HON. R. B. GLENN.

Forsythe Democrats Endorse Him by Resolutions.

A large and enthusiastic mass meeting of the democracy of Winston-Salem and Forsyth county was held in the court house last night.

Mr. Manly offered the following resolutions, which were received with cheers and unanimously adopted:

"Whereas, the name of Hon. R. B. Glenn will be presented to the coming democratic state convention for governor, and that we, his neighbors and friends, believe him to be qualified and worthy of that high office and recognize that he stands on the broad plateau of middle life, in the full flush of his matured faculties. He is a good lawyer, a strong thinker, an able campaigner, a sound statesman, a man of the people and for the people, and with the courage of his convictions.

"He is a man who loves his party with his whole heart, who loves it most when in the right, but, right or wrong, weak or strong, in prosperity or in adversity, he is a loyal, true, steadfast democrat.

"He has been a lifelong party worker, commencing in 1876 taking part in every campaign from that day to this. Free of cost to his party, he has placed himself in the hands of the executive committee, going cheerfully wherever and whenever sent. In the dark days of the state's oppression he was ever in the thick of the fray, fighting to rid the people of the black cloud placed upon them by negro domination and radical misrule.

"The people will not forget his campaign with Marion Butler, his services as a member of the Senate committee that helped from the constitutional amendment, his more than one hundred speeches for white supremacy and good government in 1900, and his untiring efforts in every campaign for his party's success.

"Being now under fifty years of age, he has no war record, but at South Mountain his father gave his life for his state and a cause that has always been dear to his son. He was baptized a true and loyal son of North Carolina in the martyred blood of his father and from his earliest manhood he has fought the battles of his party in the most trying crises in its history, and perhaps as no other son of North Carolina has done.

"He has not yet been honored with an office directly from the people of the state. It is true that he has been an elector, a member of the General Assembly and has served as district attorney, but these were positions that did not carry with them the stamp of approval, recognition and confidence of his fellow citizens of the state.

He has labored for the success of the Democratic party for twenty eight years on the day of election—never studying his own ease, but only asking where he was needed—has given his services to the people. Now he asks to be governor, a great honor, but he has won and deserves. We believe that those who have enjoyed the fruits of the victories he has helped to win, and the people whose interests he has helped to defend and uphold, will rally to his support and nominate him.

"And whereas, Mr. R. B. Glenn is the choice of the democrats of this county, and, we fully believe, the choice of the majority of the democratic voters of the state:

"Resolved, That the democratic voters of Forsyth county form a Glenn Democratic Campaign Club for the purpose of aiding him in his nomination, and hereby pledge ourselves to use every honorable means to accomplish this end."

Japanese Transport Sunk.

St. Petersburg, April 29.—The Russian torpedo boats of the Vladivostok squadron sank the Japanese military transport Kinsu Maru, 4,000 tons, during the night of April 26th, with all on board, excepting 18 officers, 20 soldiers, 65 of the crew and 85 coolie carriers. Others who refused to surrender were sent to the bottom with the ship.

"The Man Who Does Things."

Several years ago in a European court city, where there were gathered a number of newspaper correspondents, an enterprising American newspaper man acquired for himself the title of "the man that names names," because he, in his letters to his papers, not only sent the liveliest of court news, but called names of prominent individuals connected with the "doings." This was against the ethics of the correspondents' circle, but unknown to him, when it was found out he was dubbed as aforesaid. After explanations no blame was attached to him for violation of the custom, but the sobriquet stuck to him.

So in the national house of representatives Congressman Small, of the eastern Carolina delegation, has earned for himself the commendatory appellation of "the man that does things," because of his indefatigable labors in behalf of his section. Congressman Small's latest coup was in obtaining in the closing days of congress the passage of the bill appropriating \$590,000 for a light house off Cape Hatteras shoals commensurate with the danger and importance of the place. Congressman Small was ably assisted by the North Carolina delegation in congress in his efforts for the bill, and what is said of him can also be said of the whole delegation, for the present one from this state is weak at no point.—Kinston Free Press.

DEMOCRATIC PLAN OF ORGANIZATION.

(Continued from yesterday)

GENERAL RULES.

1. At all conventions the delegates shall be selected as near as may be from the friends and supporters of the candidates voted for.
2. Such delegates—or alternates of absent delegates—as may be present at any democratic convention shall be allowed to cast the whole vote to which their precinct or county may be entitled.
3. In all conventions provided for by this system, after a vote is cast, there shall be no change in such vote until the final result of the ballot shall be announced by the chairman of said convention.
4. All democratic executive committees shall have the power to fill any vacancies occurring in their respective bodies.
5. The chairman of the different county conventions shall certify the list of delegates and alternates of the different district and state conventions, and a certified list of said delegates and alternates to the secretary of the state central committee.
6. It shall be the duty of the county committee and its chairman to furnish such information and make such reports to the chairman of the state committee as he may desire.

At a meeting of the executive committee held on March 17, 1904, the following rule was adopted:

"In all conventions a nomination may be made by any majority, even though it be a fraction of a vote."

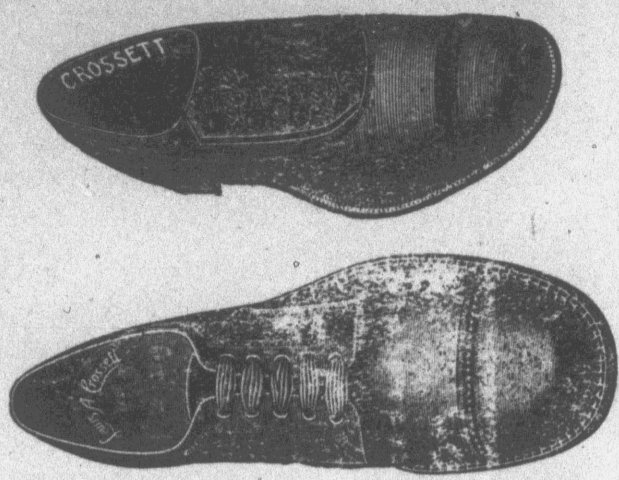
