#### Bet a Coffin Against a Hat on the Election.

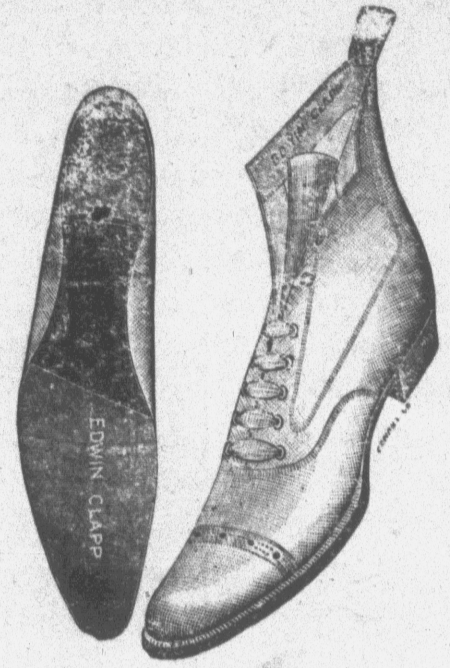

## VOTE FOR THE DEMOCRATIC NOMINEES.

In a former issue we gave the list of nominees of the Democratic party and a brief account of the manner of their nomination. We now propose to give a list of the opposition nominees with a brief account of the manner of their nomination. As the Republicans were the first to name their candidates we will take them up first.

On the 1st of October a few men calling themselves Republicans met in Greenville and named candidates as follows:

For house of representatives, W. J. Pope, of Grifton, and E. E. Dail, of Contentnea.

For county commissioners, J. W. Smith, of Chicod; B. F. Jolley, of Greenville; and H. S. Tyson, of Falkland.

Now just why they did not name candidates for all the places to be voted for we do not know, unless it be that there are not Republicans enough in the county who are not already in some federal position. If any meeting was held in any township in the county to appoint delegates to a county convention we have not heard of it. The men who performed that service came of their own accord, acted upon their own responsibility and departed as they came. By the way, would not a Republican township meeting in Pitt be a funny looking thing? When, oh, when was one held! The time was when they could assemble in the various township meetings a respectable number of respectable white men, appoint their delegates and hold large county conventions. Those who were acquainted with Republican conventions prior to 1876 know this to be true. From 1876 the Republican party has been going to pieces in Pitt 'till there is not enough of it left to hold a convention according to their plan of organization. What has brought this about? There is but one answer. The bad record of the party in state, county and municipal affairs. What party is it that has destroyed the Republican party in Pitt and in the state? It is the Democratic party. How did this party do it? By a clean record in state, county and municipal affairs. Sensible people always want the best. The people of Pitt have tried both parties. Prior to 1874 the Republicans had complete control of the county of Pitt. That year witnessed the complete overthrow of the Republican party in Pitt and the Democrats took charge of everything in every township in the county there are lots of men living who can tell about that memorable campaign. It is not so long ago that we need forget it. It might be a matter of interest to compare the republican government of Pitt prior to 1874 with the Democratic county government after 1874, but it is not in our plan to do so now. Suffice it to say that the Republican was one of extravagance, mismanagement, constantly increasing indebtedness and constantly increasing taxes, lawlessness and discontent. The Democratic government was one of law and order, honesty, economy, de-

creasing county indebtedness and decreasing taxes. For years after 1874 the campaigns in Pitt were made upon a comparison of the administration of county affairs under Republican rule and under Democratic rule, and in the light of this comparison the Republican melted away, its followers deserted it until now there are barely enough left to fill the Federal offices to be bestowed in the county and it is very doubtful if those in control of this skeleton want any new comers. Certainly then there is nothing in this field inviting to Democrats who happened to be dissatisfied with something the party has done or with some of its candidates. It is a thousand times better to remain in the party, vote the regular ticket and seek to make such changes in the party as may be desired. In the party which controls state and county each Democrat can have a voice in shaping public affairs. Outside of the party he can have no influence and no voice which counts.

In a subsequent issue we will give the names of the Populist nominees with a true account of how they were nominated.

The ceremony was performed by Rev. W. C. Brown, and the only witnesses present were the nurses and the brother of the groom. Those present say it was a scene of sad and sweet solemnity.—Ex.

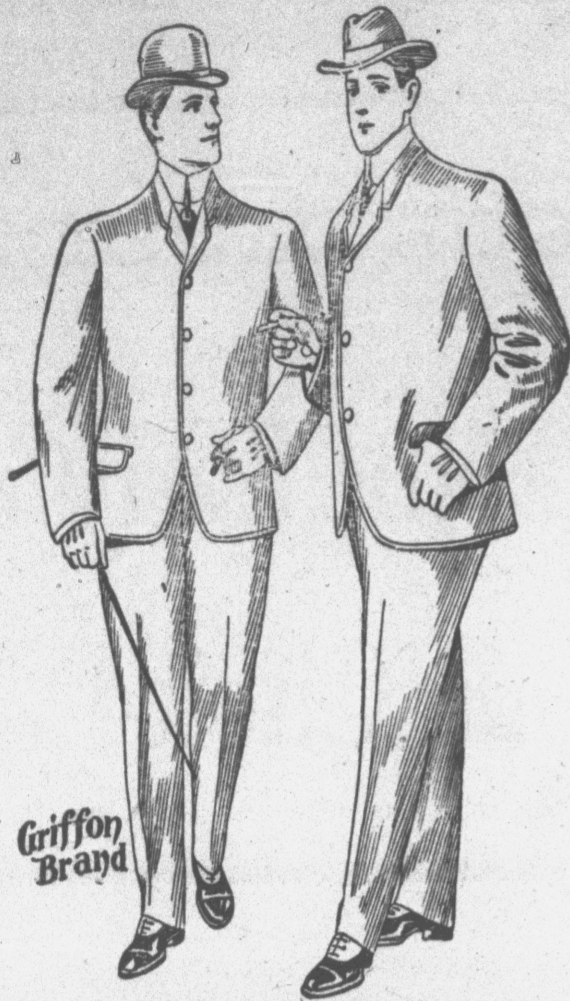

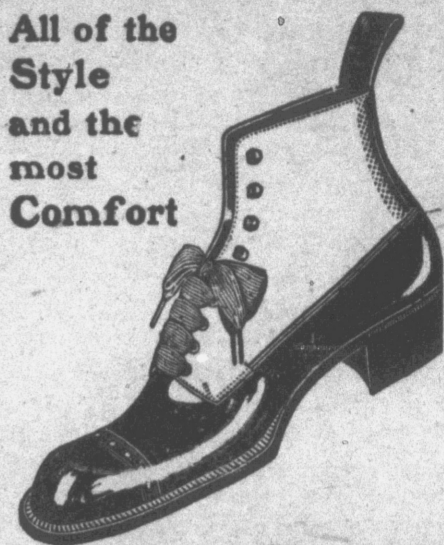
