It is as unfailing as fate, and conquers in every instance. It is harmless when taken by a well person. It will also cure scarlet fever; here it is as I have used to cure smallpox; when learned physician said the patient must die, it cured: Sulphate of zinc, one grain; foxglove, (digitalis,) one grain; half teaspoonful of sugar; mix with two tablespoonfuls of water. Take a spoonful every hour. Either disease will disappear in twelve hours. For a child, smaller doses, according to age. If counties would compel their physicians to use this, there would be no need of pest houses. If you value advice and experience, use this recipe for that terrible disease."

## VOLE FOR THE DEMOCRATIC NOMINEES.

We have given, in former issues, the list of candidates in Pitt with a brief and accurate account of the manner of their nomination. From these accounts it is plainly seen that the Democratic candidates are the only ones who have been really nominated. They are the only ones with whose selection the people have been allowed to have anything to do. Their nomination was made by the people. The people had nothing to do with the nomination of the Republican or Populist candidates. They were selected by a few self-appointed men who took upon themselves the task of naming men for other people to vote for. And yet we hear men, with more tongue than brains, talking about breaking up Democratic rings and smashing Democratic machines. Such talk cannot, with any show of truth, be applied to the party in Pitt county for the simple reason that the people and the people alone dominate and absolutely control the Democratic primaries and the Democratic conventions in the county. In these primaries and conventions the least and the humblest are equal to the greatest and most distinguished. The Democratic candidates are therefore the only people's candidates and they should receive the united and cordial support of every voter who believes that the people should rule. What can any voter hope to accomplish by sulking in his tent and staying away from the polls on election day? He can neither help himself nor his country. Yea, more! What can he hope to accomplish by staying off and voting for the candidates of the Radical machine or the Populist remnant? Surely no disgruntled Democrat will be silly enough to do this. He had about as well attempt to play the role of Don Quixote. He would accomplish about as much for himself or his country in the practical affairs of life. Stay within the party and have your say there. If things did not go to suit you this year stay where you can make yourself felt next year. Submit to the rule of the majority. That is good Democracy and we have shown that the Democratic party is the only place where the people rule.

Besides the vote given for Glenn will determine the vote of the party in the state, district and county conventions for the next four years. The vote each township gives Glenn will determine the strength of that township for the next four years. To illustrate: If the Democrats in Pitt stay at home on the day of election and let Glenn go out of the county with a small vote, then Pitt will have a small vote and but little influence in the state, district and county conventions. To illustrate still further: If the Democrats on the north side of the river stay at home on the day of election then the precincts on that side of the river will fall off in its vote and as a result will have a reduced vote in the county convention, as the vote of county and township is based upon the vote given to the candidate for governor. It therefore believes

every Democrat to be at the polls on the day of election and vote for R. B. Glenn for governor. He is worthy of our support and he should receive a larger vote in Pitt than any man ever received, because we have or ought to have more Democratic voters in the county than we ever had before.

In an editorial in Friday's REFLECTOR it was stated that Mr. W. J. Thigpen and Dr. R. J. Grimes had published cards declining to run upon the Populist ticket, and it was not unlikely that others would do likewise. After that editorial was written and in type two other cards of a similar nature were handed to the paper. These were from Dr. J. E. Nobles and Mr. W. L. Smith, but it was too late to mention their names in the editorial with the others, and this explanation is made in justice to them.

We have actually got a white man in North Carolina who says he "thanks God Mr. Roosevelt is a man good enough and great enough to eat lunch with Booker T. Washington", a representative of a race who helped to save the fortunes of the republic at San Juan. That man is Oscar J. Spears, a former assistant district attorney, whom the Republicans of the sixth district have nominated as their candidate for congress. The white man who will vote for him deserves to be pitied.

The newspapers don't let up on their discussion of the proposition that the railroads ought to manage in some way to cut out some of their horrible accidents. The killing of twenty-seven people Monday on a Missouri Pacific World's fair train served to revive the discussion which broke out with so much emphasis several weeks ago when sixty odd were killed on the Southern. The Washington Post finds a remedy in better coaches. The New York World is inclined to think that the railroads are sacrificing human beings in order to make a show of earnings. Other observations and suggestions are offered by other papers. Out of all the talk about this matter some good ought to result. Railroad travel ought to be made safer in America than it is.—Greensboro Telegram.

