TOBACCO MARKET OPENED.

Fine Beginning of New Season.

The Greenville tobacco market began the new season today under most favorable conditions. The sales were not large, but this was as expected, the farmers being nearly a month later in their curing than last year.

An encouraging feature of the sale was the good prices that prevailed, being fully fifty per cent, higher than that at the opening a year ago. Most of the offerings today were first primings, yet the prices ranged from 3 to 17 cents which was very gratifying to the sellers. Smokers or first primings, green or dark, 3 to 4 1-2 cents; bright and clean smokers 5 to 9 cents; bright and clean cutters 10 to 16 cents.

The first sale was at the Farmers warehouse, proceeding through the other houses in regular order. There is a good force of buyers on the market and they are going to keep prices here up to the best.

As business is expected to be light for the first month of the season—the warehouses have not yet put on their full complement of employees, but as at present constituted they are as follows:
