### MR. KITCHEN'S SPEECH.

He Arraigns the Republican Party.  
Congressman W. W. Kitchen, of the fifth North Carolina district, spoke to a large crowd in the court house this afternoon during the recess of court. He was introduced by Solicitor L. I. Moore, chairman of the county executive committee.

Mr. Kitchen made a strong and telling speech, his theme being principally on national issues. He drew striking comparison of the principles of the two parties, showing the Republican policy of high protection to be robbing the people and fostering monopoly and trusts. Practical illustrations were given to show how this is done.

The extravagance of Republican administration also came in for a sharp thrust from the speaker as he pointed out the alarming rate at which government expenses are piling up burdens on the people.

President Roosevelt's negro policy was severely arraigned, and he said that while the president in one sense may have had the right to ask a negro to dine with him, the criticism following had done good in that it had presented a repetition of the performance. This incident, the president's selection of a negro to second his nomination at the Chicago convention, the appearance together on the platform of that convention of a white girl and a negro boy, the persistence of forcing Crum in the position of collector of the part of Charleston, the Indianola post office affair, were all referred to as showing the utter disregard of the president of a fixed Southern sentiment.

Mr. Kitchen is an entertaining speaker and was heard with much interest by the large audience.

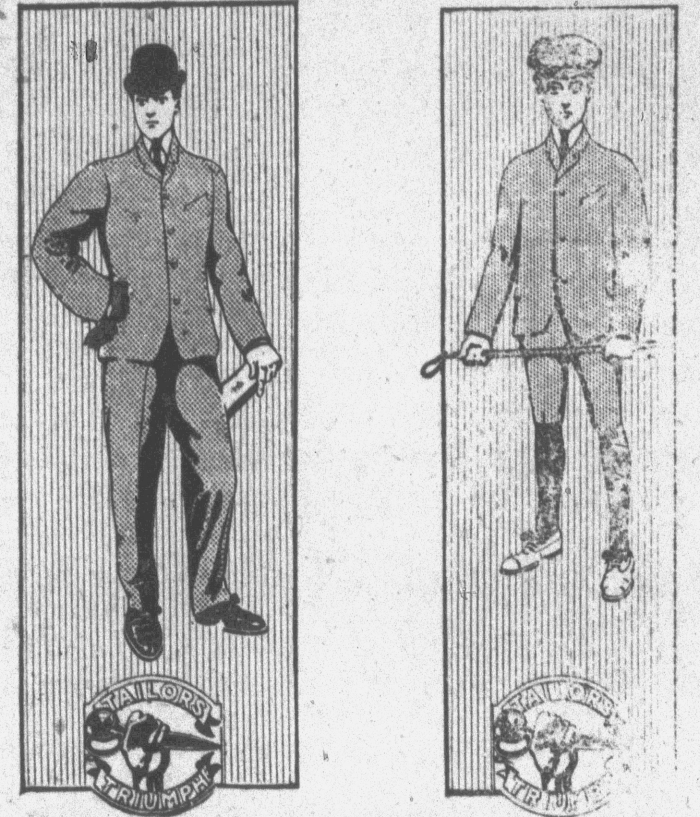

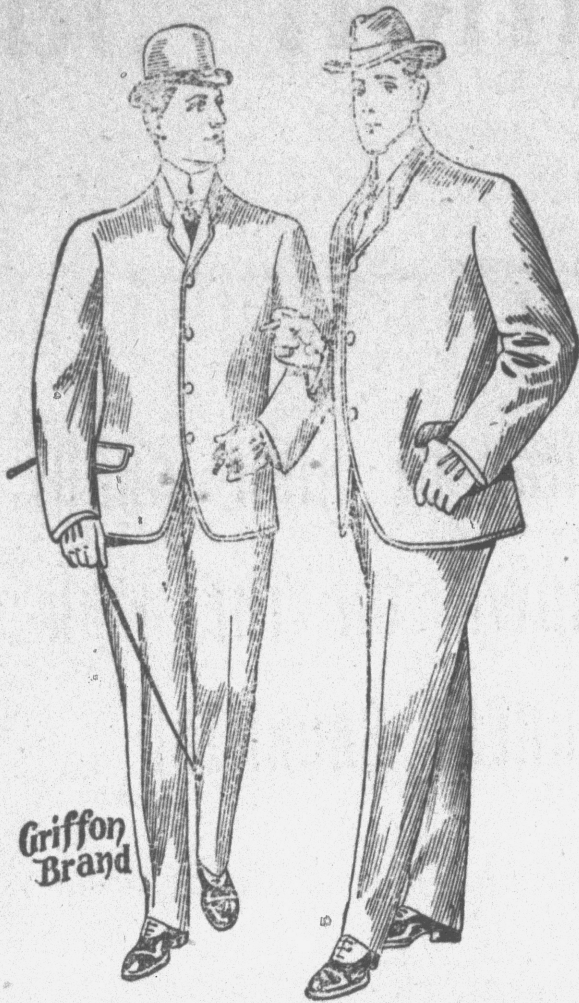
