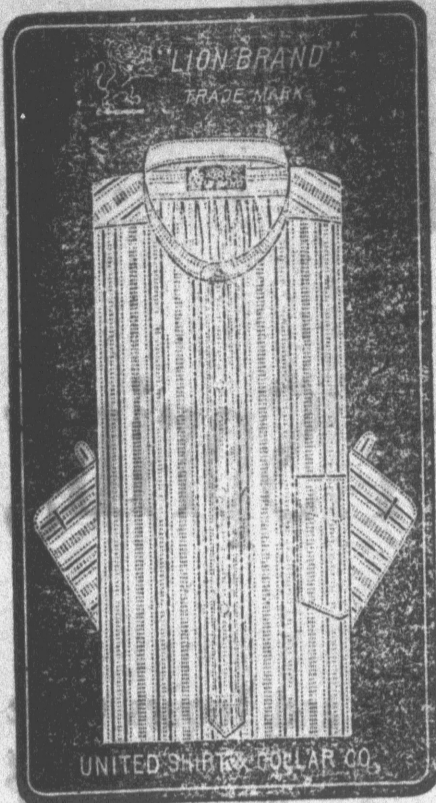

Russia is getting up nerve and has declared that she will entertain no proposals for peace but will fight the war to a finish.

Charlotte is showing some of the big folks around this week. Ex-Vice-President Adlai E. Stevenson and Lieut. Richmond Pearson Hobson are both guests of the city.

President Roosevelt declares that Elihu Root is the greatest man in the United States, present company of course excepted. Whereupon Secretary Shaw, John Hay, and Senator Lodge have all written to him and asked him if he said so.

The tornada in the West has commenced early this season to get in its work of devastation. Kansas and Indian Territory have both suffered disastrously in the last few days, there being large loss of both life and property.

The good work of Congressman John H. Small is heard of again. The house has passed his bill authorizing the erection of a light house and fog signal on Dimond Shoals, off Cape Hatteras. If the light house stands five years and proves a success the contractor is to be paid \$590,000. No place on the coast needs a light house more than Cape Hatteras, but all efforts heretofore to build one there have proven failures.

A learned professor now comes forward to prove that man is descended from reptiles and not monkeys. Probably the serpent which beguiled Eve with such insignificant graft as an apple was after all a man. To this day some women denounce men as vipers, and strange to say, men "see snakes" oftener than women do. —Willmington Star.

THE BUILDING AND LOAN ASSOCIATION.

THE REFLECTOR has several times referred to the need of a building and loan association in Greenville, expressing the belief that one good help to the town arising therefrom would be enabling wage-earners to become home-owners, in which capacity they would be worth much more to the town as citizens than if they continued as mere tenants.

An idea of what such associations have done for Charlotte is thus told by the Charlotte Chronicle:

"No influence has done more to build up Charlotte than her three building and loan associations. The local and home institutions of other cities and towns have also done wonderful good work in furnishing the means by which working people, merchants, preachers, and others may save something in regular installments or buy a house and pay for it in regular installments and not pay any profit to anybody on the transaction. Philadelphia, which is the home of the building and loan association in this country was formerly the City of Brotherly Love only. It is still so perhaps but it is now much more accurately the city of workmen's homes. The same is to a large extent now true of Charlotte and each case and other similar cases the local home building associations have been almost wholly the means by which this beneficent result has been brought about."

Alfred Daniels Must Hang.

The Supreme Court of the United States will not interfere with the execution of Alfred Daniels, the murderer of Senator Simmons' father, and he must pay the death penalty next month, says a Washington special. Justice Harlan, of the Supreme Court, Saturday denied the application for a writ of error to the Supreme Court of North Carolina. Attorneys for the condemned man had sought an appeal by raising a Federal question in order to stay execution. Justice Harlan carefully considered the papers in the case for two days when he reached the conclusion that there was nothing in the conduct of the case below meriting review by the court above. For that reason the application for writ of error was denied.

