Each farmer in Pitt county is requested to bring at least a dozen ears—stalk preferably—to this fair. Entrance is free and no charge for exhibiting.

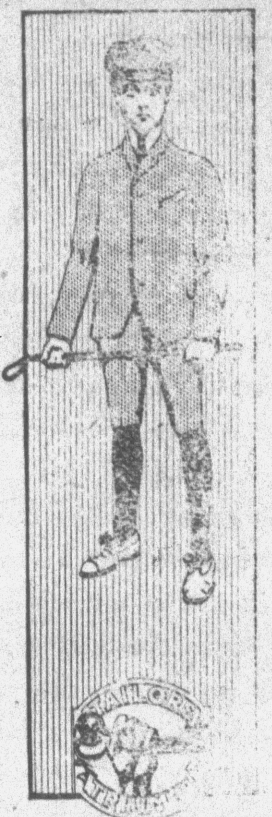
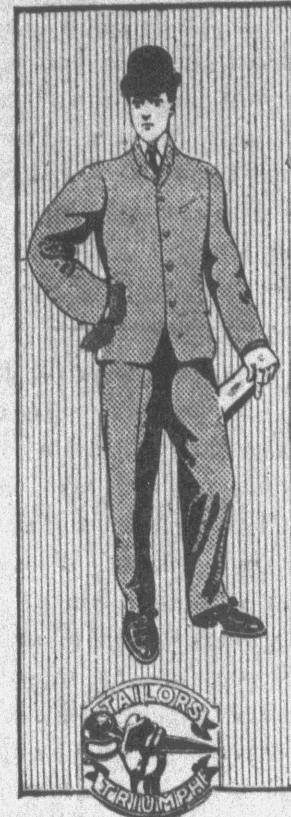

You will not have much more of the warm weather to complain of.

You will not hear any better speeches in this campaign than the one Congressman W. W. Kitchen delivered in Greenville Wednesday.

In one section of Granville county farmers complain that deer are so numerous that they go into the fields and do much damage to crops. That section ought to be a mecca for hunters a little later.

There is enough truth to tell about the Republican candidate for president without resorting to misrepresentation. This should be a clean campaign. It is evident that Judge Parker wants that kind by his requesting that reflections on personal character be omitted.

**Living Beyond One's Means.**

As Orrison Sweet Marsden has so aptly put it, "living beyond one's means is absolute dishonesty."

But there are people who practice it, the world over, and Raleigh is no exception.

If you are trying to do what you cannot afford to do you are living a lie. If you are wearing clothes that you cannot afford, they are perpetual witnesses against you. They are labeled all over with falsehood. If your jewelry, your carriages, your furs and your costly gowns tell me that you are rich, when you live in a poverty-stricken home, and when your mother is obliged to make all sorts of sacrifices to enable you to make this false display, you lie just as surely as you would if you should try to deceive me by your words.

The consciousness of being well dressed and yet owing for it, of riding in carriages which one cannot afford, of wearing jewelry and tailor-made suits which are beyond one's means, or of patronizing expensive hotels and restaurants which one cannot by any stretch of imagination or sophistry afford, is destructive to self respect, to truth and honesty, and to manhood and womanhood. You cannot afford to wear lies on your body or eat lies at expensive cafes any more than you can afford to tell lies with your tongue.

There is only one possible result upon character of falsehoods, whether acted or told, and that is perpetual deterioration and demoralization. No one can act a lie or live a lie without being dishonest.

When a man sacrifices his honesty, he loses the mainspring of his character, and he cannot be perfectly honest when he is lying by frequenting costly restaurants or hotels, by wearing expensive clothing, or by extravagant living in any of its varied expressions, when he cannot afford it.—Raleigh Times.

**Judge Parker Will Win.**

In a speech made before Tammany Hall in New York recently Representative Wm. Sulzer said in part: "Judge Parker will win. In my opinion we will easily carry the State of New York. Everywhere I go I find public sentiment in favor of the brilliant New York jurist. He is popular with all classes of people, and I have no doubt he will be the next President. The Democrats are united and enthusiastic this year. They are alive to the task before them to wrest control of the country from the Republicans, and are working with vim, confidence and determination for a sweeping Democratic victory. "The Empire State is safe for

Democracy, and we will carry all the other doubtful States. The people know Judge Parker is an honest, an upright, an able and fearless man, a great jurist—and a Democrat through and through. It is strange that some people will persist in becoming disgruntled every time their candidate fails of nomination and will take unusual pains to let people know of their displeasure in the matter. When a man goes into a political convention he virtually binds himself to acquiesce in its decision and to support the nominees of that convention in every possible way. The time for fighting is before the convention meets. After it has met it is the duty of every man to work for the ticket and for a man to allow his prejudices in the matter and his preference for a defeated candidate to prevent him from doing everything he can for success of the ticket does him little credit. All of which is suggested by the attitude of certain North Carolina newspapers toward certain candidates during the present campaign.—Winston Sentinel.

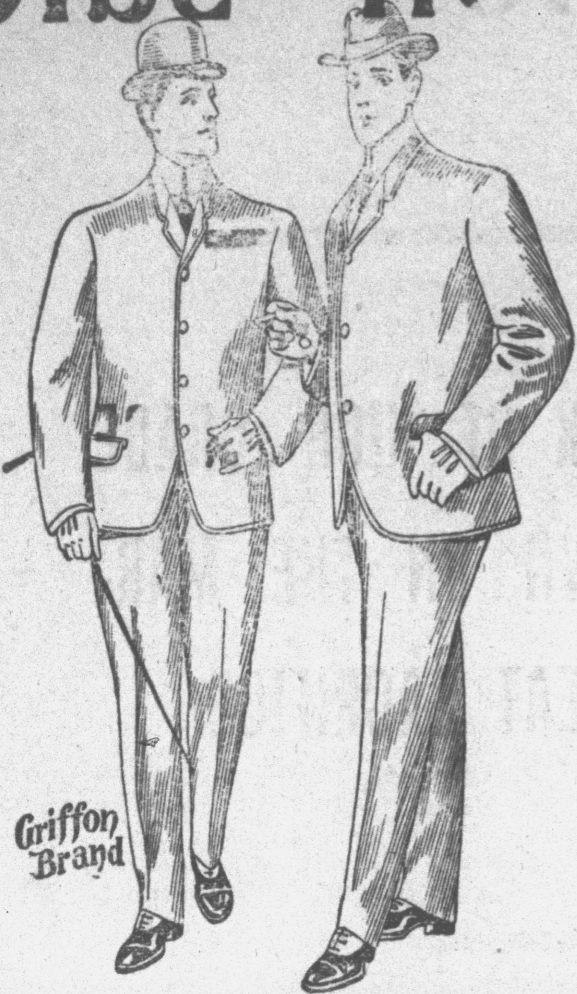

### Greenville School Census.

J. White, who has recently taken  
a census of this public school  
district, has completed his work

In the entire district there are  
465 whites and 587 colored. This  
makes a total of 1 052 children of  
school age in the district. Among

more males than females, while

by 27. Of the 465 white children

of them are in the graded school.  
This shows a high rate of attend-  
ance.
