Tokio, May 11.—(Noon.)—Admiral Togo reports that since the sixth of May many explosions have been heard coming from the vicinity of Port Arthur but their cause has not been ascertained.

The impression here is that the Russians, despairing of their ability to defend Port Arthur, are destroying their ships before evacuating the place.

Chefoo, May 11.—(5 p. m.)—An unofficial Japanese dispatch has been received here to the effect that the Russians have destroyed their fleet in Port Arthur.

Several Gateville people were in the city today. They were in a jolly mood, and one advanced a new snake story, which, he said, was not only unusual and wonderful, but true, and had gone through the press of the country. This is the story:

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS.

Interesting Meeting of the Association.
The first meeting of the association of superintendents of public schools for this district, embracing twenty counties, began here Wednesday evening to continue in session two days. About half the counties in the district are represented.

Those present were: Superintendents Gaither, of Perquimans; Long, of Northampton; Davis, of Edgecombe; Watson, of Hyde; Askew, of Bertie; Crisp, of Dare; Burgess, of Camden; Peel, of Martin; Ragsdale, of Pitt; Secretary Brooks, of Raleigh, and others.

The association met in the graded school chapel at 8:15 p. m. It is somewhat remarkable that so few of the people of the town were in attendance. It is to be hoped this does not indicate a lack of interest on their part in education.

Ex-Gov. T. J. Jarvis in most cordial words welcomed the superintendents to Greenville. This address was eloquently responded to by Prof. E. C. Brooks, of Raleigh, secretary of the state educational campaign committee.

Prof. W. H. Ragsdale followed in a timely and interesting address on "The Call of the Hour."

This morning from 9 to 10 the superintendents in a body visited the several class rooms of our graded school and showed much interest in the work of the school.

The association was called to order at 10 o'clock by Prof. W. H. Ragsdale, president, and much of the morning session was occupied in short addresses from the different superintendents on the relation of public sentiment to the public schools in their respective counties.

There was also a discussion of the question of insubordination in public schools and what superintendents can do to aid the teachers in controlling the schools. Many of the superintendents took part in this discussion.

A session was held this afternoon at which several important subjects were discussed. The closing session will take place tonight and the people of the town should bear in mind that they are invited to be present.

To Buy Up Repudiated Southern States Bonds.

Washington, May 11—The interesting information developed here today that a syndicate is being organized for the purpose of buying up repudiated bonds of southern states, most of which were issued by the carpet-baggers. The promoters of the scheme got their cue from the decision in the Dakota case, and it is understood to be their intention to gather up all these now worthless securities with the object of making a test in each case before the Supreme court of the United States. In fact, it is said that a great many of the old bonds have already been collected by the syndicate which is promoting the speculative venture. The work has been going on very quietly for some weeks so it is said. My authority expressed the opinion that ex-Senator Marion Butler is one of the promoters of the syndicate.—Washington Special to Raleigh Post.

Orphan Class Coming.

The singing class of the Oxford Orphan Asylum will begin a concert tour through eastern North Carolina on May 16th. The class is composed of ten girls and six boys and they give entertainments under the auspices of the Masonic lodges in the different towns. The Georgia and Alabama Supreme courts have declared in recent decisions that betting on races is illegal.

"Drop a nickel in the slot and take out a divorce" is the way the Durham Herald expresses it. They do come mighty cheap.

It sounds strange that some men who worked hard to pass the constitutional amendment are now trying to have negroes registered.

It is said that the figures will show that the total amount of taxes from all sources collected in Greenville for this fiscal year will aggregate nearly \$18,000. If this is so the tax collector and treasurer will make about \$900 each out of their offices. This fact is leading many people to the conclusion that the pay of these offices should be changed from a commission basis to a salary, and the salary be made no larger than the work is worth. A general discussion of this matter between now and the next town election might save a good sum to the tax payers.

Women And The Baltimore Fire.

A generous and graceful tribute to the calmness of women in danger is that paid by Mr. Lynn Roby Meekins, editor of the Baltimore Herald, in his article in the June Delineator. He tells not only of women who worked in the thick of the destruction with and for their employers, husbands and fathers, and of the brave and cheerful way in which, when all was lost, they set to work at humble occupation to support themselves, but of their ability to rise quite above the consideration of material things in the recognition of essentials. "One young husband" he says, "made his way home and, pale and trembling, approached his wife. 'I am ruined, he exclaimed. 'My dear,' she replied, smiling through her anxiety, 'you are not hurt a bit.' That was the woman's view of the situation. It was mainly personal."

The Chicago Chronicle wants to know how long it will take the democratic party to live down the candidacy of William R. Hearst and 'to what extent is a party under whose auspices such a candidacy is possible entitled to popular respect and consideration?' That is easy enough. Hearst's candidacy is not under the auspices of the democrats. He is simply aspiring, as an individual, to office. He seeks the democratic nomination, but has not received it. The democratic party recognizes this as a free country, and recognizes the right of any citizen of the country to seek office. It is regarded as a worthy ambition. We suppose that the blackest and most ignorant negro in the country

has a right to seek the nomination for President at the hands of a republican convention, and we doubt whether any of our republican contemporaries will venture to go so far as to say that we have been mistaken. We consider it a matter of some importance and would like very well to know about it — Danville Bee.

They Live Mostly In Holes and Swallow Their Prey Whole.

In Arizona the owls live mostly in holes in the ground and in holes in the giant cactus. It would be contrary to their predatory nature to dig their own holes or yet to build nests of sticks while there were other available nesting places. So every springtime there is a lot of trouble among the desert chipmunks and ground squirrels until the burrowing owls have chosen their holes and settled down for the season. Similarly the Gila woodpeckers and gilded flickers have no assurance that their holes in the sahuaras are their own until after the screech owls and pygmy owls have been established in comfort. Possession is all the law there is in the Arizona cactus and desert, and in case of a dispute the owls eat little chipmunks and flickers anyway.