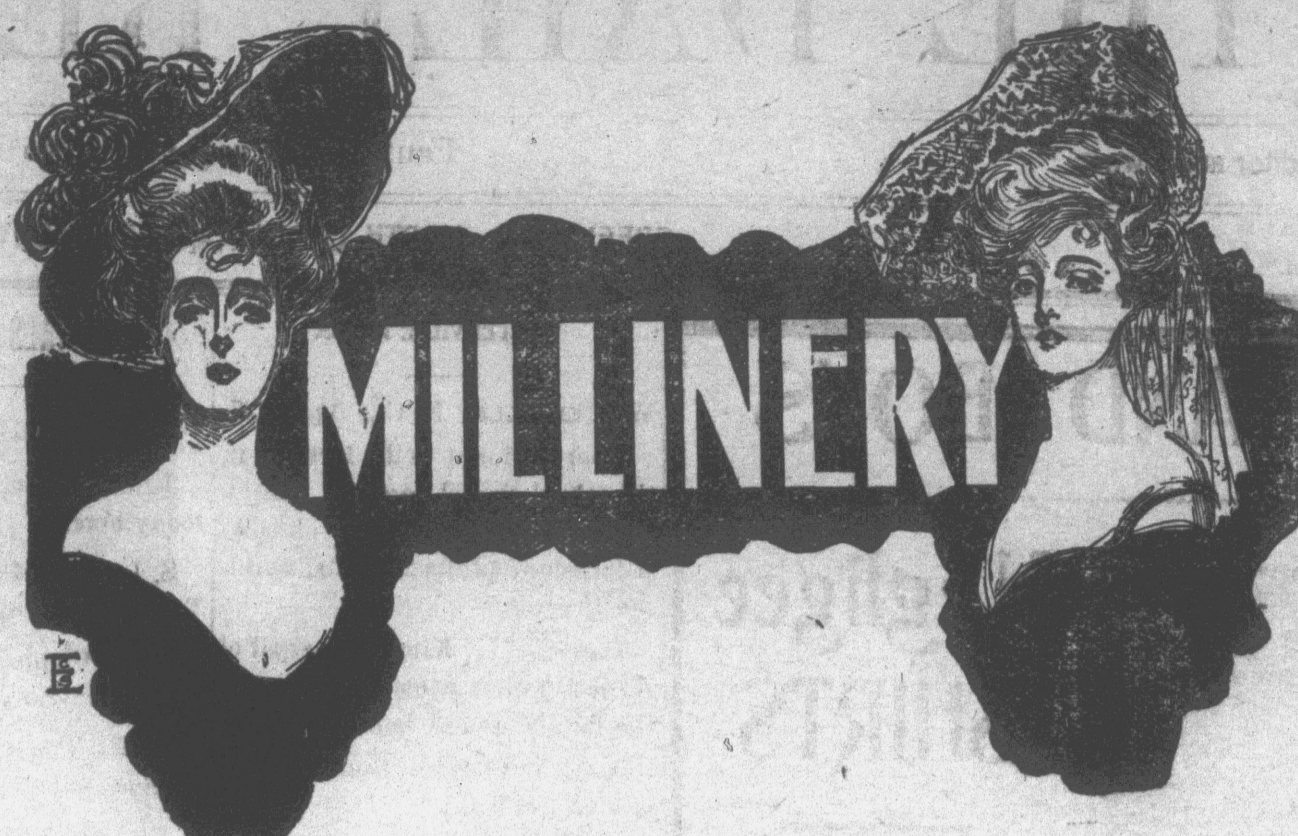

A QUEER GAME.

Stone Fighting is the National Pastime in Korea.

Every country has its national game. With Americans it is baseball. The Koreans prefer stone fighting or throwing. Travelers soon learn of the art acquired by some fighters, though there is but one day in the year given over to it. If any one offend a Korean, he answers with a stone. All classes indulge the habit. It is said of a Korean woman that she never fails to throw a stone straight. Within bounds she is as expert as a man. The childhood pleasure of skipping stones along the surface of streams is as well known to the Korean as to the Yankee. On stone throwing day, however, she is restricted to curfew time for her pleasure as upon other days. In the Land of the Morning Calm women are allowed on the streets only during curfew time, between twilight and early forenoon. During the day they are in seclusion.

In anticipation of the stone throwing fete the natives save all shapes and kinds of rocks. Even the smallest child has his stone pile and takes pride in it. They practice diligently, aiming at different targets. Often a hemp man like a scarecrow is rigged up, and the entire family use him for a fake enemy to be demolished by stones. Other targets are mandarin ducks, good luck geese and foreign soldiers made of cotton wool paper.

In preparing for the fete towns and villages put aside a goodly sum of money for the wounded and to buy prizes for the champions. Queer bands, composed of strange instruments, mostly drums and moon fiddles, announce the opening of the festival. The participants are drawn up in two sides like an army in battle. At the signal stone throwing begins, and soon the rules are laid aside, and the game becomes hot and furious. 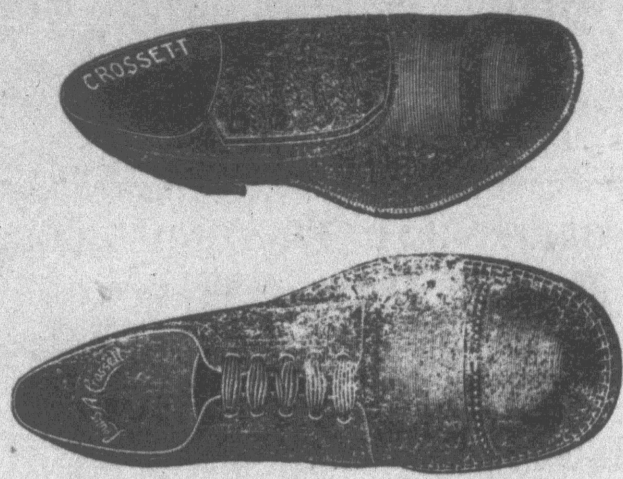

National Bureau's Report.

Washington, D. C., April 26.—The Weather Bureau's weekly summary of crop conditions says:

While preparations for corn planting have been active in the principal corn States, as a whole but little planting was done during the week, owing to low temperatures. In the Southern States corn has suffered from cold weather, and is small, with irregular stands.

Cotton planting is generally over the northern portion of the belt and is nearly finished in the central and southern portions, where chopping is in general progress, the early planted in Texas and Florida receiving its first cultivation.

Most of the central and eastern districts the stands are unsatisfactory and much replanting will be necessary. Low temperatures and droughty conditions have retarded germination very generally in the central and eastern districts. Planting is about finished in Texas, except in the central and southwest portions of the cotton area, where some fields of wheat ruined by drought are being planted in cotton.

Tobacco plants have been injured by frost in Virginia, and Kentucky, and are small in Tennessee and North Carolina. Some transplanting has been done in South Carolina.
