#### WORKING TOGETHER.

Farmers' Consolidated Tobacco Company

This company that is now operating three warehouses on the Greenville tobacco market, is the outgrowth of careful study and mature reflection. Mr. O. L. Joyner conceived the idea of bringing the farmers together in the conduct of the tobacco warehouse business for their own protection and in their own interest, and after studying his plans thoroughly unfolded them to some leading farmers to get their views on it, and solicit their co-operation in case the plans met their approval.

The practicability of the plans was so apparent to all who learned them that in a short while enough farmers had united to form a company, purchase one warehouse and begin business.

It was in October of last year when the business started, yet it proved such a success from the first that when the season closed the stockholders received a dividend of 34 per cent.

Naturally such success interested more people in the organization, and the number of stockholders increased so that two more houses were secured and the company began business this season with three warehouses. And there is no doubt that the business will continue to enlarge until it also includes this as well as other markets.

It is the farmers working together in their own interest, selling their tobacco at their own warehouses and participating in the profits arising from the business. Managing the business as they do, less expense is incurred and the profits larger than individual houses.

Another advantage of the organization is that as it grows larger and stronger it will ultimately be in a position to give farmers many superior advantages never before realized, a condition that will be of vast benefit to every planter.

From our viewpoint it looks like the Farmers' Consolidated Tobacco Company is moving in the right direction and that every tobacco planter in reach of the market can greatly benefit himself by joining forces with it. If there is any class of people who ought to work together for their mutual benefit and interest it is the farmers, and they have a good opportunity before them in this organization in the warehouse business.

It was a graceful tribute from a grateful people. But one thought but one purpose, so far as he was concerned, animated the convention. Following the nomination of Mr. Small, the convention took up the business of naming judge and solicitor. For the judgeship George W. Ward, the present solicitor, was nominated. For the office of solicitor the convention named H. S. Ward.

#### Davis Notified.

White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Aug. 17.—Henry G. Davis today was formally notified of and formally accepted his nomination by the democratic party for vice-president of the United States. The ceremonies took place in the open air in the grounds of Greenbrier White Sulphur Springs Hotel, and were marked by simplicity in every detail. Mr. Davis was escorted to the flag draped platform at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon by Representative John Sharpe Williams, of Mississippi, who delivered notification address. An invocation by the Right Rev. Dr. W. L. Gravatt, of the Episcopal diocese of West Virginia, preceded Mr. Williams address. It took Mr. Davis ten minutes to read his formal acceptance, but he prefaced this with a heart to heart talk of like duration to the several thousand friends and neighbors who were gathered under the trees as his audience.

#### Tobacco Sales.

Since the market opened Aug. 1st, sales have been very light, only a few loads being brought in each day. Today, however, there was considerably more, though not enough to keep the buyers longer than an hour at all the houses.

Prices are fully as high or higher than at the opening. There were several piles that sold from \$16 to \$20.

Lugs—common, 3 to 5; common to good, 4 to 8.

Cutters—thin and light, 10 to 15. Good leaf, 16 to 20.

The Wilmington Star thinks it worthy of note that a Marion county, Ga., farmer produced a 57 pound watermelon. They are growing 70 pound melons in Pitt this season.

The congressional convention at Edenton, Wednesday, renominated John H. Small by acclamation. This was as expected, and is what the people of his district wanted.

Hon. W. A. B. Branch, of Beaufort county, a former congressman of this district, has been nominated by the people of his county to represent them in the next state legislature. And it goes without saying that Mr. Branch will do his duty in the legislature and represent his people faithfully.

The Raleigh Times thinks that the men in North Carolina whose achievements are out of the ordinary, whose life would be an inspiration to coming generations, could be counted on the fingers of one hand with probably some fingers to spare. That is a very small estimate to place upon the men who are making a great state. No doubt there are scores, yea hundreds, of men in North Carolina whose achievements are out of the ordinary and whose lives would be an inspiration to coming generations. Belittling our own people is not in good taste.

The mob spirit is rife in portions of Georgia. Near Statesboro in that state negroes recently murdered a man and his wife and three children and burned down the house upon their bodies. The murderers had been captured and the trial was in progress. Two of them had already been found guilty and sentenced to be hanged, when a frenzied mob gathered, rushed into the court house, dragged out the two condemned negroes, chained them to a stump, saturated their clothing with oil, applied the torch and stood by as the victims of their wrath writhed in the tortures of the flames. Such madness! The scene is horrible and one turns from it with shame for the people who would commit such a crime in the face of the court using all possible speed to mete out just punishment to the negroes.