Hardly a day passes that there is not notice in some county paper that comes to this office of the establishment of a new rural free delivery mail route. This free delivery of mail to people living in the country is spreading with great rapidity. It is a grand investment for the national government. In no way could it expend the funds of the treasury with prospects of better returns. No appropriation that congress could make would be of greater benefit to the country. For every dollar the government puts in rural free delivery routes it will get many in return in the way of enlightening and educating the people. It is a grand investment.—Wilmington Messenger.

Tom Watson says with great indignation that he is not getting any pay from the Republican national committee. If that is so, why does not Tom call around to the Republican headquarters, assuage his indignation and get his check. If there is none waiting for him, there ought to be; for Tom is certainly earning the money.

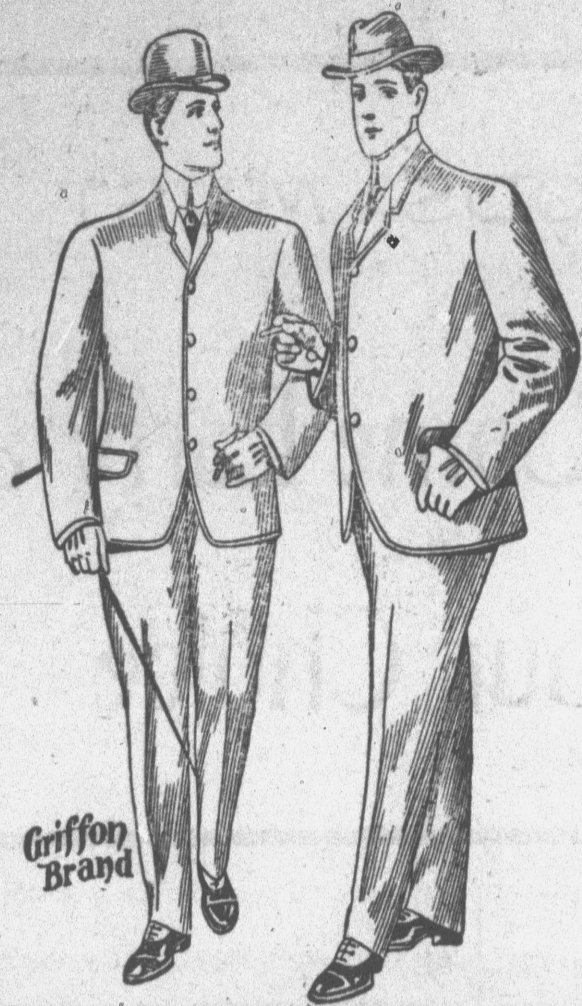

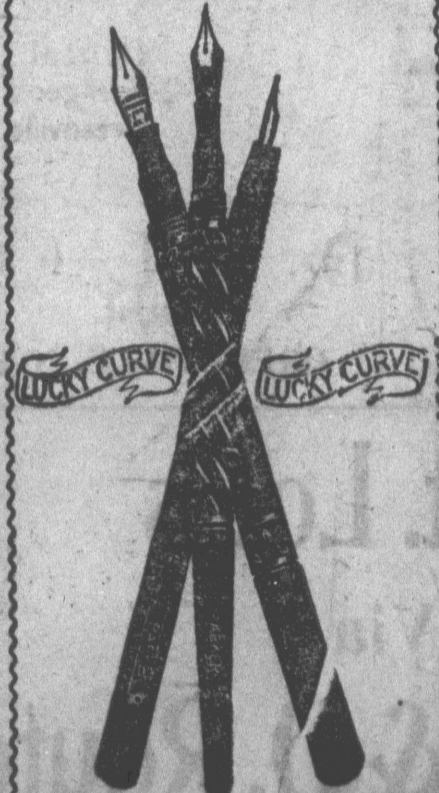
