TO THE VOTERS OF PITT COUNTY

We are on the verge of a very important election, and one that every voter should consider carefully before he casts his vote in the primaries. It seems that our people are not worrying over anything but whiskey. Is it possible the good of our county depends upon the sale of whiskey? I, myself, was not an ardent advocate of the dispensary, but it is here and I try to see two sides to it. I find it is a good thing for the masses of people. It interferes only with the man who likes the social drink and right here is where three fourths of the drunkards start. Men who deal in either the sale or drinking of whiskey, are generally speaking very liberal people. Let a few get together and take a social drink, then they are not content until the crowd has treated around. By this time they are unfit to go home to their families. Now what per cent of the population of Pitt county is this class? Is it 5 per cent, or is it 10 per cent?

There were twenty-five or thirty saloons in Pitt county before the dispensary. With an average of two families to a saloon it will make about 1 per cent. of the population of Pitt county who got their living out of legitimate liquor dealing. Now is it right to jeopardize happiness and prosperity of the 90 per cent. or 95 per cent. of the population of the county to satisfy the thirst and profits of the few who have been getting their living out of it?

Another important thing to consider is this.—A few years ago we were raising a great fuss over being taxed to educate the negro, and wanted special legislation in town to prohibit it. Now some of our main aspirants for office who are opposed to the dispensary, were among the main howlers then, whereas, with the dispensary well conducted in town the negro will spend enough money for whiskey for the profits to educate their own children, this being the very thing the howlers pretended to want.

Pitt county, I consider is the banner county of the state in many respects. We should be puzzling our brains towards developing our resources in other lines that will prove more advantageous to us and our children than the whiskey traffic, for we all know earnestly and truthfully that the dispensary is better for us morally.

Our public roads might be considered seriously for one thing, for nothing in the county needs attention worse. I, for one, would be glad to see all the main leading roads from the county seat to the limits of the county line macadamized, which would cost about three thousand dollars per mile, the increase in the valuation of the property along these roads, the taxes of which would pay the interest on the debt, thereby relieving our people from the present trouble of working roads and enabling our country people far and near, to haul as much with two mules and wagon to market, as three such wagons and mules, thus saving the expense of two extra hands each day. With this system of roads in the county in ten years we would have at least five thousand people to immigrate here, as trucking could be carried on anywhere in the county. Hauling would be almost nothing, comparatively speaking, as to what it is now.

We might save something to help out in our road system in the salaries of a few officers in the county. The treasurer's office, for instance, should not pay more than six hundred dollars per year. The sheriff's office could be handled for less money, but I suppose we would have to have special legislation for that. Our town has pursued this course in cutting salaries, as our treasurer cost last year twelve hundred dollars, and

about that, and this year we get the same office filled for two hundred and fifty dollars. Our tax collector last year cost about one thousand dollars, this year six hundred dollars. You see we are saving nearly as much from the salaried offices of the town as the town received from the licensed saloons last year.

It is very necessary that we think over these things carefully, and not listen too much to the fellows who want office, as nine times out of ten he is talking for self and just a few. We want men to represent the masses as a whole in the legislature.

In nominating our county commissioners I do ask for one to be from the town of Greenville, and I would suggest our townsman, Jno. L. Wooten.

If the Japs keep advancing they will get there after awhile.

The postoffice at Enfield was robbed Monday night, the robbers getting away with about \$1,000 in cash and postage stamps. Such robberies are of frequent occurrence.

No doubt it gives the Charlotte Observer much comfort that an airship navigator starting from St. Louis, the other day, made a successful trip of 200 miles. They will fly right along some of these days.

It is hoped that the report is true that the Japanese government is to enter the bright tobacco markets as a competitor of the American Tobacco Co. If there is any chance of the farmers getting better prices for their tobacco we want to see it come, and any competitor on the markets will be welcomed.

Republican leaders are said to be expressing much uneasiness over the outlook that the next lower house of congress will have a majority of Democratic members. There is good ground for their uneasiness on this score, for the people of the country are growing weary under the burdens of Republicanism.

The democratic campaign will be conducted on the national colors this year—red, white and blue—Parker's red head, Davis's white head and Roosevelt's blues—the latter to develop after the election.—Raleigh Post.

Hobson hit the nail squarely on the head when he says that Roosevelt is largely responsible for the prevalence of the race issue during the present campaign. Both the cause and the issue ought to be eliminated, and will be.—Raleigh Post.

