A KNOTTY PROBLEM.

Is Mr. Arthur Liable to Tax?

The board of aldermen held a special meeting Friday night to consider a knotty problem. The facts drawn out of the case are these: Engineer J. L. Ludlow, who is having the water works and electric light plants constructed for the town, had several car loads of iron pipe that he wanted distributed along the streets. He tried to secure team in town to do this hauling but could not get any at a price considered reasonable. He then went out of town to L. C. Arthur and from him hired a double team and driver for the day with which to do the hauling, the team being sent in every morning and returned home at night.

What the aldermen have to do with this is the question of license tax. The town levies a license tax on public drays of \$5 per year for each horse used, persons who do only their individual hauling not being subject to the tax. The town also levies a license tax of \$25 per year on livery businesses.

The question before the aldermen is whether Mr. Arthur is liable to tax? If so, what tax? Neither Mr. Arthur nor Mr. Ludlow were represented at the meeting of the aldermen, but it was admitted that Mr. Ludlow was not liable to any tax from the fact he is doing only his own hauling and not operating public dray. It is said that Mr. Arthur's contention is that he is not liable to any tax, as he is not doing any draying but has hired out his team by the day to a party to do hauling for himself.

The aldermen discussed the matter from every standpoint, a majority of them holding the opinion that while Mr. Arthur is not subject to dray license tax under the circumstances, he is subject to livery license tax because of the fact that he is hiring his team for use in town and delivers the team and driver to the renter each morning. By a vote of 4 to 1 the aldermen instructed the tax collector to make demand upon Mr. Arthur for livery license tax the decision also being that if he resists paying the tax the question will be tested in the courts.

A Valuable Paper

In the explorations among the old records, which Secretary of State Grimes is carrying on, there was today discovered a document of much interest bearing the signature of "Geo. Washington" while the father of his country was president of the United States.

The paper, which is written in a remarkably plain handwriting (not Washington's, however) consists of four pages, legal cap size, and is addressed to "The governor and council of the State of North Carolina" and bears the date of "New York, June 19th, 1789." It is a reply to an address sent him by the governor and council of state of North Carolina, and treats of political subjects and party divisions. Here is a quotation.

"A difference of opinion on political points is not to be imputed to Freemen as a fault; since it is to be presumed that they are all actuated by an equally laudable and sacred regard for the liberties of their country."

This document is the latest find Secretary Grimes has made, it having been found this morning.

Possibly the greatest danger is from sickness that may follow the wet spell.

At Ocean Grove, N. J., a singing evangelist caught a bug in his mouth while singing and came near choking to death. He should not open his mouth so wide next time.

A child and a box of lye came near causing a tragedy in Durham. These two are a combination as dangerous as a boy and a gun, or a woman and a kerosene can.

Senator Fairbanks is a candidate on the republican national ticket, but there is no intimation that he is going to resign the position he already holds. Possibly he regards that as sure and that it is best to hold on to a certainty.

Now and then a philanthropist steps forward with a liberal donation to some of the state's institutions. E. M. Armfield, of High Point, has made a gift of \$5,000 for the endowment of a library for English Philology at the University.

The State Farmers' Alliance at its recent meeting in Hillsboro adopted a resolution opposing the lease of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad. A reason given in the resolution is that it seems that the railway systems of the state will at no distant day be in the hands of foreign corporations working together as a practical monopoly. The resolution further stated that instead of leasing the road it should be extended by convict labor and become a power in the hands of the corporation commission to protect the people of the state from excessive rates.

THE REFLECTOR has about reached the conclusion that the spirit of license taxes is wrong. It looks like a tax upon industry. Take the merchant for example: He pays his ad valorem tax on what he possesses, has to pay another tax for the privilege of doing business, and in addition to this has a still further tax of a certain per cent on his gross sales. Other examples might be given in which special taxes are equally unjust, but this one is sufficient to illustrate the point in mind. In many instances license taxes are overworked and are burdensome. We are not prepared to offer a substitute, but it would be better to encourage industry rather than hinder it.

