N. C. PRESS ASSOCIATION.

Thirty-Second Annual Session at Morehead.

MOREHEAD CITY, N. C. July 27th.

The North Carolina Press Association met here today in its 32nd annual session. While there are 60 to 75 of the editors of the state now at Morehead, not half of them were in the hall when the convention was called to order, the absenters concluding there was more fun in going fishing with Bill Bailey than in taking part in the business matters of the association. The fact is, since Bailey got here last night he has done little but talk about big fishing he has done, and he set about half of the craft crazy to go out and try their luck this morning.

The convention was called to order at 10 o'clock by President H. B. Varner, and prayer was offered by Eld. P. D. Gold.

Governor Aycock, who was to have delivered the address of welcome, was prevented from being present, his substitute also failing to be on hand, this feature was passed over for the time.

Several new members were received at this session.

The address of President Varner contained some valuable suggestions to the association.

J. A. Robinson, historian, gave an interesting and humorous review of events of the past year of the association's history. His story was good.

General Fitzhugh Lee is here and will deliver an address tonight on the Jamestown centennial to be held in 1907.

At the afternoon session the address of welcome was delivered by C. L. Abernethy, of Beaufort, and responded to by Archibald Johnson.

A number of important matters were discussed at today's sessions.

LET'S PAVE.

No joking, it is high time that some of the streets of our town were being paved. A ride from the Coast Line depot up Dickinson Avenue and Evans street to the Post office will convince the most doubtful that the next step for us to take is to pave these streets.

This can be done at a comparatively small price and the result will be more than pleasing.

And these streets are not the only ones in our city that need paving. When we consider the size of our town, the amount of business done here, and the energy and zeal of our people, we are surprised that so many of our streets are in their present condition.

Then let us get together and make our streets compare with some of the elegant homes built on them.

Chairman Simmons has notified Chairman Rollins that the State Executive Committee of the Democratic party has provided for joint discussion between the Democratic and Republican candidates in the state.

It has been given out that the Republican candidate, Mr. Harris, was not going to meet the Democratic candidate, Mr. Glenn, but the Asheville Citizen says:

"Hon. Charles J. Harris, Republican candidate for governor of North Carolina, will canvass the State.

"This statement was made to the Citizen by Mr. Harris, who is here for a few days:

"It had been the current impression that Mr. Harris, who has not had much occasion to make public political talks, would not take the stump, but Mr. Harris having put his hand to the plough, will not shirk any of the duties of a candidate. He will about Sept. 20, make a six weeks' tour in eastern Carolina and occupy the time with addresses to the people. He will be accompanied by Hon. Thomas Settle and others. Those who know say that while Mr. Harris makes no pretensions to political speaking, he is a good talker and as his ability as a thinker and worker is unquestioned they predict that he will make a good impression."

Then, we understand that Mr. Harris has been careful to put his hand to the plough that doesn't appear to be one that will drag him before Captain Glenn. However, he may bear in mind that wherever he ploughs, Captain Glenn's plough will also go deep into the soil and cause it to bring forth abundant fruit.

The Legislature of Georgia has increased the Governor's salary to \$5,000 per year. No doubt there are other Governors who feel like saying "Go do then likewise."

The political campaign of 1904 was formally opened July 27th, by Theodoro Roosevelt at his country home, Sagamore Hill. In the presence of one hundred and twenty-five persons, including relatives and friends, he formally received and accepted the Republican nomination for President of the United States.

The two speeches, that of the notification by speaker Cannon and that of acceptance by President Roosevelt were very good. However we notice a rather pleading tone about them, and feel confident that democrats can read them without being warped in their beliefs.

In nominating Mr. Simmons for reelection as chairman, Mr. Wilson G. Lamb, of Williamston, stated that since he had been a member of the committee no distinguished chairman had been more responsive to the demands made on him; that none had been more courageous nor possessed more tact and ability than the retiring chairman. This is the record everywhere of a great man, who so ably lead the party through the campaign, and who will again lead it to victory his campaign.

Together with this, the reelection of Mr. Alex J. Field as secretary of the State committee is very gratifying. During his term in this position, Mr. Fields has shown himself a most excellent man for this position. With such men as these in charge, we expect greater things than ever before.

A City of Working Girls.

"Speaking about a city of working girls, there is no city in this country and possibly not in the world that for its size can beat Jackson, Mich., remarked Oscar A. Foster, to a group of traveling men who were discussing the subject of female employment.

"A woman suffragist could make a success of it in that town. Recently a newspaper in my city took a census of girls who roomed and found that the number exceeded 4,000. Add this to the many hundreds who live with their parents and you will appreciate better what I mean to say. These girls are employed in the corset and underwear factories of Jackson, which are by far the largest in the world. They are a happy lot and it certainly is a sight to watch them coming out of the factories when the day's work is done. The streets in the evening are so crowded with these working girls who promenade up and down Main street that mere man sinks into insignificance.—Ex.

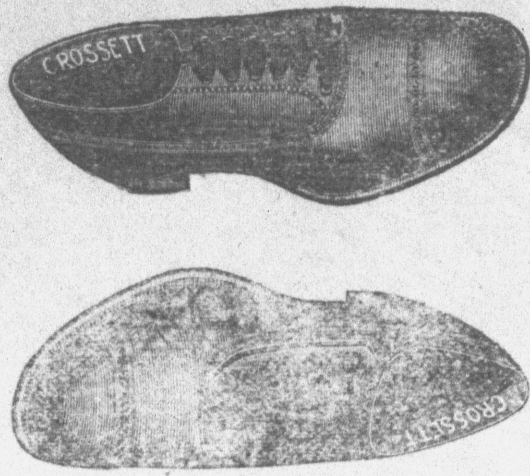
