UNLAWFUL TO KILL SQUIRRELS.

The Law Applies to Pitt County.

THE REFLECTOR has been requested to publish the act passed by the last legislature relative to hunting squirrels. Chapter 103, page 129, of the public laws of North Carolina, session 1903, reads as follows:

"The General assembly of North Carolina do enact:

"Section 1. That from the first day of March to the first day of November, in each year, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to hunt, shoot or kill squirrels within the counties of Chowan, Perquimans, Mecklenburg, Cleveland, Pitt and Beaufort.

"Sec. 2. That all persons found guilty of the violation of the provisions of this act shall be fined not exceeding ten dollars, nor imprisoned more than ten days.

"Sec. 3. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

"In the General Assembly read three times, and ratified this 11th day of February, A. D. 1903."

THE VEHICLE ORDINANCE.

It is strange to what extremes people will sometimes go in an effort to array a feeling of prejudice in the country against the town, and that citizens of the town should be instigators of such prejudice is more than strange. We are led to these remarks by hearing that a man from the country who was in town a few days ago remarked that he was afraid to drive his horse up in front of a store to get goods he had purchased because he heard the town had passed a law forbidding persons to stop their horses on the street. Of course the man had been told this, and that it was told him purposely there can hardly be a doubt.

Possibly this explanation on the subject will not be amiss: Greenville has several stables at which people coming in from the country put up their horses for the day. The keepers of these stables have been in the habit of leaving the buggies out on the streets, and frequently streets near the stables would be so blockaded by these vehicles as to be almost impassable. Complaints of this were numerous and even people from the country were often heard to say they could hardly find room to drive through certain streets because of such blockade.

During the past summer another large stable was built just below Five Points on Evans street. Two citizens residing near the location, one of them immediately adjoining it, were opposed to the stable being there but could not prevent the owner of the property from building it. As soon as the stable was occupied the same trouble of the street being filled with vehicles as at other stables occurred there. Because of this the two citizens went before the board of aldermen with a request that the trouble of blocking up the street fronting their property be stopped. In this request they were also voicing the sentiment of others as well as themselves, and recognizing the justice of the complaint, the aldermen passed an ordinance forbidding the leaving of unhitched vehicles on the streets.

That is all there is in the law. It simply means that after horses are unhitched from the buggies the vehicles shall not be left standing in the streets. There is nothing in the law to prevent any one driving his horse and vehicle where he pleases through the streets, or stopping where he pleases as long as he pleases. And as many stables as there are in town no one should be inconvenienced by this law. The stableman who takes care of the horse should take care of the vehicle also and not leave the latter out in the street in the way of every passer. One stable keeper has already advertised that he has room to take care of 500 vehicles.

The streets should be kept open and clear for the use of the public, and that is the purpose of the law in preventing them being blocked up with unhitched vehicles.

From now until election the campaign should be active.

THE REFLECTOR again calls the attention of the Merchants' Association to the fact that the matter should be taken up with the officials of the Atlantic Coast Line to get them not to require the one passenger train on this road to do the excursion work during the week of the Weldon fair. The inconvenience and annoyance arising from this cause last year should lead every one not to want a repetition of it, and the way to prevent it is to act in time. The facilities of this road are already poor enough with only one passenger train a day, without that train having to break its schedules and connections to do extra work.

The more they stir it the worse it looks—that looting of stores at Reidsville by soldiers of the state as they were passing through. If that was the kind of war lesson they learned at Manassas future manoeuvres should be abandoned.

Marion Butler's Consolidated Liquid Air Company has gone into the hands of a receiver and the hot air is all gone. Butler can now look for some new scheme to work on.

The next important thing to look forward to is Judge Parker's letter of acceptance.

The Republicans of New York have nominated Frank W. Higgins as their candidate for governor.

The reports tell us of great damage and loss of lives along the coast resulting from Wednesday's storm.

Just about a week ago a young Russian nobleman arrived in New York under an assumed name. He was not allowed to land. On the way over he became somewhat hilarious in the smoking room one evening. While in this happy frame of mind his discretion broke away from its mooring and he confidently informed a couple of his fellow passengers that he was coming to this country to study American fortifications, and to pick up what information he could regarding military affairs. He also told them his real name. All of which decided the authorities that he was not a desirable visitor, so he returned by the same vessel without having set foot on American soil.—Ex.

The Nation's Drink Bill.

The American Grocer, which has for years kept a careful record of the nation's drink bill, the amount expended for stimulants, both strong and weak, alcoholic and non-alcoholic, has finally summed up the figures for 1903, and finds that we paid \$1,451,633,379 for our drink, or as much as the cotton, wheat, corn, rye, rice and sugar crops. Alcohol, however, took the greater part of this money, as the following details show:
