HUNDREDS BLOWN UP BY RUSSIANS.

Chefoo, Sept. 9.—1:30 a. m.—(Friday).—A Japanese column numbering approximately 700 men while marching along at night on a road in the valley between Long Hill and Division Hill met a frightful disaster through the explosion of an electric and mine, September 1. The mine was carefully laid by the Russians three weeks ago. It covered nearly a mile of available marching space. The explosive was placed at the bottom. The rock were placed next and on top of these clay was packed so carefully that the ground gave the impression of not having been disturbed.

The indications of Japanese activity in this put the Russians on their guard. Near midnight the out-posts rushed in and reported that the Japanese were approaching. The Russians with held their fire for sometime. Suddenly they threw a searchlight up the valley. The Japanese opened with a rifle fire. The Russians waited until apparently the whole Japanese column was in the danger zone. Then the mine was exploded.

The force of the explosion knocked a number of Russians down and the sight of Japanese rifles, legs and arms hurling through the lighted space made by the searchlight was an awful spectacle.

Some rocks landed inside the Russian lines.

There was one appalling moment during which the garrison itself was stunned into a death like silence. The searchlight coldly lighted up the road and hillsides, strewn with dead.

The following day the Russians buried the dead but owing to their dismembered and mutilated condition, the Russians were unable accurately to estimate the number of killed. A few Japanese escaped however.

The foregoing information is contained in a small sheet issued September 3 by the Port Arthur Novakrai, a breakage in the press having made it impossible to issue a full edition.

A Chinese arriving here at midnight confirms the above to the extent of saying that he heard the report that many Japanese had been killed by a mine, but he did not learn the details. On the nights of August 26 and 27 a similar disaster befell the Japanese near Redoubt No. 2, it is reported, but no details have been ascertained.

We rejoice to note the favorable conditions under which the schools and colleges of our state are opening.

Well, you certainly have been patient. The editor has returned, and will resume control of THE REFLECTOR after this issue.

The manner in which Ed. Hudson, who was recently hanged in Mobile for murder, met death, only shows the cool manner in which such fiends can do murder. He died smoking a cigar.

The Biltmore exhibit to be sent to St. Louis, an account of which is found on another page, will add much to North Carolina's exhibit. We have always known that we have the best of everything, we just want other people to know it.

The name Theodore Roosevelt Alton Parker Jones was recently given to a young hopeful in one of our sister states.

This reminds us of a question once asked the Perfect Man: "Therefore in the resurrection whose wife of them is she?"

H. C. and R. L. Bridges, of Bladensburg, have donated \$1,000 to Wake Forest college, to go toward the erection of an infirmary building.

The people of the state know of the great work this institution is doing, and it is not necessary to comment thereon. Suffice to say that we know of no nobler cause to which any one can donate their money.

In discussing why Parker will carry New Jersey, Mr. Clarence T. Atkinson, of that state, gives some good reasons.

He says: "The distrust of Roosevelt, the half-empty dinner pails, reduced wages, number of unemployed, high prices for what you eat and wear, and besides, the public is tired of the Republican rings of New Jersey. They will not elect a Pennsylvania Railroad lobbyist Governor. The coal trust has taxed me \$100 on coal for my hotel, and the beef trust \$250 on beef. This is fact, and no statistics can wipe it out. I know what ought to be the price of coal and beef: so do all the housewives in our land.

The casualties of the military maneuvers about Manassas began early. The Georgia troops lost two men before they reached the Virginia line. According to the Charlotte Chronicle these Georgia troops displayed other evidence of actual warfare—that of the kind usually witnessed in the enemy's country. The conduct of these troops at Belmont and in Charlotte was disgraceful. It is well to remember that these soldiers have to return to their homes over the same route, and the people should be prepared for them. Give them the treatment that their former conduct shows that they deserve. Thirty days' road duty in Mecklenburg would teach some of them good behavior.—Wilmington Messenger.

ROOSEVELT'S OPINION OF THE POPULISTS.

Tomwatsonism is showing its head in every doubtful state in the campaign, and Tomwatsonism is Populism.

The purpose of the campaign is made manifest by the activity of the Republicans in circulating the speech of acceptance of the Populist nomination by Watson. It is being sent out in large numbers, and everywhere the Republicans are advising those who will not vote for Roosevelt to vote for Watson.

The Populist campaign is nothing in reality but a Republican side-show. Such may not be the feelings of the men who vote, but such is plainly the purpose of the leaders of the movement to galvanize the corpse. This being so the opinion of President Roosevelt about the Populists is rich reading.

In this book, "American Ideals," volume 2 page 23, he says of them: "Refinement and comfort they are apt to consider quite as objectionable as immorality. A taste for learning and cultivated friends, a tendency to bathe frequently, causes them the deepest suspicion. Though they often make war on vice, they rather prefer making war on prosperity and refinement."

But even if this is not enough to keep a Populist from being used as a cat's paw to elect the Republican nominee, here is another essay on the Populists, written by Roosevelt in the campaign of 1896:

"Thrift industry and business energy are qualities which are quite incompatible with the true Populistic feeling. Payment of debts, like the suppression of riots, is abhorrent to the Populistic mind. Such conduct strikes the Populist as immoral."

Now, having thus plainly had Mr. Roosevelt's opinion given concerning them, it is not seen how any Populist can cast his vote to elect the Republican nominee, and a vote for Watson is just such a vote. The Republican party only puts Populism on the back to use it as a cat's-paw. Simply that and nothing more.—News and Observer.

The key note of Governor Charles B. Aycock's administration may be summoned up in the one word "Education." And as this successful administration is drawing to a close, it is interesting to note the great and substantial progress our State has made along this line. Aycock promised the people of North Carolina that he would give his support to the education of every child in the State. Has this promise been kept? It has.

We have got better schools than we ever had before. The State has opened its great liberal heart and has appropriated more money for public education than it has ever done before. In many of our counties the term of the public schools has been equal to that of the academies, and in all our counties the constitutional limit of four months has been reached.

For many years North Carolina has been known as an illiterate State. But that has passed. Her sons need never again be ashamed of the nick name of "Tar Heel" nor we believe the time is near when that name, throughout the American Union, shall be a synonym for culture, refinement and intelligence.—Burlington Herald.

END TO STRIKE.

Chicago, Sept. 8.—The strike of
the butcher workmen, which has
demoralized the meat packing
industry throughout the country
for the last two months was offi-
cially declared off tonight by
President Michael J. Donnelly, of
the Amalgamated Meat Cutters
and Butcher Workmen of Amer-
ica. This Mr. Donnelly telegraph-
ed the members of the national exe-
cutive committee, asking their
consent to an announcement of the
end of the struggle and tonight,
having received favorable answers
from eleven, he declared that the
strike of the members of his or-
ganization would end at midnight.

The strike of the members of
the affiliated unions at the stock
yards who quit work in sympathy
with the butchers, will officially
be called off tomorrow morning at
a meeting of the conference board
of the allied trades. This was
decided upon at a meeting of the
central body of the allied traders
held tonight. The general body
was at first in favor of continuing
the strike, but Mr. Donnelly, who
was present, announced that the
men were defeated and in order
to save his union from being
entirely disrupted he would order
his men to return to work in the
morning no matter what course
might be taken by unions.

As the other unions had no
grievance of their own, but had
gone on strike to aid the butchers,
there was nothing left for them
but to follow the lead of Mr. Don-
nelly, and they, too, decided to
call off the strike as far as they
were concerned.
