St. Louis Stamps On Sale. Monday.

The new series of stamps commemorative of the Louisiana purchase exposition will be placed on sale by the United States postoffice department April 30th, and will be continued until December 1st.

The designs are as follows: One-cent—Greene, with portrait of Robert R. Livingston, United States minister to France, who conducted the Louisiana purchase negotiations.

Two-cent—Red, portrait of Thomas Jefferson, president of the United States at the purchase.

Three-cent—Purple, portrait of Jas. Monroe, special ambassador to France, who, with Livingstone, closed the negotiations for the purchase.

Five-cent—Blue, portrait of William McKinley, who, as president, approved the act of congress officially connecting the act of congress officially connecting the United States government with the exposition.

Ten-cent—Bearing a United States map, showing the territory of the purchase.

The April Term in Session.

B. H. Wilson and J. K. Worthington, assault with deadly weapon, not guilty.

Assaulted a Cow.

Asheville, N. C., April 26.—A peculiar and unusual case was disposed of in police court yesterday in which a milch cow played a very conspicuous part. The case was that of State vs. John Tipton, a resident of West End. Mr. Tipton was charged with assault on a woman through a cow. According to the evidence a Mrs. Coleman was leading her cow through Mr. Tipton's premises, and the latter told her to get off and take the cow with her. The man evidently did not think that Mrs. Coleman was obeying his command with sufficient dispatch, so he kicked the cow in the side. The animal lunged forward, striking the woman and knocking her down.

Mrs. Coleman's husband later swore out a warrant for Tipton, charging him with assault. The case was tried before Judge Jones and Tipton was found guilty. The judge did not put a fine on the defendant, as the assault was an indirect affair, but allowed him to go his way upon payment of the costs.

Escape of Will Kennedy.

Kinston, N. C., April 27.—Will Kennedy, who was sentenced to eighteen months on the county roads last term of court for his connection with the shooting of young Ed Huges, escaped from the guards yesterday afternoon and his whereabouts have not as yet been learned.

He was working with the force about four miles from Kinston, on the south side of the river, and getting some little distance from the guard by a subterfuge, broke and ran. The guard ran after him and fired his pistol several times, but Kennedy got away.

The Meeting.

Washington, D. C., April 27.—The nomination of Jeter C. Pritchard, Associate Justice of the Supreme court of the District of Columbia, to be judge of the Fourth United States Circuit, was sent to the senate today by the president.

Justice Pritchard will succeed to the place made vacant by the death of Judge C. H. Simonton, of South Carolina. The Fourth Circuit to which he is appointed is composed of Virginia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Maryland and West Virginia.

The senate passed Congressman Small's bill for a light house at Hatteras just as it was passed by the house. All it needs now to be operative is the president's signature.

"Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch" does not like the persistent calls of curious people. Her last scene was in the police court where she was haled on the charge of emptying a jar of slops on a caller's head.

Ohio democrats are suggesting bringing out a dark horse for the presidential nomination in the person of Col. James Kilbourne, of that state. Any number of dark horses, or horses of any other color, cannot get ahead of Judge Parker in this race.

The trial between the state corporation commission and the Atlantic Coast Line, relative to restoring the connection at Selma, is in progress at Raleigh. It is to be hoped that the trial will terminate in the connection being restored and relieve the people down this way of much inconvenience.

Judge Peebles has expressed his intention of having the Lumberton lawyers before him on the contempt proceedings at Fayetteville May 2nd. As this is a matter personal to Judge Peebles the hearing should be before some other judge. No judge should sit on a case where he himself is an interested party. If he persists in hearing it the lawyers should move for a change to a hearing before another judge.

The Columbia, S. C., High Schools have gone back to Webster's old "blue back" to teach the pupils how to spell. This is commendable, it's real progress in education. This old speller is the only book of its sort extant, so far as we know. The only book that contains a classification of words by sound. Takes these: Banquet, Busset, Russet, Posset, Civet. To listen to a class of barefoot country boys and girls as each one does his word is to witness a rhythm scarcely excelled by the modern glee club.—Raleigh Times.