Raise in Pay of Rural Mail Carriers.

Some weeks ago the Evening Times printed a telegram from Washington announcing a raise in the pay of certain rural free delivery mail carriers.

Postmaster Bailey has received notice from the department at Washington that the pay of 393 rural free delivery carriers in this State has been raised to \$720 a year. In other words, all carriers appointed prior to July 1, 1904, will get \$720, regardless of the length of their routes. There are now 640 rural carriers in North Carolina, and the pay of these 393 who are to receive \$720 now ranges from \$648 to \$720. Postmaster Bailey yesterday drew a draft for \$20,000 for carriers' pay.—Raleigh Times.

The Harvest Moon.

The harvest moon is defined in the dictionary as follows: "The full moon that falls nearest the autumnal equinox. Owing to the fact that the full moon at time of autumnal equinox is in that part of its orbit where it makes the smallest angle with horizon it rises at nearly the same hour several nights in succession, thus giving an unusual proportion of moonlight evenings."

In Pennsylvania there is in every farming community a great harvest picnic by moonlight. The harvest moon comes when the nights have just become cool enough to be pleasant.

The harvest picnic in the light of the extra bright and extra soft light of the harvest moon is an exceeding ly pleasant sort of entertainment. It is particularly popular with the Pennsylvania German people.—Charlotte Chronicle.

The Bad Negro And The Saloon.

The Statesboro horror has been a disgrace to the South, but it is well to look into the origin of it all. A party of negroes went to the home of a peaceable farmer, killed him, outraged his wife and killed her, killed the four children, the youngest of them pitifully offering to buy her little life with a penny, before she was knocked in the head and writhing body thrown into the flames with those of her parents and the other children. This much has been learned from the confession of the criminals themselves. How much else of unspeakable horror was there God only knows.

The negroes were tried and condemned to death by hanging. The mob decided that hanging was too good for them, took the criminals from the helpless military, with their unloaded rifles, and burned them to death at the stake. But the Augusta Chronicle indicates that there was another cause at the bottom of the whole horrible business—whiskey, and adulterated whiskey at that. It says:

"Judge Daly says that the Bullock county farm negroes are laborious and orderly, but the 'turpentine negroes' are the criminally inclined. We boast for our great lumber region and its product, very justly, but if there are bad negroes in that woodpile, they should be driven out or reformed. The judge says that these 'turpentine negroes' generally go about armed with Winchester rifles, and it is probable that they also roam around loaded with villainous whiskey—for there is a doctored whiskey that a competent white man says will, when imbibed, make even a generally amiable Caucasian sufficiently degenerate to kill his own father. Given then a 'turpentine negro,' maddened with intoxicating poison and armed with a repeating rifle, we have fearful elements for unspeakable crime. It might be well for an expert to study the 'turpentine negro,' eliminated from fire-water and a deadly weapon. Then investigate him loaded within and without, abnormally intent upon evil. Pending such investigation, it would be well to extricate him from his deadly weapon, if be impossible to keep him from frenzied fluids."

Great Britain and the United States and Germany, Christian nations, have decided not to allow the importation of rum into the Pacific Islands, on account of the havoc it works among the "child races" of those islands. We have a "child race" among us. Charity would demand as great a restriction as possible of the liquor traffic on account of the presence of some eight million negroes in the Southern States. But there is a stronger appeal than the one of charity, namely: that of self preservation. The blackened bodies of that Georgia family make a stronger appeal. The charred corpses at the stake, with their grim threat of the collapse of Anglo-Saxon civilization itself, make a stronger appeal. Judge Daly and the Augusta Chronicle ought to know what they are talking about. And the argument of expediency and of appetite fall to the ground at the contemplation of such horrors.

We have settled the question in Charlotte, but it has become a political issue in North Carolina whether to restore to our rural communities the unspeakable saloon and to deprive the people of the police-protected communities of the privileges they now have as to abolition of the saloon. There is not a crime or a horror that can be traced to the drink-evil that is not aggravated by the saloon system, with greed urging it on to the increased sale, the cheapening by adulteration and the pandering to a more consuming thirst, that are the crimes of which greed is capable in the management of the saloon.

Eight million negroes, the saloon system and white civilization cannot all live together in the South. It would be better for the saloon to go and for it to stay out where it has been put out.—Presbyterian Standard.
