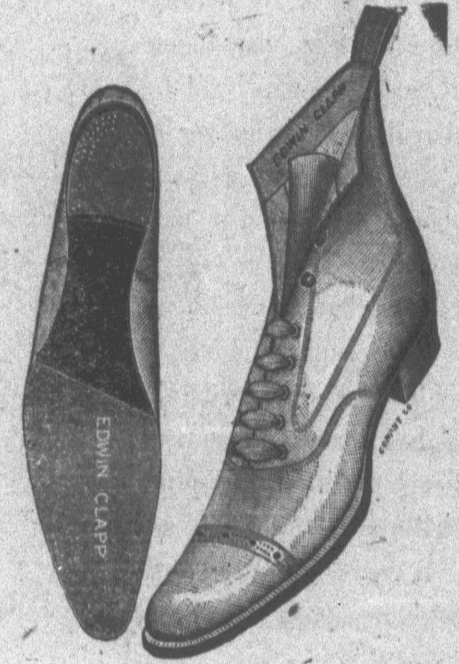

They lost their lives by their own willful disobedience and carelessness and no one else should be blamed.

## IN THE DARKNESS

As to fear in battle, we all had an attack of "nerves" now and then, even up to the colonels, but as for being downright scared I had a couple of experiences I will tell you about. If I hadn't been alone at the time I should have probably been drummed out of the army for cowardice. There was one thing I dreaded more than a battle, and that was standing on picket alone at night.

On the night I have in mind I was stationed about twenty rods north of a log cabin occupied by a farmer's family, and the Confederate picket was supposed to be about the same distance on the other side. I was not on the highway, but in a fringe of bushes along one line of an old field. It was a darkish night in autumn, with a breeze kicking up a shindy all around, and when I was told to fall out at Post No. 6 and keep my eyes and ears open I got homesick at once.

The first thing I did was to move along the fringe about thirty feet and then lie flat down. I could see out across the field in the direction of the house and the Confederate picket, though but dimly. There was no light in the house, and no sounds came from it.

I hadn't been on post thirty minutes when I had a regular attack of "nerves." I didn't realize it until I found myself chattering and trembling and half crying, and then I got up and kicked myself and did some tall swearing. I fully realized that I had to break the spell or bolt, and there was a hard fight before I got the better of my nerves.
