THE DISPENSARY SITUATION.

Notwithstanding the fact that a majority of the people on the 2nd of March voted that a dispensary should be established in Greenville on the first of July, the opposition have exerted every effort and resorted to every means to thwart the will of the people expressed in that election. But every step the antis have taken from the beginning of the contest until now has made friends for the side of the dispensary.

It is known to the public that the board of aldermen then in control of the town, at least a majority of them, were opposed to the dispensary and put every obstacle they could in the way. This was so prominent that the election for aldermen held the first Monday in June was practically the second contest for the dispensary, the people then electing a board in sympathy with the dispensary and who would see it conducted as it should be.

It has also been told in these columns how the old board of aldermen just before the expiration of the term, set the law in defiance and appointed two men as dispensary commissioners who were autogonistic to the dispensary. The one legal appointee refused to qualify and serve with two illegal members, whereupon the aldermen went a step further and appointed a third man from among the opposition. Though warned and having full knowledge that their appointment as dispensary commissioners was contrary to law, these three men set to work to establish a dispensary and opened it on the first day of July with an entire anti dispensary management in charge.

Among the first acts of the new board of aldermen upon assuming control of the town on the first day of the month, was to take steps to undo the illegal acts of their predecessors and see that the law is properly carried out. With this in view the ordinances published below were adopted.

An ordinance to amend the rules and regulations adopted by the Board of Aldermen of the town of Greenville, for the government of the Greenville dispensary and recorded on pages 186 and 187 et seq; of the minutes of said board.

The Board of Aldermen of the town of Greenville do ordain:

Section 1. That rule three (3) of the rules and regulations adopted by this board for the government of the Greenville dispensary, recorded on page 186 of the minutes of this board, be amended by striking out the words or figures "1906" in line five and inserting in lieu thereof, the words and figures "1904" and by striking out in line seven the words or figures "2 years" and inserting in lieu thereof the words or figures "1 year," and by adding to the end of said rule the words "and continue until their successors are appointed and qualified."

Section 2. That rule (4), recorded on page 187, be stricken out and the following inserted in lieu thereof. That at the first meeting of the Board of Aldermen of the town of Greenville in July 1904, and every year thereafter at the first meeting in July, there shall be elected three dispensary commissioners, whose term shall commence on the first day of July of the year in which they are elected and shall

THE DISPENSARY SITUATION.

(CONTINUED FROM FIRST PAGE)

continue in office until their successors are appointed and qualified.

Section 3. That this ordinance be in force from and after its passage.

An ordinance to repeal the rules for the government of the Greenville Dispensary, adopted by the Board of Aldermen at their meeting on June 27th, 1904 and recorded on pages 199 and 200 of this board, and to re-enact Rules 11, 12 and 13 adopted by the Board at their meeting on June 16th 1904.

The Board of Aldermen of the town of Greenville, do ordain:

Section 1. That the ordinance or resolution of the town of Greenville, adopted at their meeting June 27th 1904 and recorded on pages 199 and 200, changing and amending the rules adopted at the meeting of the Board June 16th 1904 for the government of the Greenville dispensary, recorded on page 188 of the minutes, be and the same is hereby repealed and abrogated.

Section 2. That rules eleven twelve and thirteen, adopted by this board at its meeting June 16th 1904 and recorded on page 188 of the minutes of this board which were sought to be repealed by the ordinance passed June 27th 1904, referred to in preceding section, be and the same are hereby re-enacted and continued in full force as a part of the rules and regulations for the government of the Greenville Dispensary.

Section 3. That this ordinance be in force from and after its passage.

An ordinance removing S. T. Hooker, W. B. Greene and R. L. Smith from the Dispensary Commissioners for the town of Greenville, and declaring the positions vacant.

The Board of aldermen of the town of Greenville do ordain:

Section 1. That the board finds as a fact that S. T. Hooker, W. B. Greene and R. L. Smith voted at the dispensary election held in Greenville, March 2nd., 1904 against the proposition to establish a dispensary in said town.

Section 2. That said election was held under and by virtue of the authority of chapter 233. Laws of 1903, and that by section 18th of said Act the said S. T. Hooker, W. B. Greene and R. L. Smith are disqualified to hold the position of dispensary commissioner in the town of Greenville, they not having voted for such dispensary.

Section 3. That notwithstanding such disqualification, the said S. T. Hooker, W. B. Greene and R. L. Smith claim to have been elected and are now claiming to hold and exercise the position and duties of dispensary commissioners in the town of Greenville contrary to the letter and spirit of the law.

Section 4. That this board finds as a further fact that S. T. Hooker, W. B. Greene and R. L. Smith are unfit persons to hold said positions.

Section 5. That said S. T. Hooker, W. B. Greene and R. L. Smith were and are ineligible as dispensary commissioners and they are hereby removed from the position of dispensary commissioners for the town of Greenville, for the reason hereinbefore set out and they are forbidden to farther attempt to exercise any of the duties of said positions.

Section 6. That the positions of dispensary commissioners for the town of Greenville are hereby declared to be vacant.

Section 7. That the clerk of this

board cause a copy of this ordinance to be furnished said S. T. Hooker, W. B. Greene and R. L. Smith.

Section 9. That this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage.

Ordinance to designate where liquors can be sold in the town of Greenville and designating the persons authorized to make the sale.

The Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville ordain:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person to sell or dispose of, for gain, any spiritous, vinous or malt liquors within the corporate limits of the town of Greenville, except within the building on Evans street known as the Flanagan store building, used and occupied as a dispensary by the commissioners, J. W. Bryan, J. L. Sugg, and J. N. Hart and their employees.

Section 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person to sell or dispose of for gain, within the corporate limits of the town of Greenville, any spiritous, vinous or malt liquors, except the commissioners, J. W. Bryan, J. L. Sugg and J. N. Hart, their successors and employees, and they shall sell only at the place used and occupied by them as a dispensary, as herein set out, and there only at such time and in such manner as is allowed by law.

Section 3. That any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined Fifty Dollars (\$50) for each and every offence.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, and all ordinances in conflict with it are hereby repealed.

An ordinance removing Z. V. Hooker and J. M. Reuss from the positions of manager and assistant manager, respectively, of the Greenville dispensary.

The Board of Aldermen of the town of Greenville do ordain:

Section 1. That the board find as a fact that Z. V. Hooker and J. M. Reuss, the persons who are attempting to exercise the duties of the position of manager and assistant manager respectively of the Greenville dispensary, were not appointed by a legally constituted body, and that they are unfit and improper persons to be entrusted with those duties.

Section 2. That the said Z. V. Hooker and J. M. Reuss are hereby removed from said positions of manager and assistant manager, respectively of the Greenville dispensary and they are forbidden to further exercise the duties of said positions.

Section 3. That this ordinance be in force from and after its passage, and that the Clerk of this board furnish said Z. V. Hooker and J. M. Reuss with a copy of the same.

Copies of these ordinances were promptly served upon the persons named therein, yet they continued to defy the law, and before night several warrants were sworn out against them.

The cases were tried this morning before Mayor Parker, there being five state warrants and two town warrants. Under the state warrants the defendants were bound over to September term of Superior court, and under the town warrants they were fined \$50 and costs. Defendants appealed in latter cases.