All day in the cool depths of his hole the screech owl hides from the heat and glare. As the sun sinks he comes out and flits silently toward the river bottom, where the mice and kangaroo rats are already beginning to play on the sand patches and to hustle through the willows and arrowweed thickets. The quail and smaller birds are hid away in the bushes, and around the old logs and stumps great yellow scorpions and beetles are picking their way. At the slightest movement of a blade of grass the screech owl swoops to the ground, and when he is not ranging the flats for mammals he is searching bunches of mistletoe and dense mesquite trees for the birds which lie hidden here.

He does not scorn the scorpion and beetles, nor yet grasshoppers and smaller bugs. At the same time he will tackle a bush rabbit or twitch a pocket gopher from his hole by the head. He swallows his prey whole and after digestion has taken place throws up the bones and fur in the shape of pellets. It is by looking for pellets beneath woodpecker's holes in cottonwoods and sahuaras that naturalists are able to locate the homes of these owls.—Country Life In America.

Good Advice Anyhow.

"Of course, but you see"— "Well, why don't you go and laugh at him? I did only my duty by you, and from what I know of you I would say that I can't think of any one who has more extended preparations to make. Good day, sir."

Why Yawning Is Healthful.

"Not only is it very healthy to yawn," says a French physician, "but artificial yawning should be resorted to in cases of sore throat, buzzing of the ears, catarrh and like troubles." It is said to be as efficacious in its way as gargling the throat, with which process it should be combined. The reason stated is that during the act of yawning there is considerable stretching of the muscles of the pharynx and soft palate, which are in this way put through a sort of massage. Besides this, in the act of yawning the throat tubes contract and drive into the pharynx the mucus that has accumulated.

Preventing Snoring.

Wife (to husband, whose loud snoring keeps her awake)—Charlie, Charlie, do stop snoring! Turn over on your side. (Nudges him.) Husband, only half awake, grunts, turns on his side and continues to snore.

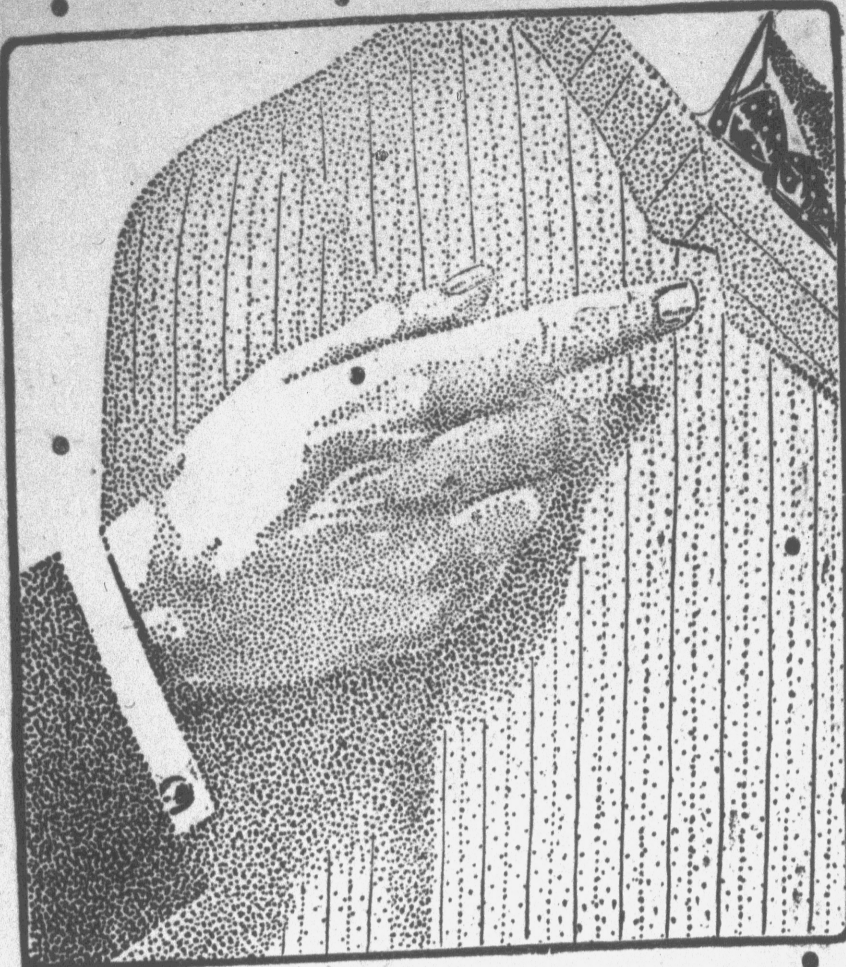

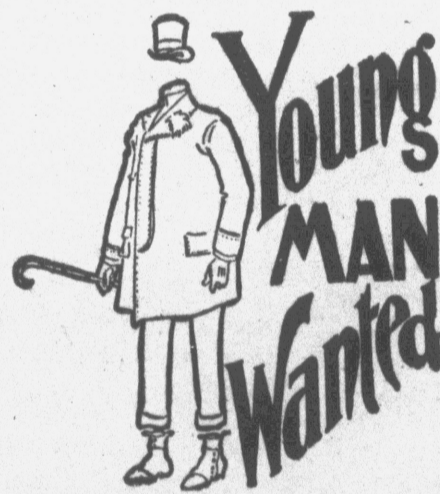
