IMPROVE THE ROADS.

Cottontale, N. C., Aug. 29, 1904.
EDITOR REFLECTOR:

I wish to endorse the article in your paper a few days back signed "Citizen of Greenville" with reference to the needed improvement of our public highways. The time has come for us to make an effort to get some relief on this line, and it is encouraging to find "Citizen of Greenville" bringing this matter before the public.

While the spirit of enterprise is being manifested in various ways in our county, and especially in Greenville, our public roads are being neglected to the serious detriment of progress in all directions. There are roads in our county that have not been worked for over two years. The present road law served a good purpose in its day, but the spirit of progress now demands better roads than this old system is giving. Nature has done too much for our county to permit this important matter to remain neglected.

It would be hard to even approximate the far reaching effect of a system of up-to-date road building in our county. It would mean the cultivation of more social intercourse between all, country and town, better church attendance, better school attendance cause us to place a higher value on our country homes, increase the demand for country investments, put the country people generally on a higher plain of living, and add to the spirit of contentment with country life.

These improvements would simply be in line with rural free delivery, telephones and improved facilities for our schools.

How to bring about this improvement on our public highways I will not here attempt to say. I hope our legislators will take the same view of this matter as the writer, and others of our county.

War news takes second place now with local politics.

If Pitt county is to be decently represented in the next legislature there is work for the true Democrats to do in the first ten days in September.

Ex-Congressman Shuford, of Hickory, says he has been commissioned to re-organize the Populist party in North Carolina. Pretty hard thing to do, we think.

The proposed lease of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad is the absorbing topic of the week. Just what the outcome will be cannot be predicted but it is hoped that what is best for all interested will be done.

A freight conductor of the Southern railway whose home is at Spencer, has been arrested for stealing goods from cars in his charge. It has developed that he had a well constructed cave on his premises in which to secrete stolen goods.

Ex-Governor and ex Senator David B. Hill, of New York, announces that he will retire from active politics at the close of the present campaign. Our educational institutions are provided for, and the public school fund only needs to be supplemented in some sections by special tax levies. What we want is to apply every dollar of the surplus funds over and above what we have heretofore received, even to the lowering of taxes, or to the permanent improvement of our streets and roads.—Raleigh Times.

A True Picture.

In his speech a few nights ago in Brooklyn Senator Bailey, of Texas, said:

"They tell us that the President is honest. Let us grant it, but let us remember that he is as erratic as he is honest. They tell us that the President is brave, and so he is, but he is as rash as he is brave. If we were seeking a soldier, I would prefer the President over almost any other man now in public life, but as we are seeking a statesman, I would prefer almost any man who is in public life over the President. He would be one of the best men to lead a desperate charge in time of war; but he is one of the worst men to administer a great government in time peace."

There is one other trait just as prominent as those alluded to, and that is his stolid indifference, his persistent irreverence to that which is sacred to the heart of all true Americans. This he has manifested in the only way in which it is possible to destroy the social relations which are necessary for the happiness and prosperity of both races. His conduct in this particular has no precedent among men in his class, and it only needs a comparatively few like him to destroy the present social status between the races.

He has over-shot his own party associates, with but few exceptions. Social equality is an American distinction, and is not confined to any party. It is neither confined to any section, but North, South, East, and West wherever the stars and stripes is seen, declares this country is a unit forever in the social separation of the two races.

Mr Roosevelt with his splendid intelligence, with his ability to discriminate, has not realized the dire consequences of his rash act.—Raleigh Times.
