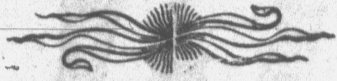

Ex-Sheriff Warren Dead.

Mr. Allen Warren, one of the old-
est men of Greenville and a highly
esteemed citizen died at 5:30 o'clock
this morning at his home at River-
side Nurseries.

Mr. Warren suffered a stroke of
apoplexy about noon on Sunday
and shortly thereafter sank into
unconsciousness from which he
never rallied. The end came
peacefully like one falling asleep.

Mr. Warren was reared on a
farm. In the year 1878 he was
elected sheriff of the county and
served two terms. At the time of
his election he moved his family
to Greenville and continued his
residence here. After his term of
office he engaged in the nursery
business and developed a good
trade in that line.

At the time of his death he was
75 years old and leaves five child-
ren. These are Dr. W. T. Warren,
of Williamston; Mrs. E. B. Moore,
of Washington; Mrs. E. M. Hearne,
Mr. O. E. Warren and Miss Bettie
Warren, of Greenville. All of
these were with him during his
illness.

The funeral will take place Fri-
day afternoon at 3 o'clock.

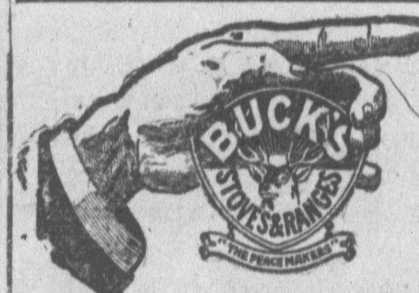

Our State Normal and Industrial College.

The catalogue of the North Carolina State Normal and Industrial College, advertisement of which appears in another column, shows an enrollment during the past year of 536 college students and 333 pupils in the Practice and Observation School.

Students secure free tuition by agreeing to become teachers in the public or private schools of the state for at least two years after leaving the college, and in no other way can free tuition be secured. All the free tuition students cannot secure board in the dormitories where board is furnished at actual cost, but places will be reserved in the dormitories for 175 free tuition students and 175 tuition paying students. Provision will be made for fifty free tuition students with board in private families and twenty-five tuition paying students with board in private families.

There are so many applications for free tuition with board in the dormitories that it will be necessary occasionally to hold competitive examinations, and in order to secure a chance for one of these free tuition places with board in the dormitories an application should be in the hands of President McIver on or before July 15. Each county in the state is entitled to one or more of these places, according to the white population of the county. In the dormitories the annual expenses of a free tuition student for board, laundry and fees for registration, physician's attendance, library, use of text-books, etc., is \$115. Tuition-paying students pay \$160. Non-residents of the state pay \$180. The annual expenses of students in private families is about \$12 more than that of boarders in the college dormitories.

The Total Mortality of the General Slocum Disaster.

New York, June 25.—That upwards of one thousand persons perished in the burning of the excursion steamer General Slocum, is now practically certain. According to an exhaustive report made by Police Inspector Schmittberger on the number of dead, missing, injured and uninjured in the disaster, it appears that 938 have been recovered and that 93 persons absolutely known to have been aboard the vessel are still unaccounted for, bringing the total mortality of the disaster to 1,031. Those injured number 179 and of the throng of fully 1,500 who embarked on the excursion of St. Marks church, but 236 escaped without injury.

A. & N. C. R. R. Lease.

When asked about the Atlantic and North Carolina railroad and if it would be leased this year the governor said he rather thought so, and added that there would be a lease under the terms given in his speech before the democratic convention. He said the road was doing well, very well, and that he did not propose to hawk it about; that no disposition would be made of it below its value and unless the guarantees were perfect. He was told that it was stated that the Philadelphia syndicate which had made a bid had not put up any guarantee. He said he had no doubt that they would put up one when the time came to make a lease.

The owners and officers of the steamer Slocum have been found guilty of criminal neglect by the coroner's jury.

Some of these days there is going to be trouble in the democratic camp over the work of its conventions. This thing of insisting on nominating candidates before any platform whatever is promulgated may work all right and again it may not. When the excitement of a contest is over, two-thirds of the delegates depart, leaving a mere handful to adopt a platform and over this thing there is almost sure to become a division or split. It is as sure as fate that had the entire delegation been present two years ago when the platform was adopted it would not have read as it did. Conservatism is needed. It is better to heed it before it is too late. All the talk about the party being so strong that it cannot be defeated is pure rot, tommy rot of the worst kind. —Greensboro Record.

George B. Curtis, a farmer, who has lived in Harwinton, Conn., for sixty years, has paid 6 per cent interest yearly—amounting to \$720—on a loan of \$300 which he secured forty years ago. At that time he was sole support of his stepmother, two sisters and a brother, and borrowed the money to send a substitute to the Civil War, although he was not drafted. Mr. Curtis is now in poor health, and he says he sees little prospect of ever being able to pay the principal. —New York Herald.



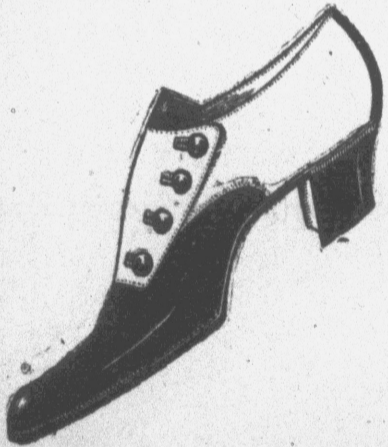
