KINSTON, N. C., July 22, 1904.

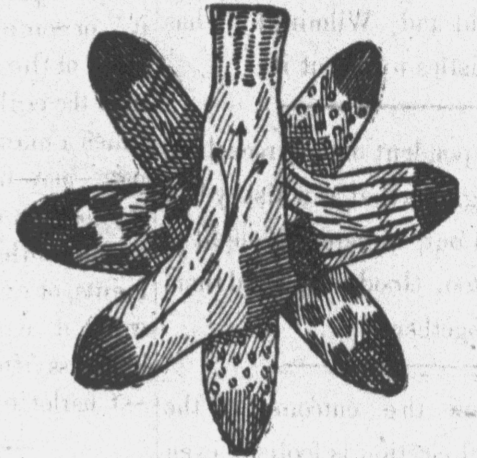

If England does take a hand in the war in the East there will likely be a general mix up.

A correspondent of the Greensboro Record suggests that as whiskey had been voted out, cigarettes ought to go along, too. Good idea, send them both out together.

Betting on the outcome of the presidential election is foolish, even if it does show that the bettor has enough confidence in his favorite to risk his money on him.

The contending factions in the meat packers' strike have agreed to submit their differences to arbitration. Possibly when the trouble is over the cow will come a planet or two lower.

It is not likely that the next legislature will do much business in the way of incorporating country cross roads just to give whiskey distilleries a chance to operate. It would be better to revoke some charters already granted.

The democratic national committee will meet on the 26th and at that time will name a chairman. Judge Parker has made no suggestion as to who the chairman shall be but leaves the selection to the wisdom of the committee

The Merchants Journal published at Raleigh by W. H. Bagley with Norman H. Johnson editor, has made its appearance. It is in magazine form, 16 pages in size, and the first number is exceedingly handsome. It is the official organ of the North Carolina Retail Merchants Association and the Association of Wholesale Dealers, Millers and Manufacturers of the Carolinas. Such a publication as the Merchants Journal has a broad field of usefulness and the beginning indicates that its patrons will be well served.

New Jersey will hardly be taken for a pattern by other states while the limit of punishment for rape is only fifteen years in the penitentiary. It is true the three negroes who outraged a white woman got forty-nine years, but the court had to divide the offense into separate counts, one for burglary, one for assault and one for rape. The truth is they ought to have stretched hemp in the shortest time consistent with law and order and the best interest of the community.—Raleigh Times.

Other people besides those who live in the south are now interested in the fight against Rooseveltism as applied to the race question. The success of the president in accomplishing his purposes as they relate to this question would throw the southern states back into the reconstruction period. What that means to the south, the men who have reached middle life will remember. Thirty years ago the north looked on with little pecuniary interests involved. It is very different today. If the southern people suffer Northern capitalists must suffer.—Florida Times Union.

Collecting Accounts

Perhaps one of the most troublesome features of a modern commercial business is the collection of accounts. Many people are wholly inconsiderate of the collector and of the man or firm who has given the accommodation in the way of credit. "Come again," or, "I'll see about it," or some petty objection to the form of the account is too often all that the collector can get. Sometimes a man may not be prepared to pay—may not have the money. But if those who could just as well pay as not would volunteer their payments, or even facilitate the collector's work, it would help those whose business often needs the money due.—Charlotte Chronicle.

It has for many years been more or less the fashion for our manufacturers to chime in with northern high protection interests, and declare that a high protective tariff is beneficial to them. It is true that this view was presented largely in connection with the sound money arguments which appealed to the business judgment of bankers and financiers all over the country, and in that way goldbugism and high protection became twin sisters. Now that the financial question is settled, and settled right, southern business men and manufacturers are beginning to take an independent view of the tariff question just as they did twenty years ago with the same result. They find that the present high tariff is only a burden of monopoly for the immensely large capitalized concerns at the expense of the smaller independent ones.—Greensboro Record.
