While ex-Senator D. B. Hill has declared his intention of quitting politics after this campaign, he is not failing to give Roosevelt and Republicanism some heavy parting blows.

Any Democrat in Pitt county who goes into a primary and supports a man whose platform is in opposition to the Watts law, is going directly against the principles of his party.

We hear of some men saying that they are going to the primaries next Saturday and vote for men who are opposed to the Watts law, but if they are outvoted in the primary and men favoring the Watts law are nominated they will not support the men nominated when the election comes. In other words these men are ready to bolt the party and go with independents or Republicans if they cannot control the primaries and secure the nomination of men opposed to the Democratic platform. THE REFLECTOR stands by its assertion that men who make such assertions should have no part in Democratic primaries.

W. A. Self, Democratic state elector at large, is a model example of true Democracy that some folks down in this section might emulate. Mr. Self represented Catawba county in the last legislature and when the Watts law came up for passage he vigorously opposed it, and he continued to fight the measure until the end even in the face of a strong petition from the people of his county favoring it asking him to withdraw his opposition. Now he recognizes that the Watts law is a party measure passed by the Democrats and unanimously approved by the party platform adopted in the state convention—and he stands squarely by it. He says if the Republicans try to make an issue of the Watts law they are going to make a "bust."

There was a wet looking conference held in Greenville on Thursday, the office of a legislative aspirant being headquarters for it. The invitations sent out to certain trustees to attend this conference said it was "to devise plans to save the Democratic party." Some of the "party savers" were on hand and it is not hard to guess the medicine they think the party needs. It is said the plan devised was to make an effort to capture the Democratic primaries in the interest of a wet ticket, and if this fails, to bring out an independent ticket and try to beat the nominees. So it is an effort to break down the Watts law even if it takes defeating the party to do so. We do not believe any true Democrats will lend their influence to a movement that means bolt the party and run an independent ticket if they cannot carry their point in the primaries.

Age should be a delicate subject with them when they themselves are afraid of Teddy, when he has not cut his eye teeth, and their Vice-Presidential candidate has not courage enough to let loose his Senatorial chair and attempt to walk to the Vice-Presidential chair. If ex-Senator Henry G. Davis' age is objectionable (and it is said that "wisdom cometh with age"), what can be said of the age of kids like Teddy and Fairbanks, one who hasn't cut his eye teeth and the other too young to attempt to walk from one chair to another without considerable assurance?—Duplin Journal.

In all the circumstances we do not think it strange that Mr. Frank James, of Missouri, should declare that, in his campaign at least, he is consequently heart and soul for Mr. Roosevelt. A large part of the life and endeavors of Mr. James have been devoted to pursuits which should render such affiliations peculiarly agreeable to him, his long association with the Jesse James band of outlaws, his experience in the hold-up method of conducting public affairs and accomplishing private ends, should not only turn his political sympathies in the way they are now taken, but should render his alliance with the Republican party of distinct value to that organization and its leaders.—Charleston News and Courier.

### TOWN MATTERS.

What the Aldermen Did.

The board of aldermen were in regular monthly session Thursday night and had enough business to keep them together until 11 o'clock.

The standing committees had no reports to make except for the colored cemetery, the grounds of which are being cleared and a new fence placed in front.

The tax collector, treasurer, police officers and dispensary commissioners filed their reports. The dispensary report showed that purchases to the amount of about \$9,000 had been made, while the sales have amounted to a little more than \$3,500. As the dispensary has been in operation only two months and stock must be paid for first, it is too soon to report what profit it is making.

Two citizens appeared before the board and complained of the streets near livery stables being blockaded with buggies left standing on the streets. The board passed an ordinance making it unlawful for any unhitched vehicles to be left standing on streets, the ordinance going in effect at once.

A. J. Griffin, who had been elected chief of fire department, declined to accept the position.

J. J. Moore, lamplighter, sent in his resignation because of bad health.

C. D. Rountree, list taker, turned in the tax list for 1904. The list was returned to him as tax collector with authority to proceed to collect the taxes.

The question of getting estimates on the erection of a guard house was referred to the market committee.

Alderman M. A. Allen, having decided to change his residence from Greenville, tendered his resignation as a member of the board, which was accepted with regrets.

Accounts amounting to \$535 were allowed and orders for same drawn on treasurer.
