#### All Eyes on the South.

With an enormous cotton crop in its history and prospects for a great yield of corn, the south is reasonably sure of a prosperous fall and winter. Twelve million bales of cotton is a conservative estimate at this writing. The price for fall months is really better than we could expect.

Peaches brought into Georgia alone nearly three million dollars, and the south's melons and vegetables have netted two or three times as much. The south's cotton will give us half a million dollars and there will be very little corn to buy next winter.

In the west, corn prospects are fine, but wheat will be 20 per cent short. So the west will barely hold its own.

In the east, the presidential campaign and a slow iron and steel market are depressing general business.

Last winter the South's cotton money went a long way to avert a general panic. Now it looks as if the south will again furnish the money and the prosperity for the nation.—The Railroad Record and Common Carrier, August, 1904.

One of the best ways to judge the intelligence of the people of a town or community is by the literature the people read. Their morals also can be correctly estimated by the same means, no good man wants bad books, while no bad man wants good books.

The people of our town and community have been justly noted for their intelligence and high standard of morals. We are glad that we are located in a town and community where intelligence is appreciated and where moral character has preference, and may the time never come when the people of our community will fail to treasure highly their intelligence and value greatly their moral character.

But the people of this generation will soon pass, and their places will be filled by the oncoming generation.

When we consider this fact we are pained to note the class of literature that is sought and craved by the young people. The vast number of trashy novels that are found on the counters, in the shops, in the club rooms and even in the homes of our community should cause every thinking man to shudder. The boys and girls are reading these books, and from them they are gathering expressions, forming ideas and building characters that, unless something is done, will not meet the demands of their time.

Then let us make some effort to rid our community of this evil, and place in the hands of the young people such literature as will instruct and help them to place a true value on moral character.

DO YOUR PART.

A great many people have an idea that right of itself will succeed, and wrong will of itself fail, but this is a mistaken notion. The great principle of right must be upheld and supported, and the base tenets of wrong must be bravely opposed.

"Truth crushed to earth will rise again" when properly aided and not before. Of itself it can do absolutely nothing. Right and wrong are principles, and as such they succeed or fail in exact proportion as they are defended or opposed by intelligent agents.

In every department of the activities of men great possibilities lie out before us, and our duty is to make the best of these possibilities. Each individual should realize that he has a part to perform, a part which he only can perform, and with manly courage he should contribute his part toward the success and progress of right and truth.

At present every lover of sobriety and truth in Pitt county has special reasons to heed these facts.

Ed Stowe, a well known and industrious colored carpenter of Charlotte, was permanently injured by troops on the way to the maneuvers at Manassas.

This is only one of the many disorderly deeds committed by troops enroute to Manassas, and if the commissioned officers in charge are not enough concerned to enforce discipline among the troops we think it is high time for some steps to be taken to put a stop to such deeds.

### Democratic Ticket Elected in Arkansas.

Memphis Tenn., September 5.—Early returns from the state election in Arkansas indicate the selection for Governor of Jefferson Davis, the democratic incumbent, over Hon. Harry Myers, republican, by the usual large democratic majority. The democrats easily elected their entire state ticket, and the interest centered in the vote in large towns, where the regular democrats were opposed in many instances by independents.

Returns are necessarily slow, as many voting places are remote from railroad and telegraph stations.

In Crittenden county, where trouble was anticipated because of a bitter factional fight, and where a pistol duel was recently fought between Sheriff P. M. Williamson and former Sheriff Werner the election passed off quietly. Partial returns indicate an overwhelming majority for Lewis for sheriff, as against Williamson.
