Another cigarette factory is being organized at Wilson. We are anxious to hear of something of that kind in Greenville.

Asked and Answered.

It is a poor rule which does not work both ways. If it is wrong for men who oppose the Watts law to declare that they will not support the democratic nominees who favor that law, is it not also wrong for men who favor that law to refuse to support their party candidates because they are not advocates of that measure. We ask brother McKely of the News-Standard to answer this question.—Wilmington Messenger.

Dead end. The Watts law is a part of the Democratic Platform, regularly and overwhelmingly adopted by the Democratic State Convention, after having been made a party issue by the Republican State Convention. He has already bolted the platform, and justifies the setting up of an opposition candidate who stands by the platform. Inventor in Georgia Who Thinks he has Hit the Combination.

An Albany, Ga., dispatch says: G. A. Lowry, inventor of the Lowry Round Bale Gin, and several of his associates have been in Albany for several weeks experimenting with a cotton picking machine which Mr. Lowry is trying to perfect. He does not claim that his machine has been perfected yet, but he believes that he is working on the right line and hopes to have a cotton picking machine with a daily capacity of 40,000 pounds before the season is over.

Cotton planters who have seen the implement say that it is a wonderful machine and they express confidence that it will be brought to a state of perfection that will make it a great boon to cotton growers.
