## STATE NEWS.

North Carolina has had an abundance of rain for the past few days

A large number of Parker-Glenn Clubs have been organized in our state. Let those towns and localities which have not already gotten in line do so.

The voters of Wilmington will decide today on the question of the dispensary or open saloons. The indications are that the dispensary side will win.

Governor Aycock and Supt. of Public Instruction, J. Y. Joyner, are in the eastern part of the state, where they are making a number of educational addresses.

Judge Thomas Norfleet Hill, a well known lawyer of Halifax, died at his home Sunday. Judge Hill ran for chief justice against Judge Walter Clark two years ago.

The attendance at the A. and M. summer school which is in session at Raleigh is very large, and new arrivals are coming in daily. It is hoped that the number will reach a thousand.

Mr. Josephus Daniel, editor of the News and Observer, is in New York attending the meeting of the national Democratic Executive committee. Mr. Daniel is the member from North Carolina.

Gray B. Speight, who was cut in the right temple in Goldsboro Saturday night between eleven and twelve o'clock, died yesterday. When found he was leaning on a fence near Brown's store in Goldsboro and was evidently very weak from loss of blood. Chas. Wilkins, of Goldsboro, was held for the murder.

Speight was at one time a police man of Goldsboro. He leaves a wife and one child.

Mr. J. F. Tayloe, Chief Marshal

The election of Mr. Joseph F. Tayloe as chief marshal for the state fair of 1904 is a deserved recognition of the merits of a young man and a deserved compliment to our sister town. The News and Observer relative to his election says:

"Mr. Taylor is well known throughout the state as one of its most progressive and able young men. He has a host of friends in eastern North Carolina, and with his well known energy and ability it is certain that the social events of the state fair will be admirably managed.

Mr. Tayloe is not alone well known in social life in the state, but politically also. He was one of the North Carolina delegates to the National Democratic convention from the first district.

In an appreciative letter accepting the appointment, Mr. Tayloe wrote the state fair officials, saying that he would give his most earnest efforts to the duties of the position. He says that he expects to have at the state fair, marshals from the mountains to the seashore, representing every part of the state.

## DOWN BY THE SEA.

MOREHEAD CITY, N. C., July 26.

North Carolina newspaper folks are enjoying a whiff of old ocean's breeze and taking square meals at the Atlantic Hotel this week. A few of the fraternity have straggled in ahead to take a bath and get rested before the convention meets. A large crowd of the editors are expected on the train tonight and the session of the convention will begin tomorrow morning. Two events already announced in honor of their meeting here are a ball Wednesday night and a banquet Thursday night.

Those of us coming ahead have found time to stroll around this afternoon and note improvements about the Atlantic Hotel. Electric lights have taken the place of gas, rooms have been refurnished, new baths have been built, verandas and walks enlarged and extended, and everything seems at hand for the pleasure of those who come.

There are several hundred people at the hotel and it is very de lightful. Manager Cooke is leaving nothing undone for the comfort of his guests. The Greenville people here are having their own time, so to speak.

Coming down on the train with that veteran and prince of conductors, Capt. Charlie Hancock, he told us of a remarkable incident. He says while going from here to Goldsboro, one day last week, his train jumped the track. Two trucks of the engine and tender got off and ran three hundred yards on the crossties and the train was stopped without the passengers knowing a thing had happened. "But the most remarkable thing," he added, "I had a box containing 60 dozen eggs in the baggage car and not an egg was broken."

We found coming along that rains have been excessive the past week through all the eastern section. No crops have been seen surpassing those in Pitt.

Bryan Cannot Go.

Monday Hon. William J. Bryan passed through Columbus, O., en route to Delaware Springs, Chautauqua, where he delivered an address in the evening. While in Columbus he gave out the following interview:

After strong opposition in the outset, Thomas Taggart, of Indiana was unanimously elected chairman. Colonel Guffey, of Pennsylvania, was elected as treasurer, and Hon. Urey Woodson, of Kentucky, as secretary.

John S. Martin, of Missouri, was elected sergeant-at-arms and Samuel Donelson of Tennessee assistant.

John Sharp Williams, of Tennessee, temporary chairman of the St. Louis Convention, that his notification meeting would be held at White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., on August 17th.

## PITT COUNTY CROPS

A drive through the rural sections of this county is a rare treat. We believe that no county in the state has more fertile fields or more industrious men of brown who till the soil.

Notwithstanding the recent copious rains and daily thunderstorms the crops in this section are most excellent. Political upheavals and partisan discussions disturb not the even tenor of our way and despite all these things, Pitt county farmers are forging to the front. If cotton brings good prices this fall and crops continue as they now are there will be some joyous tillers of the soil in this county at the Christmas festivities.

The republicans are against temperance legislation and if so many of their votes had not been cut off they would have made themselves felt.—Durham Herald.

On any question it is always well to take stock and examine the crowd that stands with you. Now the Temperance question is not to be considered as a party question, for it is vastly broader and deeper than any political propaganda. It is a moral question.

Their crowd is composed of red-nosed toppers, criminals, second rate politicians and negroes. Fortunately the last class have not much to do in present day discussions from a voting standpoint. But as the Herald aptly remarks had they not been deprived of their franchise privilege, the weight of their vote would have been felt, and no one doubts where that weight would have gone.

## GREENVILLE GRADED SCHOOLS.

The people of Greenville and surrounding community are greatly pleased with the success of our Graded schools here both white and colored. We consider ourselves fortunate in having as our Supt. Prof. W. B. Dove, who is a great educator and a christian gentleman.

Last year, which was the first year of the graded school system in our town, proved the system to be a good one, four hundred students having been enrolled during the year. This is a great increase over the number that attended school last year.

The school building for white children is a handsome structure of two stories, and is built of pressed brick. It is located in a quiet but secluded part of town on Evans street and is easily reached from any home in town.

The building for colored children is a beautiful wooden structure consisting of a single story. It is conveniently located in the western part of town, and is easily reached by the majority of the colored children.

In selecting teachers for these schools, great care is manifested, and no effort is spared in procuring only those who are competent and experienced teachers.

The fall term opens Sept. 1st, when, it is estimated, five hundred students will be enrolled.
