TOWN MATTERS.

Aldermen Have a Busy Meeting.
The board of aldermen were in regular monthly session, Thursday night, and had work enough to keep them together until midnight. A. H. Taft was appointed on the finance and ordinance committees to fill the vacancies caused by the resignation of M. A. Allen. E. A. Moye, representing Mrs. G. B. King, appeared before the board relative to damage claimed to have been done to her property. The matter was referred to the street committee for investigation. The street committee reported the streets in poor condition owing to inability to get hands. The lights and wells committee reported matters in their department in fair condition. The market committee reported that another stall in market had been rented and tiling had been placed in rear of market house. The white cemetery committee reported the fence completed and work inside the grounds done as far as funds would permit. The section of the new ordinances limiting the districts of houses of ill repute was repealed and the old ordinance relating thereto was reenacted. The tax collector, treasurer, police officers and dispensary manager filed their reports.

The finance committee was instructed to check up the dispensary quarterly. A plan for a guard house was submitted and accepted. The committee was instructed to proceed with the work of erecting the prison.

Restaurant license was granted to Joe Tucker.

Members of the Greenville Volunteers Fire Company and the Rough & Ready Fire Company were exempted from poll tax.

The chief fire department was authorized to sell such of the fire hose as had become worthless for use.

On recommendation from Greenville Volunteer Fire Company Ola Forbes was elected chief of fire department.

An ordinance was adopted requiring vaccination of all persons in town needing it.

An agreement between the Atlantic Coast Line and the town relative to pipes for the water works passing under the tracks of the railroad was ordered to be executed.

Edgar Buck was elected night policeman and tendered his resignation as alderman for the first ward. J. S. Cogleton was selected to succeed him as alderman.

One thousand copies of the vaccination ordinance were ordered printed and distributed through the town.

Hitching posts were allowed to be erected on the edge of any sidewalks except along the business section of Evans street.

An order was passed that during the winter months the hour for meeting of the board shall be at 7 o'clock p. m.

Accounts were allowed and ordered paid to the amount of \$761.54.

Smallpox.

There is plenty of smallpox talk now. It was pronounced yesterday that a man in town had it, and today another man from the country who came to town was found with the disease. The cases were taken in hand promptly. There is no need of any persons being alarmed or losing their heads over the situation. The thing to do is go along and be vaccinated if you need it and encourage everybody else to do the same thing. Everybody help the physicians and there will be no trouble.

VACCINATION ORDINANCE.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen of Greenville, October 6th, 1904.

Whereas the Board of Aldermen of the town of Greenville have received information, through the County Superintendent of Health, Dr. Zeno Brown, and various other sources, that there are several cases of Small Pox within the corporate limits of the Town of Greenville; and

Whereas this dreaded and loathsome disease is spreading in various sections of said town, and whereas the Superintendent of Health for Pitt county has appeared in person before the Board of Aldermen of said town and has set forth the urgent necessity of immediate action on the part of said Board of Aldermen to prevent the spread of said disease, and it appearing that the immediate vaccination of the inhabitants of said town is absolutely essential to prevent the spreading of said disease in said town. And whereas the authorities of any city or town or Board of County Commissioners of any county, may make such regulations and provisions for the vaccination of its inhabitants, under the direction of the local county Board of Health, and impose such penalties as they may deem necessary to protect the public health, as is provided in section 23, chapter 214, laws of 1893, therefore

The Board of Aldermen of the town of Greenville do enact:

Section 1. That all persons residing within the corporate limits of the town of Greenville, who have not been previously successfully vaccinated, within four years, or who have not had small pox, or the eruptive disease called small pox, shall be vaccinated within ten days from the passage of this Ordinance.

Section 2. Any person residing in said town of Greenville, failing to be vaccinated within the date designated in Section 1 of this Ordinance, shall be immediately vaccinated by the County Superintendent of Health or his assistants, as designated by chapter 214, laws of 1893, public laws of North Carolina, and upon refusal of any person to submit to such vaccination said person or persons shall be arrested and tried, and upon conviction fined \$25.

