POPULIST CONVENTION.

Republican Move to Capture it But Failed.

In pursuance of a handbill circulated the past week for a populist convention, there was a meeting held in the court house during the noon recess today. It was hard to locate who was who in the meeting, as it was somewhat a mixture and medley. It came near winding up captured by the Republicans, but the effort got some water thrown on it.

A. J. Moye took charge of the meeting as chairman and made a speech in which he claimed that the Democrats were by degrees taking away the liberties of the people. Before closing he said the Democrats were a sectional party and paid a tribute to Roosevelt. He broke it off suddenly by declaring the convention was ready for business. Then he appointed D. T. House secretary.

After a few minutes in which there was nothing doing, Slade Chapman arose and stated that the convention would not have time to do its work today, therefore he moved that adjournment be had to Saturday, Oct. 8th, and that a primary be held on the preceding Saturday.

This motion was a signal for Harry Skinner, Republican district attorney, to get in evidence. He hurried up in the bar and held a whispered conference with Chapman, then took a seat inside. In the meantime T. J. Stancill had the floor, and as soon as he had finished some who had seen him come in the bar began calling for Skinner. He was ready, of course, and how nicely he did lay it out for them. He abused the Democratic party in general and the Watts law in particular and had things whooping for awhile.

Col. Skinner took his seat and the question was about to be put when he took from his pocket a previously prepared paper from which he read a call which he offered as an amendment to Mr. Chapman's motion. The latter did not accept the amendment, and all the whispers and winks of the district attorney only served to make him shake his head. The amendment was for Republicans, Populists and dissatisfied Democrats to come together in a common mass meeting and nominate a ticket to beat the Democrats.

Then chairman Moye was heard from some more. He would like to see the democrats beaten but did not want to see the Populists lost in the mix-up. You could then see Republican countenances drop below par when the chairman said that the Watts law was on the statute books to stay there, and that the point he was most afraid of the Democrats on was that they would incorporate every little cross roads where a man wanted to sell whiskey. This was a corker, and the meeting adjourned to Oct. 8th.

Wonder what the grand jury will do for the folks who have been hunting squirrels in Pitt county contrary to law.

The Democratic state convention of New York nominated D. C. Herrick, of Albany, for governor. There were several factions in the convention but they settled their differences by all agreeing Herrick.

The Boston gentleman with a hyphenated name, Mr. W. B. Smith Whaley, who busted for over a million dollars on assets of \$1,200, was a financier right. Several Southern banks got caught in the failure.

Every public utterance of Judge Parker raises him in the estimation of the people. His note requesting that the Democratic handbook contain no word that reflects upon the personal honor or integrity of President Roosevelt, was a manly utterance.

The Republicans, too, are anxious to do something in the interest of the dear people, and have issued a call for a county convention on the first of October. Maybe they in conjunction with the Populist and the "people's" own candidate self-appointed to right his great wrongs, can bring out enough of the stay-at-home Democrats to show them how big a majority Pitt can bury the whole push under.

Judge Council does not look with much favor upon concealed weapon toters. One convicted before him of this violation may expect to pay the penalty. In speaking of offenses of this kind, the judge remarked that he expected if the doors of the court room were closed and strict search made of all who were inside, enough pistols would be found for an arsenal and enough razors to equip half a dozen barber shops.

A Brutal Murder.

Wake Forest, Sept. 19—An awful tragedy took place 5 miles west of here to-day. A white man named Geo. Tilley, living two miles up the river from Neuse Falls, shot his wife and mother-in-law with a shot gun. Mrs. Tilley was in the bed with her two days' old baby when her husband picked up the gun and indicated that he was going to fire. Thinking that Tilley was going to shoot the baby the mother threw herself over it, and the load grazed her shoulder. Tilley then opened fire upon his mother-in-law, Mrs. Joe Lowery. The first load took effect in Mrs. Lowery's right shoulder. She ran into the yard and cried for help, then she entered the house and turning, Tilley shot her again in the back of the head, thus rendering her unconscious. Mrs. Lowery's condition is serious, and it is thought that she will die. The shock may also result in the death of Mrs. Tilley. The only cause that can be attributed for the rash act is that he became angry with his wife because she sent her picture off to be enlarged and did not send his. He has been gruff and has had little to say for the past month. He left immediately after the shooting and had not been captured at last accounts.

Eastern North Carolina farmers listen to this. A progressive Georgia farmer has turned his attention lately to the raising of turnips, and he has met with abundant success. This season he has six acres broadcast in turnips of several varieties, which he expects to yield him at least 126,000 pounds. Judging from past experience, this farmer expects to make, at a reasonable calculation, \$2,000 on the six acres. This beats a two-horse farm, and more, planted in cotton.—Wilmington Dispatch.
