The orphanage at Montreat, near Asheville, was totally destroyed by fire Saturday afternoon. There were twenty-four children in the house but all were saved without much difficulty.

A republican nominee for judge in West Virginia, and a republican nominee for presidential elector in the same state, have both resigned and declared for Parker and Davis. Wonder if that don't give Steve Elkins the shakes.

The excessive rains are doing much damage to crops. The prospects of a week ago, which were at that time the best on record, have declined greatly and every day that the rain continues makes the condition worse.

NEITHER BORROW NOR STEAL.

The Free Press is a modest little sheet in its way, yet it flatters itself that it is worth something. It certainly costs something to get it out, and unless the money we put into it is lost in the general shake up the output should be worth a considerable sum.

At least we don't consider the Free Press deserves the fate of being either borrowed or stolen or put at the mercy of the deadbeat. Yet it is subjected to these three dangers.

PRESENT DAY NEWS.

Whenever a man gets in public position, even his private affairs become public property, and no little detail of his movements seems too small or trivial for the reporters to send to the papers. Here is an item we see about the democratic nominee for vice-president: "Elkins, W. Va., Aug. 7.—In keeping with his usual custom, Henry G. Davis attended services at the Presbyterian church, both morning and evening, today, the interim being spent quietly about his home.

After dinner he took a walk about the grounds, visiting his deer park, in which are a dozen West Virginia mountain deer and looking over other interesting scenes about his beautiful farm."

That is great news. In about the same way they tell when Judge Parker goes a swimming, and if Cleveland spends half an hour rocking the baby it is flashed over the wires for the public to read. And if Roosevelt comes out with a little blacker hued necktie than he wore the last time this is the foundation for an item. Even the female members of the households do not escape the reporter's pen, and sometimes equally ridiculous items are printed about them.

Republicans claim that the Democrats are not fighting fair, in making the paramount issue of the campaign Roosevelt, instead of the tariff, imperialism or some other subject that they could more easily handle. But Roosevelt is not kicking. He likes to be in the public eye and he has conceit enough to believe that the public likes to gaze at him, and that his record can stand publicity. The tide against Rooseveltism is strong though, and unless there is a turn, he will soon be a private citizen of some New York county, for the first time since he last accepted a public office.—Wilington Messenger.

An Index of Progress.

We learn from an exchange that the president of the Southern railroad reports that the past year has been by far the most successful one in the history of that corporation. This statement must be regarded as significant, to say the least. As we have repeatedly urged, there is no better index to the progress or decline of a section than the increase or decrease in the net earnings of its railroads for this is indicative of a prosperity or retrogression that is not confined to any particular class of people. Judged by this standard alone it would seem that the south is making unprecedented progress along industrial lines just at present. 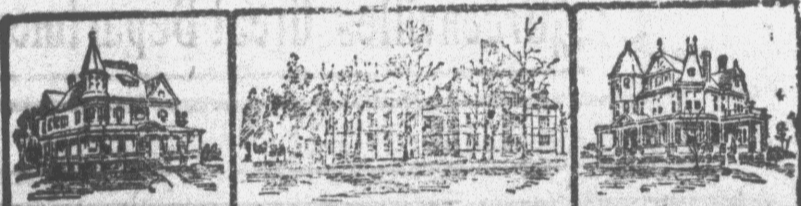

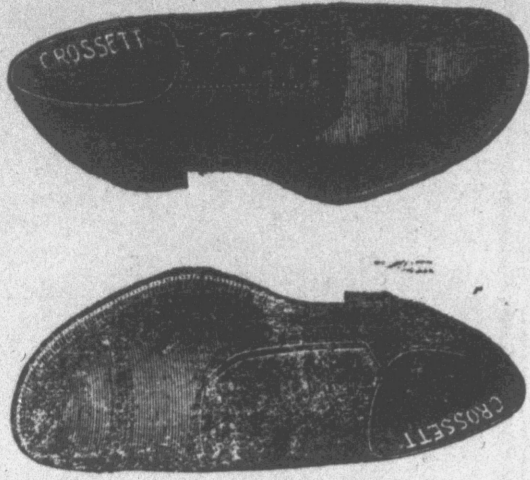