Asheville, after having for fifteen years one continuous session a day of her city schools, has returned to the old plan of having two sessions a day, with a recess in each. An hour and fifteen minutes is allowed for dinner. Unquestionably the old plan is the best, as it permits children to get regular meals at customary hours. The Greensboro school authorities would do well to follow Asheville's example and discard a fad which is responsible for more indigestion than anything ever saddled onto the rising generation. —Greensboro Patriot.

It is good that some notice is being taken of this matter. The trustees of the Greenville graded school might consider it with profit. We believe the present day method of

crowding the day's work into one session is very harmful to the children. Go back to the old method of two sessions a day with a reasonable intermission for dinner.

A special to The Observer from Wilson says that a negro boy who rocked a boat near there was drowned, his companions being able to swim when thrown into the water. Fate is not always so prompt, and it was never perhaps more just than in this case. —Charlotte Observer.

Quite true. It is usually the fool who rocks the boat that escapes, while those who are so unfortunate as to be in the boat with him fall victims to his folly.

Scientists now declare that the bite of a snake will cure leprosy. The remedy is not so bad when it is considered that men know what will cure snake bite. —Wilmington Star.

Did you ever hear of a Governor coming from the ranks of the ball room gents, who wear swallow-tail coats and shirt fronts as big as a tray? We do not recall one, but many have hauled rails in the rain, and driven spotted oxen to town after a load of fertilizer. —Charity and Children.

Why not make Governor Aycock a member of the cabinet if Judge Parker should be elected? Some of the State papers have spoken of this recently, and we think the idea a capital one. North Carolina should be recognized now. No one would represent the State with more efficiency and credit than Chas. B. Aycock. —Mt Olive Tribune.

And, by the way, while so many nice things are being said about Judge Parker's letter of acceptance, it would not be amiss or untruthful to note that the Honorable Champ Clark, of Missouri, made something of a hit himself in formally presenting the convention's work to nominee. Mr. Clark's address was characterized by the best of taste, was dignified and of much force. —Raleigh Post.

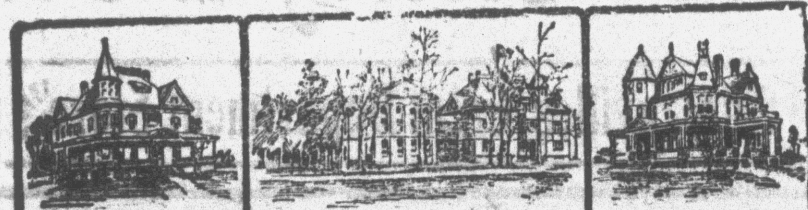

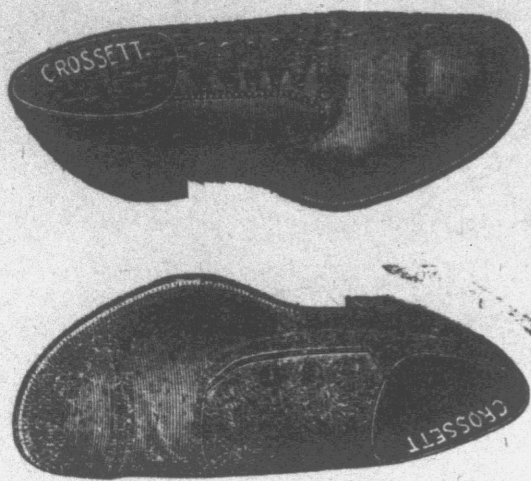

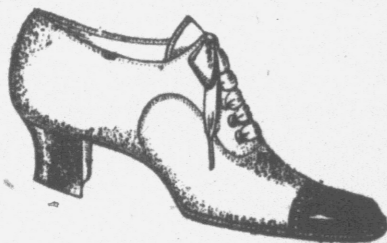
