### Is It a Trick of the Meat Trust?

Chicago, July 15—Negotiations between the leaders and the packers in the stock yard strike will be reached today. An agreement was reached yesterday and in some quarters it is believed that the packers are not particularly anxious to have the strike settled. Work in the packing houses was continued yesterday but only about 25 per cent. of the usual amount of work was done with the small force remaining. It is asserted in some quarters that the strike had been pre-arranged to enable the trade to dispose of excess stock at increased prices. The danger of a meat famine is said to have been greatly exaggerated and there is really no excuse for the enormous increase in meat prices.

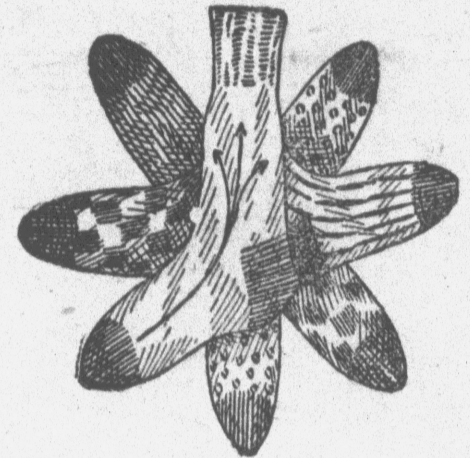
### The difference.

North Carolina at The World's Fair.

Elsewhere in today's paper we print a very interesting article from the St. Louis Lumberman on "the Forestry Display" at the World's Fair, which will have a peculiar interest to North Carolina readers. There is no display in the most wonderful exposition the world has seen that surpasses the North Carolina forestry exhibit. Of course there are plenty more gorgeously and magnificently installed, but for the simple and effective display of North Carolina commercial woods—a display that will attract lumbermen and manufacturers who buy wood—there is not one that attracts more interest. The display of furniture made in North Carolina out of North Carolina woods affords subject lessons of the tremendous growth of the manufacture of furniture in the state. The primacy of North Carolina as a tobacco State is well advertised. In the tobacco section is an octagonal base, eighteen feet high, surmounted by a tobacco globe bearing a ship of the galleon type, the whole made to look like yellow granulated smoking tobacco. It is an imposing presentation, and bears these inscriptions.

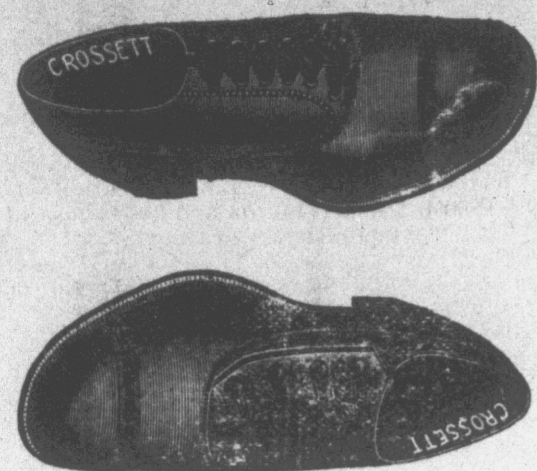