Cotton is king again, and the Southern planter is in the saddle. Never since the close of the war between the states has the Southern planter been in better condition than he was placed by last year's cotton crop. All he has got to do to continue that prosperity and still better his condition is to keep a level head on his shoulders, not to be scared by sensational rumors from the cotton speculative headquarters and to try to make as much cotton to the acre as possible—not so many acres in cotton, but so much cotton to the acre.—Wilmington Messenger.

DEMOCRATIC PLAN OF ORGANIZATION.

1. The unit of county organization shall be the voting precincts. In each precinct there shall be an executive committee, to consist of five active democrats, who shall be elected by the democratic voters at the several precincts in the meeting first called by the county executive committee. And said committee so elected shall elect one of its members as chairman, who shall preside at all committee meetings.

2. The chairman of the several precinct committees shall compose the county executive committee, which shall meet at the same time and place as the county convention first held in each election year, and elect a chairman of said county committee, who need not be a member of the committee, and he shall preside at all meetings of said committee, and shall hold his place until his successor shall be elected. A majority of said precinct chairmen, in person or by proxy, shall constitute a quorum. The county committee shall likewise appoint a central committee of five, who shall act in its stead when the county committee is not in session.

3. In case there shall be a failure on the part of any precinct to elect its executive committee for a period of thirty days, the county executive committee shall appoint said committee from the democratic voters of said precinct.

4. The members of the precinct committee shall elect to any vacancy occurring in said committee.

5. The county executive committee shall call all necessary conventions by giving at least ten days' notice by public advertisement in three public places in each precinct, at the court house door, and in any democratic newspapers that may be published in said county, requesting all democrats of the county to meet in their respective precincts on a common day therein stated, which said day shall not be less than three days before the meeting of the county conventions, for the purpose of electing their delegates to the county conventions. Thereupon the meeting so held shall elect their delegates to represent the precincts in the county convention from the voters of the respective voting precincts, which delegates, or such of them as shall attend, shall vote the full democratic strength of their respective voting precincts on all questions that may come before said county conventions. In case no meeting shall be held in any precinct in pursuance of said call, or no election shall be made, the precinct executive committee shall appoint such delegates.

PRIMARIES,

6. At every precinct meeting there shall (before the delegates to the county convention are elected) be a vote taken for the different candidates office, whose names may be presented and the delegates shall vote in the county convention of their respective districts in accordance with this vote; that is to say, each candidate shall receive in the county convention that proportion of the vote to which the precinct may be entitled which he received in the precinct meeting. The chairman and secretary of the precinct meeting shall certify to the county convention the vote received by each candidate at the precinct meeting.

7. Each precinct shall be entitled to cast in the county convention one vote for every twenty-five democratic votes, and one vote for fractions of thirteen democratic votes cast by the township at the last preceding gubernatorial election: Provided, that every voting precinct shall be entitled to cast one vote, and each precinct may send as many delegates as it may see fit.

8. The chairman of the precinct committees shall preside at all precinct meetings. In their absence any other member of said committees may preside.

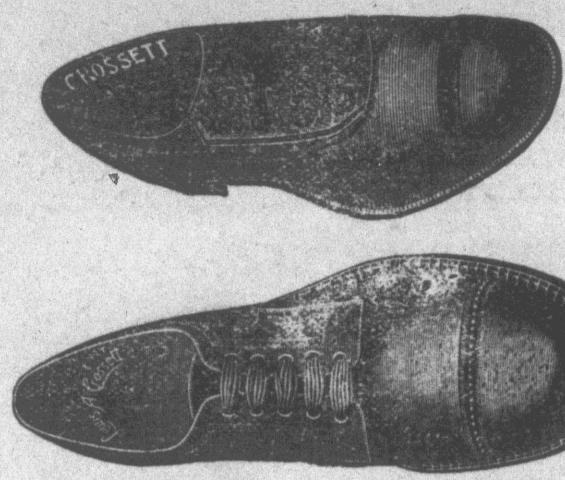
