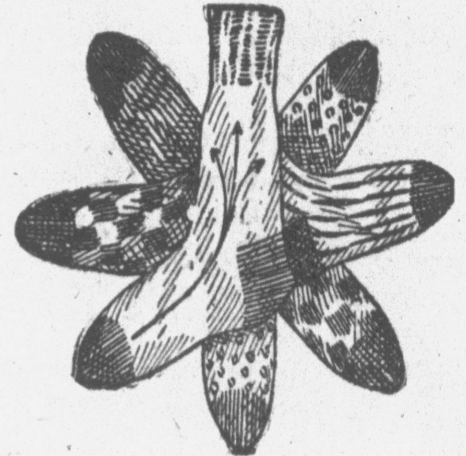

If Wilmington don't find out "how come" the encampment to go to Morehead it will not be the fault of the chamber of commerce.

The Charlotte Chronicle is after these editors who clip out what others write and palm it off as their own without credit. Some of them are as hard to learn what is right in this particular as the anonymous correspondent who fails to sign his name.

The efforts of the ladies of the End of the Century Club to establish a public library in Greenville should awaken the interest every person in the community. The good to be derived from such an institution is beyond estimate, and the people should be glad of an opportunity to aid it.

Moonshining Not Put Down.

One of the questions of the day is, are the county officers in North Carolina doing their duty? The Watts law, drafted by Senator Simmons and Governor Aycock, and enacted by the Legislature, imposes a clear duty upon county officers, the duty of breaking up illicit distilling of whiskey, etc. Revenue Agent Chapman, of Greensboro, is here and the Observer correspondent had a special interview with him which throws much light upon the neglect of duty along this particular line by county officers. Col. Chapman is a Confederate veteran, who was a lieutenant colonel in Mosby's famous command. He has served in the revenue service in Tennessee for years. When asked what was being done in this State in the way of capturing moonshiners he replied: "Last month we captured 40 illicit distilleries, an increase of eight over the preceding month. I am not prepared to say whether moonshining is increasing in North Carolina or not, but fear that it is. Besides the stills we captured we got 2,400 gallons of whiskey, which was buried and which would have escaped taxation. We also captured four horses and four waggons and buggies. I have been in Tennessee where they have a law somewhat similar to your Watts law in this State but there the county officers are strict in carrying the law into effect, and they have driven out the moonshiners except along the boundary of the State. From them and from Tennessee revenue officers I now receive information of the presence of illicit distilleries which are being operated across the line in North Carolina. Such a notice reached me yesterday. In Tennessee the county officers co-operate thoroughly with us in putting down illicit distilleries, and not only so but they give information as to the location of stills and also co-operate with us in seizing them. There is not a particle of co-operation with us in North Carolina and not a solitary county officer has offered the least assistance. We have appeals from citizens in a number of sections that their business is being interfered with by illicit distillers and retailers these appeals being coupled with the statement that the county officers are

not paying the slightest attention to these matters. The letters call upon the government to capture the law-breakers." Col. Chapman when saying this was in the office of Revenue Collector Duncan, and said to the latter: "You have received many complaints I am sure?" "Yes," replied Collector Duncan, "plenty of them."

No doubt this interview will attract attention and will arouse the Anti-Saloon League to a sense of the situation. No doubt some county officers think it popular to be on the side of the moonshiners and the whiskey sellers but as one of the most popular men in the State remarked a few days ago, they will find out later what a sad mistake they have made. This gentleman went on to say that he expected within the next four years to see the sale of liquor prohibited or regulated in every county in North Carolina; this is that within that period there will be either prohibition or the dispensary system in all parts of the State. Perhaps the interview will arouse some of the county officers to a sense of their duty.—Raleigh Cor. Charlotte Observer.

Editor Johnson, of Charity and Children, has a rather poor opinion of society. He says: "Now if 'society' was not a painted and hollow mockery it would banish its wine and punch bowls and join in with the moral forces to rid the State of the saloons. But 'society' has neither heart nor head, and nothing need be expected from this direction." Easy. Wait until the prohibition trumpet sounds its warning note in Charlotte on January 1. The punch bowls will have to go. Where is society to get its stuff if the wicked common people cannot get it? There is going to be a whole lot of frills clipped off in this town when prohibition comes in.—Charlotte Chronicle.

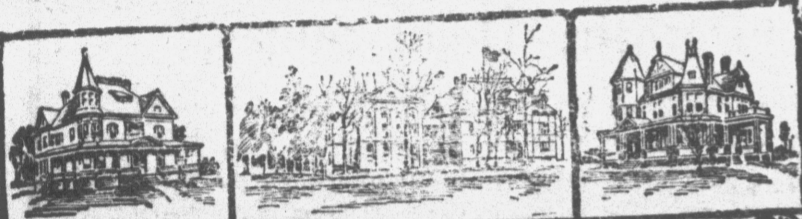

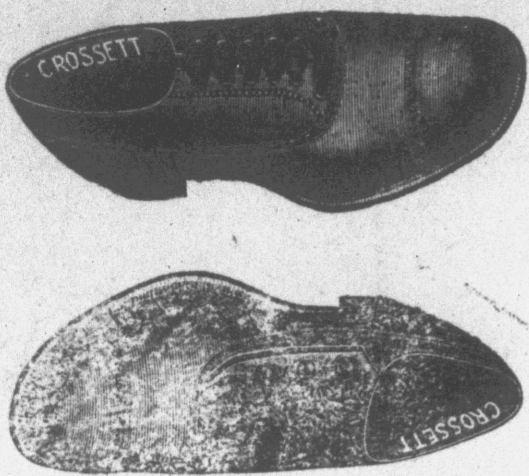
