STOLE ANOTHER'S WIFE.

The Guilty Pair Came Here and Ran Away.

Tuesday, the 6th, Marion Tucker and his wife came here from Norfolk and registered at the Hotel Farrat. The next day he left on the noon train to visit relatives in Whitakers. That same train brought H. M. Hardee from Norfolk. When the 2.31 train for Norfolk stopped that same day, Hardee and Mrs. Tucker boarded it.

When Mr. Tucker heard of his wife's disappearance, he telegraphed in every direction for the officials to arrest both. Thus far they have eluded arrest. It is known that they left the N. & C. at Suffolk, then took the cars for Petersburg.

Hardee is a member of the firm of H. M. Hardee & Co., of Norfolk, and Tucker, up to a few days ago, a traveling salesman for the firm, and related both to Hardee and to his wife, being the nephew of the former, and cousin of the latter. He and his wife boarded with Hardee. Undue familiarity between Hardee and his wife made him suspicious, and caused him to sever his connection with the firm. He came here with a view of looking around, to engage in some business. Hardee, is a man about 45 years old, has a wife, and four children. Mrs. Tucker is 24 years old, weighs between 100 and 120 pounds, is about five feet high, has light hair, and a fair complexion. She is what one would call good looking, but not beautiful by any means.

She has no children. A more wanton inexorable guilt cannot be imagined. The greatest criminal is Hardee, who deserted his four children and excellent wife who is about to become a mother.

NEW YORK AND ESOPUS.

It was the pleasure of the editor of THE REFLECTOR to attend the conference of Democratic and independent editors, who are supporting Parker and Davis, the past week. Arriving in New York Tuesday evening, Wednesday was spent in visiting the headquarters of the national committee, taking in points of interest about the city, and a trip through the subway, the underground railroad that has been built under the city and recently opened.

Wednesday night the editors were given a banquet by the national committee in the Waldorf-Astoria, one of the finest hotels in the city. The banquet was an elaborate affair with covers for about five hundred guests. S. L. Johnson, of Cincinnati, was toast master and speeches were made by Henry Watterson, of Louisville, Ky., Herman Ridder, of New York, Clark Howell of Atlanta, J. B. Stohl, of Indiana, and Andrew McLean, of Brooklyn. A letter was also read from Joseph Pulitzer, editor of the World.

Thursday morning the editors left by special train for Hyde Park, where they took a boat across the river for Esopus. As the steamer passed in view of Rosemount, the beautiful home of Judge Parker, the members of his family stood in the broad veranda and a grandson vigorously waved a flag. At Rosemount Josephus Daniels, of Raleigh, was master of ceremonies. He introduced C. W. Knapp, of St. Louis, who spoke for the editors in an address which was responded to by Judge Parker.

After the speaking each of the party was presented to Judge Parker and also to the members of his family. Judge Parker is a man of strong personality and made a most favorable impression on all. He had a pleasant word for every one he met. About three hours were spent around the beautiful lawns at Rosemount and they got an idea of the judge's capabilities as a farmer. Some of the North Carolinians seeing an ox team hauling up hay to the barns said that looked just like down here.

The return trip to New York city was made by boat down the historic Hudson and the scenery along the river was magnificent. On the steamer one or two meetings were held at which several editors spoke of the pleasure the conference and trip to Esopus had given them and the impression Judge Parker had made upon them. Another feature that made his North Carolina brethren prouder of him than ever, was the honors bestowed upon Josephus Daniels, of Raleigh. He was chairman of the editorial conference committee and the success of the occasion was largely due to his efforts. As a token of appreciation a purse was made up for the purpose of purchasing a loving to present him.

Men took prominent part in the Democratic primary here on Saturday who have declared publicly that they would vote the Republican ticket from Roosevelt down to township constable. Nice example of political integrity.

"Why don't your party have some issues?" was the query of a Republican met with on the train the other day. He was told that Rooseveltism was issue enough to fill any one campaign and Democrats found enough in that to go before the people and ask for a change in the administration.

The primaries have been held and now comes the convention.

PARKER'S SPEECH TO THE EDITORS.

"It is indeed a great pleasure to welcome to Rosemount this body of representatives of the great American press, one of the mighty forces in the up building and strengthening of a sturdy American citizenship.

"The leaders who have made a thoroughfare through history down which through all the centuries their frame will march with giant strides have all been men who, though unmoved by hasty expressions of the hurried judgment of the people, were yet guided in all their public acts by the knowledge of what the deliberate and mature judgment of the people would be. So the great papers are those which anticipate the careful judgment of the majority. Though the instant judgment of the people may be often at fault, the ripe and final decision is always for the right. And the part of leadership is to know the right and honestly, patriotically, fearlessly and zealously advocate it. Just as long as the press can discern and lead the unhurried and well-considered judgment of the people, so long will its power grow mightily, and so long will it hold its place in front ranks of the unflinching and vigorous march of national progress. To the up building of the power of the press and to the best use of that power you have devoted yourself.

"I am not taking up your time with any of the great issues upon which our party, through its platform and candidates, confidently appeals to the people for endorsement, but crave your indulgence while I briefly refer to a single feature of the platform of the Republican party.

"That platform opens with a declaration of that party's many years of control of government, coupled with the assertion that it has displayed a high capacity for rule and government, which has been made even more conspicuous by the incapacity and infirmity of purpose shown by its opponents."

"This challenge to comparison of Democratic and Republican administrations, since the Republican party came into existence should be welcomed. Fortunately we have eight recent years of Democratic administration of the Executive Department of the government which we will gladly compare with any similar period since 1860.

"The comparison will show that under Democratic control the administration parity of the fathers was observed in the conduct of the government; that no one of its departments was permeated, as of late, with corruption rivaling the days of the star route frauds; that a successful effort was made to check the growth of expenditures; that it resulted in each department of the government below that of the preceding administrations. The comparison will show also that each succeeding Republican administration after 1898 increased expenses, and in some instances so greatly as to indicate reckless extravagance and waste of the people's money.
