Dr. C. Alphonso Smith Will Not Go to Tennessee's University.

Chapel Hill, N. C., July 12.—Dr. C. Alphonso Smith returned from the University of Tennessee today and your correspondent interviewed him in regard to accepting the presidency of the University.

He said: "Yes, I have just declined the call to the presidency of the University of Tennessee. It was a call that touched my ambition in many ways—a call that appealed profoundly to me. But after spending three days on the ground studying the problem at first hand I came to the conclusion that my duty for the present lies with the University of North Carolina. The University of Tennessee is in the shape and has before it a future of great expansion and usefulness. The State ought to give it at least fifty thousand dollars a year. Its development, like that of every other State University, depends on the intelligent and liberal co operation of the State."—News and Observer.

"A Crime to Miss the World's Fair."

Ferdinand W. Peck, who was vice-president of the World's Columbian Exposition, and commissioner general for the United States at the more recent Paris Exposition, thus speaks of the St. Louis Worlds Fair:

"I can freely say that this exposition is on a more colossal scale than any which preceded it. The grounds and buildings are larger and the exhibits more complete.

"If any citizen of the United States who can possibly attend remains away he is almost committing a crime.

"Besides my connection with the Columbian and Paris expositions, I have represented the state of Illinois at Atlanta, Nashville and Omaha, I state unequivocally that the world has never seen anything so valuable, so educational, so magnificent as this and I repeat it would be a crime to miss it."

Good bye to the boll weevil. The Guatemelan ant has been tried on him and cleaned him up in short order.

Hon. Henry G. Davis, the democratic nominee for vice-president, is 81 years old, yet a strong, vigorous man.

Greensboro is getting thoroughly warmed up in the prohibition campaign. Go it, good people, and drive the saloons out.

Hearst got plenty of advertising while it was going on, even if it did cost him nearly a million and a half. He had the money to spare, and it may be worth that much to him.

The democratic ticket so far, national and state, is all right. Let us observe the same high plane when the county nominations are reached. It is a time when good men are wanted.

No paper in the state is making more rapid progress than the Raleigh Times. It is now preparing to go into new quarters with an improved plant. Continued success to such an excellent paper.

An Act to Create the Office of Chief of Fire Department and Decrease the Fire Waste of the State.

We have been requested to publish the following: The General Assembly of North Carolina do Enact:

Section 1. That there is hereby created in the cities and incorporated towns of the State where not already established by their charters the office of "Chief of Fire Department." It shall be the duty of said "Chief of Fire Department" to do and perform the duties prescribed in chapter 28, Public Laws of 1899, and acts amendatory thereof, and such other duties as are prescribed in the charters and ordinances of the cities and towns of the State.

Sec. 2. That where it is not fixed in the charters of said cities and towns, it shall be the duty of the Board of Aldermen and Commissioners in each city and town to elect such officer, and to fix the term of office, prescribe the duties and obligations and compensation of "Chief of Fire Department," and change the duties and compensation from time to time, not inconsistent with the duties as prescribed in chap. 58, Public Laws 1899, and acts amendatory thereof.

Sec. 3. That where said duties are not prescribed by the charters of Board of Control of incorporated cities and towns, it shall be the duty of said "Chief of Fire Department" in addition to the duties prescribed in chapter 29, Public Laws of 1899, to preserve and care for the fire apparatus, to have charge of the fighting and putting out of all fires, to make annual report to their city or town governments, to seek out and have corrected all places and conditions dangerous to the safety of the city from fire, to look after

buildings being erected with a view to their safety from fires and to do and perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the governing boards of the several cities and towns.

Sec. 4. This act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

In the General Assembly read three times, and ratified this the 14th day of March, A. D. 1901."

Another Cleveland.

Jude Parker's gold standard telegram has brought upon him much approbation and no censure. Senator Daniel, of Virginia, said that he was a foot taller than before he sent it. Col. Guffey, the Pennsylvania Democratic leader, says: "It is the grandest exhibition of moral courage I have ever seen in a candidate. Parker shows himself a much greater man than those who managed his fight." The Washington Post, independent, says it was "a timely display of political courage amounting almost to audacity," adding that "it was a bold, courageous stroke, and will do much to dispel the popular opinion that the party's candidate is without firm convictions upon the issues before the country," and concluding that "Judge Parker's bold stand on this question has made him many thousand vote stronger than he could possibly have been had he accepted the nomination upon a platform that ignored the money issue." While The Philadelphia Record says that "silent when there was no occasion for speaking, Judge Parker has spoken the decisive word because the occasion has arrived. He has proved himself the man and the patriot that his friends knew him to be, and, rising above personal ambitions, and what was believed to be party expediency, he has stood with absolute clearness his position on the currency question where the silence of the platform invited misconstruction and was liable to compromise him."

Indeed it was a brave man who could renounce a presidential nomination rather than preserve a silence which might have been misinterpreted and who last Saturday sent this telegram to the convention which had nominated him.

"I regard the gold standard as firmly and irrevocably established, and shall act accordingly if the action of the convention to-day shall be ratified by the people. As the platform is silent on the subject, my views should be made known in the convention, and if it is proved to be unsatisfactory to the majority, I request you to decline the nomination for me at once, so that another may be nominated before adjournment."

Has the Democratic party discovered another Cleveland? It looks a little that way.—Charlotte Observer.

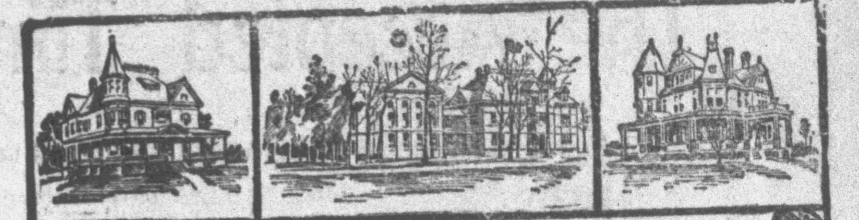

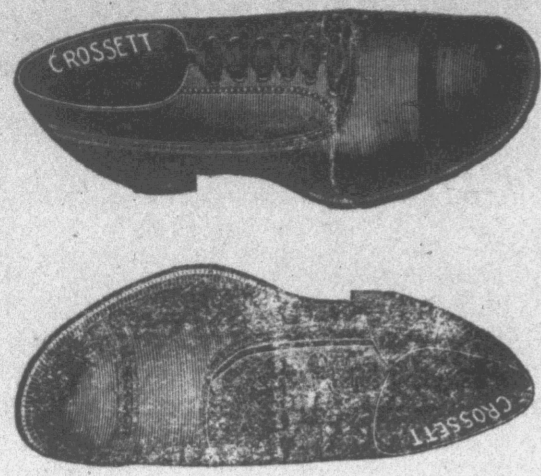

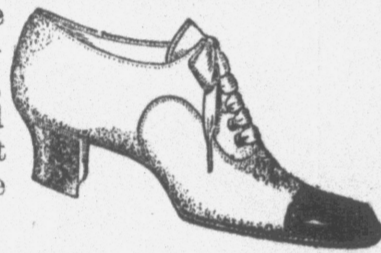