Section 3. That this Ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage.

"OUR SHIPS."

This writer will not forget a scene he witnessed at Morehead City this summer. It was a banquet given to an association of editors. That noble son and splendid citizen of North Carolina, ex-Governor Jarvis, was responding to a toast relative to the proposed Jamestown Exposition in 1907. The speaker supposed there would be gathered in the waters of Hampton Roads from all nations of the earth to engage in some maritime displays. Gathered on the shore as spectators are representatives of the different nationalities. Amid other ships is some proud monster of the sea flying the colors of Russia. "Whose ship is that?" queries some one of a Russian citizen standing by. "That ship, sir," in reply, "belongs to his majesty, the czar of all the Russias." Yonder in the distance another proud vessel, flying the colors of Germany from her staff. "Whose ship is that," queries some one of a German standing by. "That, sir, is the ship of

his royal highness, the Emperor of Germany," speaks the Dutchman. Another ship heaves into view. It bears the triumphant colors of Great Britain. "Whose ship is that?" queries some one of an Englishman standing by. "Why, that ship is a part of the English navy and belongs, of course, to his Royal Highness the King of England," responds the Englishman. And then there comes by in parade, a noble rover of the sea flying from her staff the stars and stripes. "Will you tell me," says some one to an American standing by, "whose ship that is?" And then, though it be the humblest American in all this broad land, he proudly and truly responds, "Yes, sir That is our ship." And when Governor Jarvis had finished the word the hall resounded with applause. No wonder. They were true words, fitly spoken. The sentiment that such words convey makes such citizens as the noble Jarvis and make this our land and country, the greatest and most beloved on the face of the earth. This is our country. No czar or emperor or king owns or can rule it. We are freemen. Which means that we possess our own souls, our own minds, and we dare to think some and develop some on our own account. If this thought will not make true men, strong men, patriotic men, nothing will. God bless our native land with its boundless opportunity, its infinite promise, its buoyant hope, its splendid traditions, its noble citizenship.—Rev. J. O. Atkinson in Christian Sun.

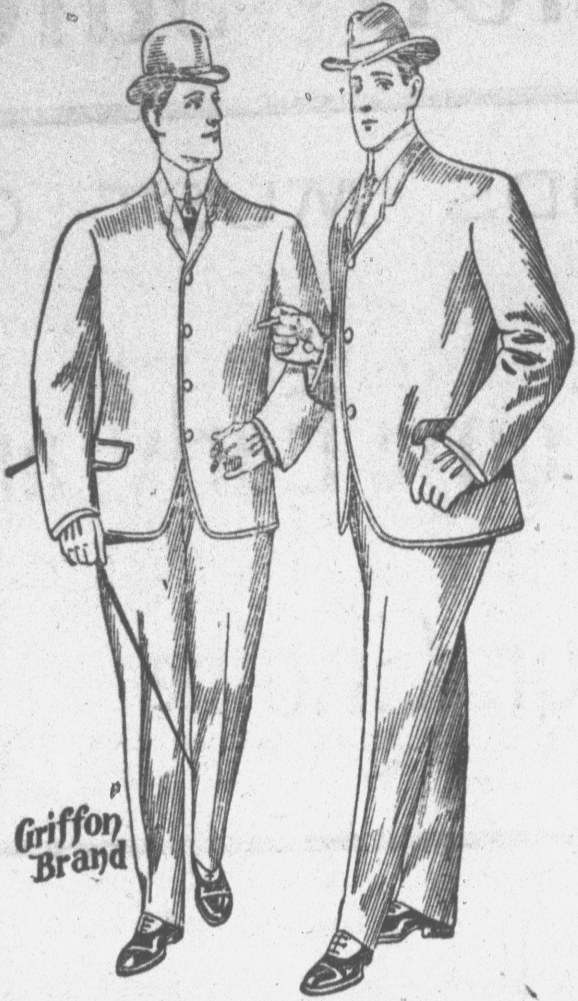
