The Japs gave the Russians a bad routing at Liao Yang and scored the greatest victory up to this stage of the war. A few more such blows will terminate the strife.

That was a slick dodge the President worked on the colored excursionists who were about to storm his summer home. He slipped off in advance of their arrival.

We hardly recognize the smiling face of our old friend, the Durham Sun, as it now beams upon us. It has put on a handsome new dress and shines brighter than ever.

By a vote of ten to one the stockholders leased the Atlantic and North Carolina railroad for a term of 91 years and 4 months to R. S. Howland, of Asheville, for the Howland Improvement Company of North Carolina.

Hon. Kerr Craige, of Salisbury, one of the state's most prominent men, died Thursday night in a hospital at Washington. He had held many responsible positions in public life, and was a lawyer of fine ability.

The suggestion of the name of J. J. Laughinghouse as one of the representatives from Pitt county in the next legislature has touched a popular chord. Mr. Laughinghouse will make an ideal representative and his presence in the legislative halls will reflect credit upon his county and state. It is a time when we should have able representatives and he will fill the requirement to the letter. Every township in the county should endorse him when the primaries meet next Saturday.

Tide Can't be Turned.

The New York Herald, one of the most conservative papers in the United States, talks about seeing signs pointing to a landslide for Parker in the November election. The Herald also expresses confidence in the ability of the Democrats to land a majority in the lower house of Congress this year, and Congressional control has always gone, with but a single exception for president. Even the New England states are growing restless under the increasing tide of Democracy and already fears are being pressed by Republican organs about being unable to turn that tide. —Wilmington Dispatch.

Cruiser North Carolina.

Raleigh, the capital city of the State, has been honored by having a war vessel named for it and now the State is to be similarly honored. An armored cruiser to be called the North Carolina has been authorized. The plans have been completed and in a short time contractors will be asked to submit bids for the construction of the most modern and formidable fighting machine in the American navy. The good Tar Heel man-of-war and her sister ship, the Montana, are to be 502 feet in length, 70 feet in breadth, 14,500 tons displacement, 24 feet 6 inches draught, and 2,000 tons coal bunker capacity. The main battery will include four 10-inch and 15 1/2 inch rifles. —Henderson Gold Leaf.

The Scabs of Raleigh.

More than twenty five able-bodied men were sitting in idleness yesterday on Wilmington street. Not a single one of these who could not have been at work, if he had wanted to. Fodder is burning up with nobody to pull it. In some places cotton needs picking, hay is ripe, and if not saved will be ruined. Farmers are anxious to pay good wages in order to have this work done, and yet here are scores of hands with nothing to do, and no visible means of support. This thing is the curse and blight of this city, and ought, at any cost, to be broken up. The police force ought to know everybody in the city, and when they see a loafer applying his trade day after day, ought to arrest him, carry him before the mayor and let him choose between going to work on somebody's farm or being sent to the roads.

No use to listen at what one of these loafers say about wanting work and offering to do it. The very fact that they are not at work and live in habitual idleness is proof positive that they do not want to work. —Raleigh Times.

Our Greatest Undeveloped Resources.

We are now talking less of our natural resources, our streams, our forests, our soil, our minerals and our climates, and more about the development and training of our greatest resources and assets, the children of our people. We have learned anew that without trained men and women the resources of nature will remain locked in the embrace of ignorance. We are enjoying a reviving consciousness of the truth that we owe a duty to these children and we have made them a pledge which is as yet unredemmed. We now know of a truth that these children of ours have rights, that the poorest and humblest of these may demand of his community an opportunity for light and knowledge. We now realize that for every untrained child the state is deprived of a skilled wage earner and perhaps a burden imposed upon the community. We are now year by year lowering the percentage of illiteracy. May the good work go on until there shall be added to the civil virtues of our people—their honesty, courage, independence and love of liberty—the skilled hand, the disciplined brain and well-stored mind. —John H.
