If Lumberton and Raleigh jails get full there is room in some other counties.

If the lawyers and editors get in jail the balance of the boys will have a dull time.

Judge George H. Brown, Jr., has declined to hear the case against the Lumberton lawyers, referred to him by Judge Peebles. He had good reasons for not hearing it.

It is a tyrannical use of position for a judge to avenge his own feelings by sending a man to jail just because he has power to do so, and the man is helpless to defend himself.

Robert M. McLane, mayor of Baltimore, committed suicide Monday by shooting himself through the brain. Arduous work since the big fire there and criticism of his official acts by opponents is supposed to be the cause of his unbalancing for the time. He had been married less than two weeks.

The ward primaries will be held tomorrow night. Every democratic in each ward should be at his respective meeting. As the nominations will be equivalent to election it is important that the right men be nominated. See that this is done, and if it is not done do not let it be your fault.

The question of saving money to the tax payers of the town by paying less to the tax collector, treasurer and mayor, has been generally discussed during the last few days. The letters that have appeared in THE REFLECTOR on the subject have been from representative business men and property owners of the town, and shows the interest they feel in the matter. We have as yet heard no one speak in opposition to the reductions proposed. 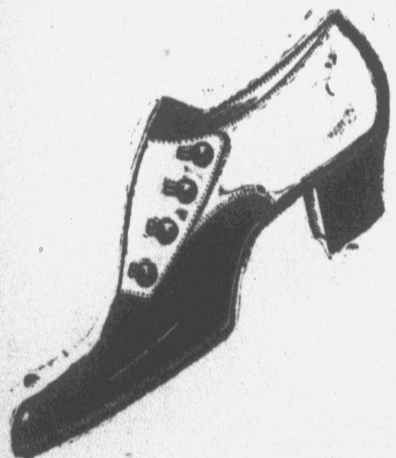

PUT THEM ON SALARY.

EDITOR REFLECTOR:

I have read with much interest the several articles which have recently appeared in your paper advocating a reduction of the expenses of our town government. To those of us who have property these suggestions have appeared very timely, for our taxes are already about as high as we can stand and we will have to raise \$3,250 now during the next fiscal year to pay the interest on our improvement bonds. A saving of six hundred dollars could be made by paying the treasurer a salary instead of giving him a commission and five hundred dollars more could be saved by doing the same by the tax collector. It seems to be the unanimous opinion of all thinking men that this should be done and it seems to me that that part of it is already settled.

Then the salary of the mayor should be reduced. Three hundred dollars per annum is good pay for this officer and if I am not mistaken that is as much as any mayor ever received until this year. I am not sure what the salary is at present, but I have heard it was \$500. If that is correct, \$200 could be saved right here. I hope the next board of aldermen will look into these matters closely and do all in their power to run the town government on the same business principles as they would their own individual affairs.
