GELSEMIUM POISONING.

Causes Death of a Colored Child.

Dr. E. A. Moye tells us of a death that occurred in this county a few days ago under unusual circumstances. It was a child of Thad Rogers, colored, who lives on Mr. F. Ward's place about 7 miles from town. It seems that some of Thad's relatives living in the neighborhood had taken honey. They sent word to Thad to go to their house and they would give him some of the honey. He went after the honey and upon returning home his two children ate some of it. Not long after eating it they complained of being blind and dizzy and became so so sick that they went to bed. Seeing their condition Thad began hitching up to come to the doctor, but in a few minutes one of the children, aged about 4 years, was dead. The other child has recovered.

Dr. Moye says the death was no doubt due to gelsemium poisoning. He says the bees had probably sucked the blossoms of the yellow jessamine, which is a poisonous flower, and in this way had poisoned the honey.

Army Uniforms Shown.

Every kind of uniform used in the United States army is exhibited on well-formed wax figures in the War Department's exhibit at the World's Fair. These models represent the rank and file of the army in the heat of the tropics, in the frozen north and in the temperate climate of the United States proper. In tropical uniforms are the snowy white duck, while in the frozen regions of Alaska are the furs and the fur-lined and blanket-lined clothing of the cold climate, regardless of style and neatness. In the regular display of army uniforms are those of all rank, from private to lieutenant-general. The various dress and service uniforms are shown, and those of the several branches of the army are indicated by the colors and insignia belonging thereto. It is a most interesting display of up-to-date uniforms of the latest pattern, color and finish.

It is the Mind That Sees.

Strawberries.

The strawberry crop just closed has been the best in the history of the industry in this state. The Fruit and Truckers' Journal, of Wilmington, gives the following figures showing the extent of this industry:

The total number of refrigerator cars shipped out of this territory during the berry season of 1904 approximates 2,217 car loads, against 1,963 cars last year. Reduced to crates the total number this year foots up 537,369 against 500,362 in 1903 in refrigerator cars.

By the Southern Express Company the total number of crates shipped this season is 71,009, which, when added to the number shipped by refrigerator, brings up the grand total to 608,369 crates against 675,000 crates during the famous year of 1903. The net average to the growers per crate is about \$2, and at this rate it will be seen that more than \$1,216,738 have been returned to this section and distributed among the growers from the one item of strawberries alone.
