#### FROM THE FAR EAST.

By telegraph to Reflector:

London, May 20.—The central news says reports emanating from New Chwang are to the effect that the Japanese army has been severely defeated and that it has been driven back to Feng Hwang Cheng.

London May 20.—Chefoo reports say that heavy firing has been heard in the direction of Port Arthur today. It is believed a battle is being fought there.

Albany, N. Y., May 20.—Thousands of dollars worth of valuable Jewelry which was stolen from Livingston Tomb and from Ganeral Depriesters Mansion at Tivoli recently have been recovered by the police here as a result of a raid on the gang known as "Growler Gang" operating in houses on South Lansing street. Five of the gang under arrest gave their names as Thomas King, Charles Adame, Thomas Ryan, William Johnson, and John Rush.

London, May 20.—Reported from Gibraltar that the British torpedo boat left there for Tangiers and the American fleet which has been at Canary Islands left for the same destination. They go to give force to the demand of the United States to Consul Gummere that the Sultan obtain release of the American citizen and the British subject kidnapped by Morocco bandits on last Wednesday.

London, May 20.—Baron Hayashi Japanese minister is confined in bed today, suffering from an attack of influenza.

London May 20.—Dispatch to Renter Telegraph company from New Chwang says the retirement of the Japanese army Feng Hwang Cheng is officially confirmed.

Tokio May 20.—An announcement is made that the losses among the officers of the battleship Hatsuse which was sunk off Port Arthur are Commanders Tsukamoto, Nire, Aizumi and twenty others. On the cruiser Yoshino, which was struck after having been in a collision with the cruiser Kasuga were Captain Saiski Commander Hirowateri and twenty-one other officers lost. The report that the battleships Shikishima and Taki were damaged off Port Arthur is denied.

#### CLOSING OF GRADED SCHOOL A GREAT SUCCESS.

The exercises were begun by a musical duet by Misses Blow and Goodson followed by vocal duet by Mrs. J. B. Cherry and Miss Nina James. A beautiful and impressively eloquent prayer by Rev. J. B. Jones of the Wilson Christian church. Then followed, a beautiful vocal duet by Misses Blow and Goodson.

The speaker, Dr. B. F. Dixon, state auditor, was introduced by F. C. Harding in the most intelligent, artistic and beautiful piece of rhetoric that it has been the pleasure of Greenville to listen to ever before. Ornate, classic and altogether a sparkling exquisite, masterful gem—that pleased every body and brought down the house.

Dr. Dixon in beginning his address said he wondered why he had been invited to speak on this occasion when we had Demosthenes, with us already. For one hour and half Dr. Dixon spoke to the great dilectability of the audience. In a burst of eloquence would he rise to a flight supreme, then, with finest wit and humor—pathos, and sarcasm.

The audience was kept in perfect delight, not realizing that time was passing so rapidly. There is but one Dr. B. F. Dixon—magnificently fine looking—a benign face that pleases everybody. A wonderful store of the milk of human kindness, beaming in his countenance,—with ripe varied experience in life—a statesman soldier and magnificent gentleman. Those who did not attend Friday have much to regret. Just such a day cannot be enjoyed again. The mark of respect, shown by the leading merchants closing their places of business from 11 to 12 o'clock and attending the closing scenes of the first year of the graded school shows the earnestness of the people before the subject of higher and more general education.
