Saunders, of the St. Louis Business Men's League. Transportation arrangements, hotel accommodations, and facilities for getting about are fully described by Mr. Saunders, so that one may plan intelligently in advance for a visit of a few or many days. The art exhibition is described in a separate article by Mr. Halsey C. Ives, the director.

Sentenced to Die at Stake.

Among some old records in the possession of J. H. W. Bonitz, of Wilmington, is a document which is a legal curio. Immediately after the Revolution a negro murdered a man in Brunswick county, was tried by the authorities, convicted and sentenced to be burned at the stake, and this sentence was carried into effect. The sentence is as follows: "Ordered that the sheriff take said Jemmy from hence to the place of execution, where he shall be tied to a stake and burned alive."

It further appears that the said Jemmy was a slave belonging to Mrs. Sarah Dupree. Three justices of the peace, William Gance, John Fell and Thomas Sessions, and four freeholders, John Strainton, Aaron Roberts, Needham Gorce and James Ludlow, duly summoned for that purpose, signed a certificate that said slave was worth £80 or \$400 proclamation money. Upon that certificate the legislature passed a resolution for the payment of the said sum to Mrs. Dupree, the owner of Jemmy.

Southern Democratic Sentiment.

For its preservation intact through the vicissitudes of these past years, the democratic party is indebted to its one reliable and unshrinking asset—namely, the "Solid South." Eight years ago, the South followed the West in an enthusiastic adoption of the principles of "Coin" Harvey as popularly expounded by Mr. Bryan. Four years ago, for consistency's sake, it stood by Mr. Bryan in reaffirming the money plank of 1896. But this year it has swung completely back to its earlier views, and thus the money question disappears as a party issue. An eminent Southern democrat is now governor of the Philippines, and the best opinion of the country seems pretty well united upon the altruistic view that for the present we must simply do the best we can for the Filipino people. The issue of imperialism, as passionately presented by Mr. Bryan four years ago, would fall flat in the South this year.

It cannot play much part in the campaign. The steps that have been taken to secure the building of the Panama Canal upon a strip of territory brought under the perpetual sovereignty of the United States are in fruition of that expansion policy by which we have acquired Porto Rico and a great naval station on the southern coast of Cuba, to dominate the waters of the Caribbean Sea and the Gulf of Mexico; and in accordance with which we have acquired Hawaii, at the cross roads of the Pacific, and will, under all circumstances retain coaling and naval stations in the Philippines. The South is not unhappy about these matters.—From "The Progress of the world," in the American Monthly Review of Reviews for May.