**Paid an Old Debt—An Honest Man.**  
Mr. J. H. Hoffmann, was telling yesterday of an incident that doesn't occur often, but one which happens occasionally to renew our faith in man. When Hoffmann Bros. retired from the grocery business in Statesville about 20 years ago they had many unpaid accounts on the books—and some are there yet. One of those accounts was against a citizen of the town, which was afterward reduced from about \$80 to \$50. Then, about 14 years ago, the debtor died, his family was scattered and Mr. Hoffmann considered the account closed.

But a son of the debtor who had been away came home to his father's funeral, and while here paid \$10 on the account, with the promise that

he would, if he ever was able, pay the whole account. Mr. Hoffmann didn't hold the young man responsible and thought no more of the matter. Later he received \$5 on the account and yesterday the young man, who had prospered in another State, walked into Mr. Hoffmann's office and asked for the bill. Mr. Hoffmann told him he had no claim against him and whatever he choose to pay on the account would be satisfactory. But the account was paid in full. The action stamps this party (whose name is withheld because he might not like the notoriety) as a thoroughly honest man. He could easily have escaped payment because Mr. Hoffmann did not hold him liable. But he is not that kind. The account was paid in full.—Statesville Landmark.

**Miss Alice Wears a Snake.**  
A grass snake about two feet long and as big around as a lead pencil, is Miss Alice Roosevelt's latest pet. She sometimes wears it as an ornament and is making desperate efforts to have society take the snake up as a fad. So far she has not met with much success, although she has impressed all of her friends with the fact that the snake is harmless.

The President's daughter found her new pet hanging from a gas bracket in a bird and pet animal store. "Isn't that just grand," she exclaimed; "let me have it." She fondled the snake lovingly, wound it around her neck and shoulders and went away greatly delighted with her discovery. The next time she went automobile riding Miss Roosevelt wore her snake coiled about her neck, and it remained there quite contentedly. The living ornament was mistaken by most people who noticed it for green chain. It was only the young lady's friends who were enlightened and given a momentary scare.—Ex.

**Little Bits of War News.**  
Liao Yang, Aug. 16.—During the past few days Port Arthur has been bombarded without cessation. Many of the inhabitants are leaving.

London, Aug. 16.—Lloyd's agent at Shanghai cables that the Russian cruiser Askoid has gone into dry dock and that the destroyer Gross-ovoi is being dismantled.

London, Aug. 16.—A dispatch to the Telegraph from Tsingtao says that the Czarevitch has not been disarmed, but she is useless. Her crew proceed to Russia, leaving a guard on board.

**Mr. Bailey Not a Candidate.**

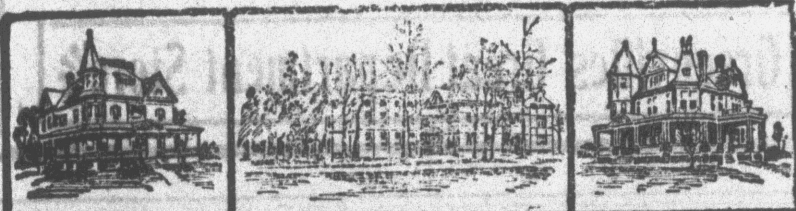

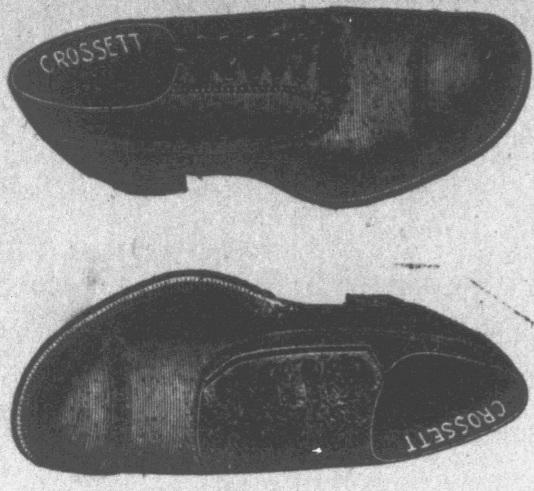
