Russians Losses Figured At 60,000.

Tokio, Oct. 19.—A dispatch from Yingkow states that General Kuropatkin has ordered the Russian troops on the left bank of the Hun river to destroy the railway bridges. This will deprive the Russians south of the river of their own means of retreat.

The authorities have ascertained that since the battle of Liao Yang and to the beginning of the battle of the Shaho the Russians received 65,000 reinforcements. Since October 15 the enemy facing the Japanese left has been reinforced.

The Ashi says that despite the fact that only 15,000 dead Russians were found on the field from October 9 to October 15 the Russian casualties were upward of 60,000. The paper remarks that to adjust his force in face of such losses General Kuropatkin must be more than brave. It adds that the Russian commander in chief is a wise soldier and not venturesome, and the only explanation of his action is that he has received another passionate order not to retire from the Sha river. From the Japanese point of view the longer the battle lasts the greater the Japanese victory.—Raleigh Post.

Shelbyville, Ill., Wednesday, 19.—The Woodworth Orphan Asylum was destroyed by fire today. Two children are known to have perished and others were injured by jumping from the windows.

Two children were suffocated in the fire—Alfred and Charles Peterson. The fire started in clothing which was left near the stove pipe in the boys' dormitory. A number had narrow escapes.

His Hand Cut Off.

Jonesboro, N. C., Oct. 19.—This morning while running a cutting machine, cutting feed on his farm just east of town, Mr. Marvin Lawrence had his right hand cut entirely off. He was feeding the machine, when his hand became entangled in the machinery with the above result.—Raleigh News and Observer.

Lost in a Storm.

West Palm Beach, Fla., Oct. 19.

The Florida coast has been stormswept for ten days and several vessels have been wrecked and a number of lives lost. The Melrose, a three masted English schooner, from Jacksonville to Nassau with a cargo of lumber, was beaten to pieces and two passengers and five members of the crew were drowned. Among the drowned is Mrs. Hallebe, wife of an English clergyman, engaged in missionary work on the Exuma Islands, West Indies.

When the storm reached the height of its violence the schooner was capsized and all on board washed overboard. Another of the lost was Mrs. Charles H. Meller, a young English woman who recently became a bride. She was struck by a falling mast and killed instantly while clinging to the side of the schooner, supported by her husband's arm. The husband's arm was broken in two places, but he floated ashore and was picked up.

A father, talking to his careless daughter, said: "I want to speak to you of your mother. It may be that you noticed a careworn look upon her face. Of course it has not been brought there by any act of yours; still it is your duty to chase it away. I want you to get up tomorrow morning and get breakfast. The Political Apathy May Not Be Had After All.

The lack of interest in political matters on the part of the general public this year is a matter of comment. Usually a presidential election year, above all others, brings out the people and arouses their enthusiasm to a high pitch, but this year apathy is the word all along the line. In speaking of the matter today, an observant gentleman said: "I am not at all distressed over the failure of the people to become excited over politics this year. That shows that they have something else on their minds, and it is a good sign. It is not necessary for people to go wild over politics in order to 'save the country,' and when the country is in such condition that the people are too busy to attend all the political meetings it is safe to say that things are in pretty good shape. I am interested in politics, as all good citizens should be, but I have learned that political activity should not be a predominating characteristic of a plain citizen."—Charlotte Chronicle.

Railroad Casualties.

Washington, Oct. 18.—A report issued by the Inter-State Commerce Commission to-day shows that the total number of casualties to persons on railroads in the United States during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1904, was 55,130, comprising 3,787 killed and 51,343 injured. This shows a large increase. The total number of collisions and derailments was 11,291, involving \$9,383,077 of damages to cars, engines and roadways. This is an increase of 648 collisions and derailments. The casualties were an increase of 233 killed and of 5,366 injured over the preceding year.

Rodgers, McCabe & Co., of Norfolk, together with other exporters, have given their buyers positive instruction to make a deduction of four pounds to the bale for side strips and excess bagging on cotton. This is a waste and farmers are warned against the abuse.—Kinston Free Press.

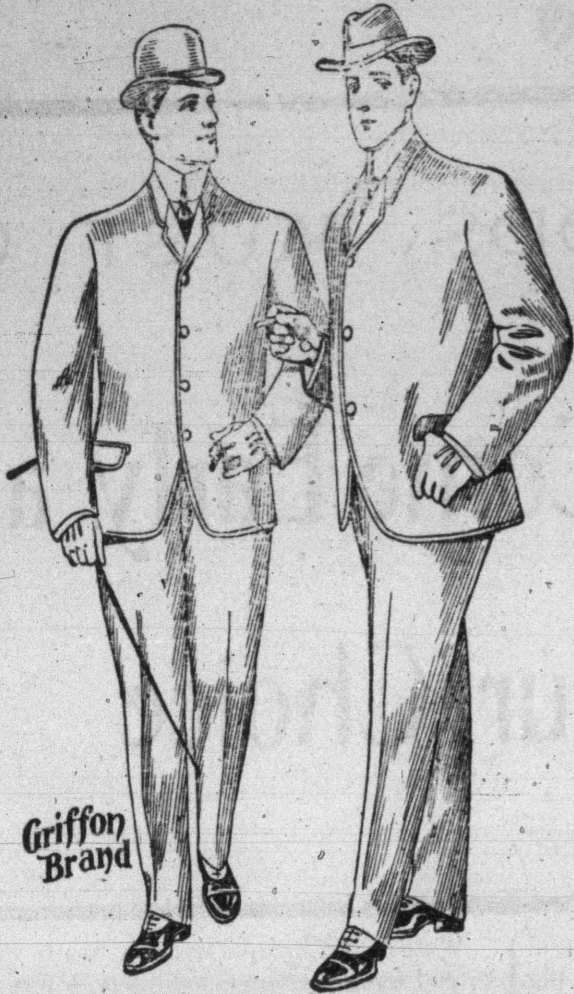

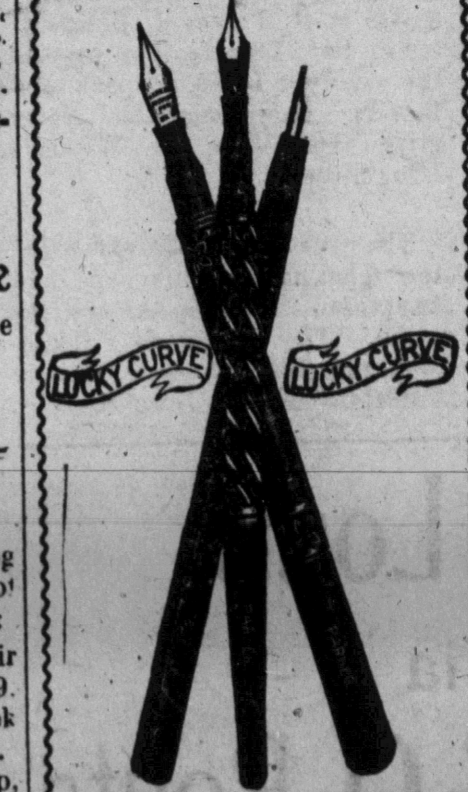
